



### Girton Parish Council

The following are amongst items discussed at Parish Council meetings and information received by the Parish Office.

The copy date for this edition precedes the January meeting, but items on the agenda included deciding the precept request to be submitted to South Cambs District Council for the financial year 2020–21. Also on the agenda is a proposal to consider installation of bollards alongside the footpath by the Recreation Ground Car Park to mitigate the risk of vehicles coming onto the footpath. Other agenda items include the Parish Council's response to South Cambridgeshire District Council's proposals for changes to the decision-making process for planning applications, and suggestions for possible projects for Local Highways Improvements grants for 2020–21.

The Council has also received news of 3 free trees offered by South Cambs District Council and the Council is keen to progress this with involvement of Girton Youth Project who have expressed interest in the project.

Installation of new MUGA lighting has been delayed by delivery issues with the new posts but is now expected to occur in February.

Readers will no doubt be aware of the sad passing of former chairman of GPC and husband of a current Councillor, Alan Rodger. We marked this with a suitable tribute at our meeting and send our deepest sympathy and best wishes to Mary and her family.

Residents are invited to a Crime Prevention Event organised by PCSO Tony Martin to be held at the Pavilion on Thursday 19th March from 6.00–7.30pm.

### From Our Councillors

### **County Councillor Lynda Harford**

### Roads

As we anticipate completion of the A14 project at the end of the year, a Council team is already working with Highways England (HE) to prepare for the handover of some of the assets. Once the upgrade is completed the County Council will be required to adopt approximately 27km of dual carriageway and 5km of slip roads which were part of the original A14, as well as sections of new or improved local roads, like the A1307, that will interface with the new A14. A legal agreement, part of the Development Consent Order, requires a handover plan to be agreed with the Council specifying the condition of the roads to be handed over. Following inspection to determine their current condition, HE will either carry out the necessary work or will provide funding for it to be done by the Council.

The Council is also concerned about the impact that diversion routes have had on the condition of local roads for which it already has maintenance responsibility. It is currently putting together the case for compensation for some of the damage this has caused and I shall be submitting details of local issues to be included. The Council budget for road maintenance requires £19m a year simply to maintain the current road network in a 'stand still' condition and this damage is already putting additional pressure on that budget. The way in which Department for Transport funding is allocated to local authorities is complex and presents various challenges to the Council as it seeks to secure adequate and fair funding to maintain its highways infrastructure, and the inclusion of additional assets adds to that complexity. Increasingly Shire County authorities like Cambridgeshire are highlighting the inequity of funding, and it has recently been reported that urban areas like London receive as much as three times the funding that rural areas do.

On 20th December Girton finally saw the long awaited resurfacing of the road adjacent to the Pavilion. This is a private road, so not the responsibility of County Highways. The challenge all along was to ensure that County Estates should deliver its responsibility for maintenance, which it has now done.

Work also began just before Christmas on bringing the roads at Wellbrook Way up to adoption standard. Thank you to everyone who has contacted me about different aspects of this and I do hope that the finished result will meet all expectations.

### Relocation to Alconbury Weald

Progress on the Council's relocation from Shire Hall to a new, purpose built building at Alconbury Weald continues. On 16th December, the Council's Chief Executive accompanied by both its Leader and Chairman participated in the ground-breaking ceremony for the new Civic Hub which will replace Shire Hall.

Construction of the new building is still on budget at £18.3m and the opening date is now set for Spring 2021. The predicted saving for the Council of its relocation is £1.5m every year.

### **Planning**

Although primarily a District Council function, please may I add my encouragement for you to input to the Greater Cambridge Local Plan consultation. This document touches so many areas of all our lives and helps to shape public services including those run by the County Council, *greatercambridgeplanning.org*.

I hope that you all had a very happy and restful Christmas. My very best wishes to you all for 2020.

### A View from the District

By the time you read this a new Citi6 timetable will be in place. The formal notice, which I only received on 2nd January, seemed to suggest that the 'minor changes to improve reliability' entailed missing out the Girton stops altogether; an anxious phone call established that it is simply the timing points (where a bus will wait if it is ahead of time) which have been removed. Now the full new timetable is available it still looks as though the bus to Oakington no longer stops opposite the church; I am assured that this is not so.

Shortly before Christmas I was alerted to the fact that leaf fall along the northbound Huntingdon Road was causing a hazard to cyclists, pedestrians and those using the bus stop opposite the garage. I managed to bring forward the scheduled sweeping programme and I hope all users agree the work was well done.

On a walk I noticed that there are significant cracks on both sides of the Oakington Road Bridge. Images from Google Earth suggest that these started in 2018. ### Need for more charge points for electric cars

A resident of Dry Drayton recently asked me to look into the question of how easy it is to charge electric cars and suggested that much more needs to be done.

Planning permission is not required to install a home charging system, which are available from a variety of suppliers for several hundred pounds. Internet search: 'home vehicle charger'. The first step to owning an electric vehicle is to buy one of these, as it enables the car to be charged overnight, which is an easy habit to get into. Charging an electric vehicle costs considerably less than buying the equivalent amount of petrol or diesel, and it can be even cheaper still if you have solar panels installed. Home chargers can generally charge at up to 32 Amps (7.2kW) on a dedicated circuit, or more if you have three phase electricity.

The next step is to find electricity when you are somewhere else. Many cars now have in-built software to find charging points, or there is an app called zap-map which is quite useful. The best places are where you are busy doing other things, such as at work, eating in restaurants, shopping or going to the gym, and you don't need to wait around.

According to zap-map, there is in fact only one public charging point in Girton, Dry Drayton and Madingley ward, which is a Tesla destination charger at the Felix Hotel on Huntingdon Road. Nearby, there are two sites in Cambourne, one at the Madingley Road Park & Ride and one at the Extra Services on the A14. There is an immediate need to increase the number of charging points, and this is something that local councils should be encouraging. If you own a business, installing a charging point is a great way to encourage strangers to turn up unexpectedly and ask to buy your goods or services while charging.

There are three main types of electric vehicle that you can buy: full electric vehicles (which need to have a range of at least 300 miles to be practical), vehicles with a range extender (typical range 100 miles and a small petrol engine that starts when you run out of electricity) and plug-in hybrids (which are like ordinary hybrids with a battery that can travel up to 30 miles before the engine starts).

According to the SMMT (Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders), nearly 38,000 full electric and 35,000 plugin hybrid vehicles were registered last year compared to 1.5M petrol and 583,000 diesels. Diesel sales are down from 1.3M in 2016 (a 54.6% fall over three years). Since petrol and diesel vehicles are more expensive to run and to maintain than electric vehicles, it is likely that their second hand values will fall much more rapidly than in the past.







### **Cottontails Pre-School**

This new year has brought with it many new and exciting changes for the pre-school. We've welcomed Sharon, our new Pre-School Manager, and are now recruiting

new team members having seen a 54% increase in admissions compared to the previous term!



Sharon has been settling in well, which is no surprise as she's worked in early years education for 20 years and we are lucky to have her. She is highly qualified with a level 5 in early years management and a level 3 qualified forest school leader – which is the highest qualification available. Outside work Sharon is a mum to twin 9-year-old girls, and a keen baker.

Our forest school sessions on Tuesday and Friday mornings continue to be popular with more and more children attending. As winter draws on, we've enjoyed watching how the forest changes and this has enabled the children to do some fantastic seasonal activities. Under the watchful eye of our staff, the children have also been foraging and preparing their own snacks — mainly picking apples and blackberries. Interestingly we've seen an abundance of varied mushrooms this term so we decided to buy a book on the subject and have spent time finding and identifying them with the children. Whilst we are keen to continue to encourage discovery and identification of fauna and flora, we ensure that the children understand that not everything is edible and what to avoid.



With the generosity of last year's donations we're in the process of buying metal detectors and child-friendly torches for the children to use when they are out and about in the forest.

The children have also begun to help with a community project to lay a hedge, initially sawing lengths of wood to make the fence posts. We hope to continue to be involved in this exciting community project – so hopefully watch this space for photos of the finished fence!

The number of children attending our intergenerational sessions at Arlington Manor – which we now offer as a full day – has also increased. The children have been interacting with the seniors at the care home, dancing together and singing songs. The children have also been enjoying cooking and exploring the garden. These experiences have helped the children to develop in confidence, empathy and social skills.

February is not too late to plant a tree!

Planting billions of trees across the globe is one of the best and cheapest ways of taking CO<sub>2</sub> out of the atmosphere to tackle the climate crisis. As trees grow, they absorb and store carbon dioxide emissions that are driving global heating. Research estimates that a worldwide planting scheme could remove two-thirds of all the emissions from human activities that remain in the atmosphere today. Obviously it remains vital to reverse the current trends of rising greenhouse gas emissions from fossil fuel burning and forest destruction, as forest restoration would take 50–100 years to have its full effect of removing 200 billion tonnes of carbon. You can read more here: science.sciencemag.org/content/365/6448/76.

Prof Tom Crowther at the Swiss University ETH Zurich, who led the research, said, "This new quantitative evaluation shows forest restoration isn't just one of our climate change solutions, it is overwhelmingly the top one. What blows my mind is the scale." He also said, "Every one of us can get involved. Individuals could make a tangible impact by growing trees themselves, donating to forest restoration organisations and avoiding irresponsible companies."

Evidence from the UK comes from St Paul's School in Hammersmith London which was found to be the second most polluted school in London with very high levels of CO<sub>2</sub> and nitrogen dioxide from diesel fumes. They launched a campaign called 'Grey goes Green' which began in 2018 and the school is now home to an urban woodland and a greener, healthier playground. As a result pollution levels have fallen by about 25%. Read more here: *lbhf.gov.uk/articles/news/2019/05/hammersmith-school-unveils-new-greenery-beat-pollution*.

If you live on a busy road there is evidence from a study by the RHS to show that planting an evergreen hedge such as privet, yew or cotoneaster will help to reduce air pollution in your garden and home. It found that plants with a dense canopy of oval or rough-textured leaves are best at capturing particles of dust from traffic and burnt fuel. The hedge should be pruned to keep the foliage cover compact, but allow the hedge to grow to at least 1.5 metres high and 1 metre deep to maximise the air filtering effect. Read more here:

So my message here is plant a tree (or two or three) if you have space or sponsor someone else like The Woodland Trust in the UK to do it for you! Trees offer so much in a garden if chosen wisely, colour and blossom in spring (cherries, acers, amelanchiers and many more), foliage and shelter in summer, glorious colour and fruit in autumn (acers, liquidambar, crab apples, apples, pears and rowans) and structure in winter. They offer shelter and food for birds and insects all year round. Every garden should have as many as possible!


If you already have trees, especially apples, pears or quinces now is the time to remove overcrowded growth, crossing stems and dead, damaged or dying branches. Aim for an open centre, through which air can circulate, as this will reduce the risk of pests and diseases. Take great care not to damage the tree if you saw off larger branches. Remember that all species of deciduous flowering prunus (ornamental cherries, plums and almonds) are vulnerable to silver leaf disease if pruned before mid- summer and rarely need regular pruning anyway unless they have outgrown their allotted space. Late frosts can kill blossom so be vigilant and have fleece ready if you have small, young trees that can be protected.



Many summer flowering deciduous shrubs that flower on this year's wood can be pruned between February and March. Buddleja davidii, ceratostigma, Hydrangea paniculata, lavatera, perovskia, hardy fuchsias and deciduous ceanothus all fall into this group. Cornus sanguinea, buddlejas and Salix alba are often cut back hard, as this keeps them manageable and improves the colour of the stems for the cornus and salix the following winter. Remove any reverted green shoots on hardy variegated evergreens otherwise they will take over. Do make sure that all wall shrubs and climbers are firmly tied onto their supports to prevent wind damage and, towards the end of the month, cut summer flowering clematis down to the lowest pair of healthy buds on each stem. Climbers such as ivy, Virginia creeper, ornamental vines and Boston ivy should be kept clear of windows, doors, gutters and roof tiles. After all this effort don't forget to feed and mulch

everything you have pruned. If you have planted young trees, do put guards round the stems to protect from rabbits or muntjac deer.

Elsewhere in the garden the first signs of spring will hopefully be around and clumps of snowdrops can be divided and replanted 'in the green'. If you grow vegetables then preparing the beds by adding manure or compost, removing weeds and raking to a fine seedbed is useful work on a fine day. Potato tubers can be put on windowsills to chit and some early vegetables such as broad beans, carrots, peas and salad can be sown under cover. In the flower borders, dead stems and flowerheads from perennials can be carefully removed before new growth comes through. Deciduous grasses can be cut back and evergreen ones combed through to remove dead growth.

Inside, many annual climbers such as ipomoea, eccremocarpus, *Mina lobata* and thunbergia can be started off in seed trays to get ready for summer planting. Late summer annuals such as cosmos, dahlias and rudbekias can also be sown indoors and if you overwinter cannas, dahlia and begonia tubers they can be potted up and kept somewhere light and frost free ready to go outside when all risk of frost has passed.

By the end of February the garden should be waking up, garden centres will be full of spring flowering plants and the promise of spring and summer will be in the air (hopefully). Enjoy the winter gardens of Anglesey Abbey and the Botanic Gardens and get inspiration for your own patch, however large or small.

Happy gardening – it always makes you feel better.

### Garden Tip of the Month - February

Some of the activity in February is dictated by the weather; if it's fine and open and not too wet it can be the best time for planting, to give plants a long spring. Mulches applied now will be easier to spread than when the plants are roaring into growth.

Whether the weather is fine or not February is a key month for getting on with pruning deciduous trees and shrubs. An opportunity perhaps to try out a new tool, or if not to service and then use your usual one, appreciating how well it cuts when adjusted, sharpened and oiled! As usual remember not to cut into plums and cherries at this time of year to lessen the risk of Silver Leaf. Oddly, for them mid-summer is a safer time. Don't delay dealing with potential weepers like maple and grape.

If you have pots of bulbs going over, like hyacinths or narcissus, they can often perform quite well for several years if you plant them before they have dried out totally, or drowned!

### St Andrew's during the Interregnum

We are very grateful to the *Girton Parish News* for giving us an opportunity to show that despite having no rector at the moment and the postponement (but not cancellation) of our makeover plans, we are still carrying on as usual because everyone, but particularly Dugald Wilson and Christina Deacon, is working together to ensure that all our activities go on as normal. Below is a sample of the things we have been doing.

For this report we are also very grateful to Gransden Aerial Services which provided aerial photos of the church for the front cover – we have never seen the church from these angles before. These wonderful photos really show that the church is part of our community.

### Churchyard working party



A group of people, some from the church and some not, meet on the last Saturday of every month to maintain the churchyard, which has never looked so tidy. This is very important as the church and its graveyard are at the heart of the village and villagers would be disappointed if it were a mess. Many thanks go to them.

### The clock

It was reported in the *Girton Parish News* a few months ago that the church clock has been modernised over 200 years after it was first installed. Here are more details about its mechanism.

By the way, it seems the clock was originally on the west side of the church tower, presumably because it could be seen from the then rectory, which is now the language school.

Making a turret clock, which keeps good time, is no simple matter. The swing of the pendulum must be kept going by the same mechanism as drives the external



hands, and is therefore subject to outside influences such as wind, snow and pigeons. Our clock has an ingenious mechanism to isolate the pendulum from these effects.

It is known as a double three-legged gravity escapement, and other famous examples can be found in the Elizabeth Tower at the Palace of Westminster and at Trinity College. Detailed descriptions of its operation with animated diagrams can be found online and repay careful study. In brief, there are independently pivoted 'gravity arms' on each side of the pendulum. As the pendulum swings in one direction, a pin on the drive train lifts the gravity arm on the opposite side, and the escapement wheel locks it in an elevated position. When the pendulum swings back, it touches the elevated gravity arm, which is released to give it a small push. The key feature of the design is that the gravity arms transfer energy from the drive train to the pendulum without ever touching both at the same time.

Nevertheless, the clock can still be affected by changes in temperature and atmospheric pressure. When the automatic winder was fitted, we took the opportunity to improve the accuracy even further. The clock is now adjusted to run very slightly fast, and an electronic device counts the swings of the pendulum and compares the time with a modern quartz clock. Every so often, an electromagnet captures the pendulum for just long enough to get the timing 'spot on'. The same mechanism will also alter the clock automatically for summer and winter time, though this does mean that it will stop for 11 hours in spring!

Rest assured that these changes have been made to the highest conservation standards and are fully reversible.

### **Social activities**

Each year St Andrew's organises a social activity which is open to all residents. On 12th September 2019, 50 residents of the village were off to Grimsthorpe Castle in Lincolshire organised by The Friends of St Andrew's Church. It was a lovely sunny day, what could be better. To start with we were treated to tea/coffee and biscuits in the café, then it was back on the coach for a tour of the 3000 acre estate with Ray, our guide, giving a very

interesting history of the park, which was designed by Lancelot 'Capability' Brown around 1771. Oak trees which were recorded in the Domesday book, 1086, were reportedly still alive in the twentieth century.

By all reports the day was a great success, so watch out for our trip in 2020.

### Village owes huge thanks to Girton Town Charity Chairman

Dr Robin Hiley, who has been Chairman of GTC for over 20 years, is standing down from his role at the beginning of February but will remain a Trustee. Here we take a look at his huge contribution to the life of the Village and the many projects and developments which have been brought to fruition during his time at the helm.

The major change during Robin's leadership was selling a large area of land at Wellbrook Way for development, enabling GTC to make exciting changes and bringing in a substantial sum of money which is invested to give funds to use for the benefit of Girton residents. The charity's annual income underwent a step-change



from less than £10,000 to over £500,000.

In 2004-7, this included refurbishing the Cotton Hall and upgrading St Andrew's Church and Baptist Church. In both cases, the churches made significant financial contributions of their own and this principle, that a group should feel that they truly 'own' the project, is one we believe is essential within the community.

### Almshouses

The enhanced income meant that in 2014, GTC completed a £1 million building project at Centenary Court to provide seven traditionally-built almshouses without having to use any of its endowment. In addition, it made available land for four social houses to be built by a housing association. The seven almshouses are for residents of Girton or those with family or close connections to the Village, who otherwise would be unable to afford to live here. Residents are appointed on the basis of a wide range of criteria and following an interview, carried out by the Trustees and assisted by housing professionals.

### **Community Centre**

In planning the sale of the land at Wellbrook Way, the Trustees had pledged to provide a major community facility on the site. The William Collyn Community Centre finally saw its official opening in 2019, following over ten years of planning. The £2.5 million Centre is now fully in use for Village activities and local groups, as well as corporate and independent bookings for meetings, training sessions and conferences from the wider community.

### **Enhancing Village life**

Under Robin's leadership, the Trustees have developed the innovative portfolio of projects and schemes to benefit Girton residents of all ages. These now include the popular Hospital Taxi Scheme with capped fares, CarePlus providing assistance over and above statutory provision, and the Educational Grant Scheme for students. Help is also given to individuals and groups and some support is delivered through successful collaborative partnerships such as those with the YMCA, Age UK

and Relate.

### Next phase

Robin said: "After 20 years as Chairman, it is time for me to pass on the baton but I am keen to remain a Trustee and play my part in steering our next phase of projects – the increase in almshouse provision at Suffolk Terrace and the High Street to meet future housing needs – through to a successful conclusion.

"It has been a huge privilege to have led GTC through these positive developments but they were a collective effort. I must thank the 19 Trustees who have served with me since I joined the Board in 1998 for their unstinting, enthusiastic and imaginative contributions and support to the work of GTC.

"Now I am retired from the Chair as well as from my academic work, I am looking forward to spending more time with my family and friends, and in pursuing my interests especially travel, opera and history.

### **Enhancing Village life**

"I am confident that GTC will continue to flourish and be innovative under its new Chair, Ann Bonnett. I wish her as much pleasure and fulfilment as I have had in the role."

Ann has been a GTC Trustee since 2012 and played a leading role in a number of projects including the creation of the Sensory Garden at Wellbrook Way, the Sculpture Railings and new Bus Shelter and the Community Art Project *Passing Through and Settling*.

### **Educational Grants 2020**

Applications for an Educational Grant are invited from young people over 18 leaving secondary education and moving on to higher education and some training schemes or NVQ qualifications Level 4 and above.

Just turn up on Wednesdays from 9.30am onwards for a leisurely breakfast. The small number of regulars are happy to welcome and include newcomers.



### Church can change your perspective

### All you need is love ...

... and some of us are old enough to remember the Beatles singing that song!

In a month containing Valentine's day, it might appear that the only way to love, is by buying some expensive gift to be accompanied by a large card. But then another Beatles song said, 'Money can't buy me love ...' The song asserts a willingness to buy anything, even a diamond ring; but acknowledges that money definitely cannot buy love. Somehow, this song seems to get closer to the nub of what love is really about.

Over the years, there must have been millions of songs, poems, paintings, and goodness knows how many letters, produced on the subject of love. So it is hardly surprising that in God's book, too, there is a great deal written about it.

One way NOT to have love reciprocated, is by coercion. No matter what we do, how many gifts are given, we cannot force another to love us. Likewise with God. He might want us to be his friends, to love him, but he will never force himself on to us.


I have come across a story about Benjamin Franklin. He had a great deal to do with improving street lighting (amongst other things!). Although I cannot verify the story, it does make a good point about not forcing people into something.

When Benjamin Franklin wished to interest the people of Philadelphia in street lighting, he didn't try to persuade them by talking about it – instead, he hung a beautiful lantern on a long bracket before his own door. Then he kept the glass brightly polished, and carefully hung it at the approach of dusk.

People wandering about on the dark street saw Franklin's light a long way off and came under the influence of its friendly glow with grateful hearts. To each one it seemed to say, 'Come along, my friend! Here is a safe place to walk. See that cobblestone sticking out? Don't stumble over it! I shall be here to help you again tomorrow night, if you should come this way.'

It wasn't long before Franklin's neighbours began placing lights in brackets before their homes and soon the entire city awoke to the value of street lighting and took up the matter with interest and enthusiasm. Example is always a strong motivation for doing the right thing in life.

Thus it is with God. For him love is a deep, constant and lasting attribute of the character. It is something to be nurtured, to be allowed to gently shine through. He



says quite a lot about it. He tells us that love must be sincere, it must think more of another than oneself. Further, God tells us that love is patient and kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonour others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails. Jesus says love one another – as I have loved you, so you must love one another. All that is quite unequivocal. But also, it is not coercion. Once the shops have stopped marketing goods for Valentine's day, real love just keeps going on ... and on ... and on ...

And the Lord gives us the best example of all. Christ died on the cross for all of us, which reminds us that 'greater love has no man but this, that he lay down his life for his friends' – and that means you and me!

Co-op is working for the well-being of our community. There are three main areas that I will be focusing on:


