Girton Parish Council

August's Parish Council Meeting is traditionally for the receipt of payments only, and reports were presented on the Rewilding Project, Oakington Road Bridge, and the Pavilion refurbishment. Issues with parking at the High Street/Cambridge Road junction and the Local Highways Improvement grant application will be revisited at our next meeting.

Our appeal for new councillors has borne fruit in that Cllr. Ann Muston was co-opted in our July meeting; welcome, Ann. Two further parishioners have enquired about joining and will hopefully be co-opted in our September meeting. This will bring our number to 13 with two vacancies remaining. If you feel you can make a contribution to village life via the PC please contact the Clerk or any Councillor to register your interest.

The Pavilion refurbishment project has progressed to the appointment of a contractor who will produce the detailed design and costings before proceeding to construction. It seems unlikely that building work can begin before the end of the year so it is now proposed to keep the Pavilion open at least until Christmas. We shall also seek to schedule the work in phased stages to minimize the interruption to use of the changing facilities. To assist in funding energy efficient heating in the refurbished hall a grant application has been submitted to the SCDC Zero Carbon Communities Fund.

It is sad to report that at the end of September, after almost ten years as Parish Clerk, Susie Cumming has decided to move on to pastures new. We are very grateful to Susie for her contribution to the work of the Council and in particular for the way she coordinated the 'Helping Girton' initiative throughout the pandemic lockdown periods. Her willingness to lend a sympathetic ear to parishioners' problems will be particularly missed. We wish her well. If you would like to be part of the team please see Girton Parish Council job advertisement below. In the absence of a bookings assistant, Cllr. Mary Rodger has kindly stepped into the breach temporarily. Many thanks to Mary.

We have been made aware that there has recently been a number of reported thefts of catalytic converters in Girton and Oakington, so please take any security measures possible to protect your vehicles. See page 9.

From Our Councillors

County Councillor Edna Murphy

Opportunity for Cambridgeshire schools to replace oil and gas powered boilers

The County Council has agreed to an innovative proposal that, by using a combination of capital and loan funding, supplemented by grants, councilmaintained schools whose existing boilers need to be replaced could be assisted with the costs of retrofitting Air Source Heat Pump (ASHP) systems. This could make a significant improvement to the county's decarbonisation efforts!

Sorting out the Council's finances

There are a number of challenges for the new administration, and the ability to deliver will critically depend on the state of the council's finances. The challenge comes from a few distinct pressures: Covid and its continuing impact on health and services; the longstanding problem for Cambridgeshire of being an area of rapid growth; and the constraints and issues in relation to the arrangements and provision we have inherited.

One particular area we are looking at carefully is in relation to This Land, the wholly-owned subsidiary of

the County Council, to which the council loaned millions of pounds to buy council land and develop it. This Land currently owes the council £113.85m. It is paying its debt to the council, but it needs to be commercially successful for the council's investment to be safe. The council is interested in maximising its return on this loan. Can it be a commercial success while servicing these debts? This is potentially a very high-risk strategy for the council and its invested funds.

More on Oakington Road Bridge

Members of the Parish Council were able to meet with officers from the County Council to discuss a range of issues associated with the bridge including concerns from residents. In particular whether the parapet (which is cracked, and has been for some time) would be less able to withstand a crash than if repaired, what kind of repairs were planned and what options there would be for increasing the path for cyclists. The options are not yet defined but I am chasing officers to try to expedite these so that we can share them with the Parish Council and residents, and get feedback.

Bins - assisted collection

Increasing Biodiversity

There is still time to comment on the new planning guidance about how to increase biodiversity in new developments, which has been published for public consultation by the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service. The consultation runs until Friday 17 September. Further information can be found on the Greater Cambridge Shared Planning website.

Planning services performance figures – an update

Last month Cllr Tom Bygott reported in the GPN that South Cambridgeshire District Council was being threatened with legal action for 'misleading' performance figures. The council has dismissed the potential legal challenge as "scaremongering" after the Government found nothing wrong with its planning processes.

In June this year a community campaign group said it intended to bring a legal challenge against the council over allegations that it was deliberately misleading the Government over how many planning applications had been determined within a set time.

But after the council wrote a letter to The Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government to clarify whether it had been following processes properly, the ministry responded that the performance reporting is, and had always been, correct.

Resettlement of Afghans

All councils have been asked to prepare housing ready to accommodate Afghan refugees. SCDC is ready to receive those allocated to them.

New housing policies

Following consultation in the spring of 2021, Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire District councils have approved three new housing policies, affecting:

- the setting of Affordable Rents by Registered Housing Providers, for homes let to people on the councils' housing registers
- the location and mix of Affordable Homes in new developments
- the councils' expectations of new homes that are built specifically to be rented out (Build to Rent)

Both councils are committed to building homes that are affordable to live in, and ensuring that new Affordable Homes will be well-designed and located within new developments in such a way as to promote mixed, balanced and inclusive communities.

The two councils consulted jointly on these policies because they will add detail to the Greater Cambridge Housing Strategy 2019-2023, and are aimed at new housing developments across both Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire. They will also help to inform the proposed joint Local Plan.



Thieves cause £1,000 of damage to car in a matter of minutes



A High Street resident has been left stunned after thieves removed the catalytic converter from under his car in a matter of minutes leaving him with a £1,000 repair bill.

The brazen thieves struck at 11pm on Wednesday 11 August and although the matter has been reported to the police (incident number 35/53489/21) the owner of the car, which was parked on the front drive under a streetlight, was told that without photos or CCTV of the thieves at work they are unable to take much action.

The car owner, who does not wish to be named, said: "I heard a very loud noise of metal drilling at around 11pm and thought it sounded rather urgent and mysterious but put it down to our neighbours. I did turn a light on in my room which might have scared off whoever was involved.

"The police have not shown much interest so far. They seem to require photos of the thieves at work. I did find a broken saw head on the ground near the car which

must hold some clues.

"It appears to be quite a commonplace crime at this moment involving the removal of catalytic converters but it is a rather horrible awakening for us never having dreamt of such an incident in Girton!"

According to Cambridgeshire Police, catalytic converters are often targeted by thieves for the precious metals found inside them. Using high-powered tools they can jack-up a car and cut converters out within a matter of minutes.

To keep your vehicle safe:

- mark your converter with a unique code so it's harder for thieves to sell
- approach your dealership for advice about fitting a Catloc or another protective device
- park with your exhaust close to a fence, wall or kerb to reduce the risk of theft
- install a 24-hour dashcam
- purchase a driveway alarm
- park in a well-lit area, ideally covered by CCTV
- if your catalytic converter is bolted on, consider having the bolts welded to make removal difficult.


Girton Cottontails Preschool

I was woken in the night by the remembrance that I needed to write the Allotment Society article before I went on holiday on Friday (I didn't fancy writing a 1000 word article on an iPad). So I'm starting on Tuesday 10th August and it looks like the promised warmer, sunnier and drier weather has arrived. And that is after a roller coaster of conditions over recent weeks: a spell of extreme heat in mid-July; then ever since grey sullen days with occasional sunny spells; but with little rain and hence parched soil; most recently some high winds (shame on me! my bean rack lurched over) and intermittent rain showers, although as we often remark to each other, serious rain so often skirts Girton.

Allotment activity continued steadily through all weathers, and now the returns for our months of sowing, planting, tending are being harvested. It's that rewarding time when fresh produce is taken into kitchen and freezer. And with other crops still to reach readiness, such as sweetcorn. Awaiting some members is the hard work of digging many rows of main crop potatoes.

A sign of fecundity at this point in the season are the heaps of 'help-yourself' marrows (mainly overlooked courgettes) placed at the pumps and gates. Marrows are the marmite of the vegetable world; some dislike them ("watery, no taste") while others (myself included) value them. They have to be cooked to advantage, roasted in my opinion, to take up the flavours of their accompanying herbs, spices, meats, cheese.

For some, it has been a good season for soft fruit: strawberries, black and red currants, raspberries, gooseberries. Frozen, and then brought out in the winter for pies and crumbles... a cheering reminder of high summer.

Tomatoes have done well this year. It is one of my pleasures to see trusses of the perfect globes, slowly ripening to gorgeous red, and then in bowls in the house. Some of us will have the embarrassment of riches, having grown too many plants and struggling to use all the fruits. Sauce for the freezer and distribution to friends are answers. My daughter bought me *The Big Red Book of Tomatoes*, containing 300 pages of recipes.

Potato blight, the air-borne organism causing browning, rotting and death of potato and tomato tissue, is always the subject of alarm and rumour at this time of year... false and justified. I recently talked with one usually cheerful but then grumpy member; he had just removed all his rotted tomato plants, destroyed by blight. Yet elsewhere on the site, the plants are healthy.

I think it partly depends on wind direction, shelter from the fungus-carrying breezes. So far I have spotted three tomatoes with the tell-tale brown marks; destroyed them; and now I am taking the precaution of picking fruit which has started to ripen before blight strikes; they will continue to ripen in the house. Also, weeks ago, some members cut the foliage tops of their early potatoes down to ground level when there were rumours of early blight. For me, blight is the worst adversary we have to contend with.

Here is an extract from an email circulated to Society members.

We have been asked to help in a scientific survey of cabbage white caterpillars on the site.

This will entail simply finding and taking their temperatures, so there will be no other interventions.

I was tempted to reply, enquiring whether this was a mistimed April Fool joke, or how does one insert the thermometer. But seriously, it's gratifying that the Society has been asked to participate in nature research, consistent with our policies of being active in enhancing the environment and nature.

Talking of butterflies, it is pleasing to be able to write that, after a dearth until recently, they are beginning to show themselves. Although, as often mentioned by the likes of Chris Packham, not in the numbers we used to enjoy. During a recent rare sunny afternoon, I sat on the allotment, near to my herb bed, and enjoyed for ages two gatekeeper butterflies feasting on the flowering heads of the herbs. (Should one allow herbs to flower?) It was a delight to watch. Now and then they would take to the air to chase and be chased by bees (wasps?). Tortoiseshells, peacocks, red admirals and a single copper have been enjoyed. And of course, many many of the aforementioned cabbage whites.

Finally, I would like to recommend a Radio 4 programme to those for whom allotmenting is in their bones (if it's not too late for BBC Sounds) – *The Patch* on Monday 9th August, 9am. The brief BBC Sounds summary says "one randomly generated postcode, and an unheard story unfolding in a corner of Britain we wouldn't otherwise know about. In an inner London borough, tales of loss and longing told through vegetables". It will make you emotional and glad to be part of the allotment fraternity.

Although the press is designed for apples, it works equally well for pears, grapes and berries. Whether you have fifty pears, hundreds of apples or thousands of elderberries, or are simply keen and have friends or neighbours with spare fruit, juicing them and, maybe even, making cider, perry or wine, is a great way of preserving the fruit rather than simply adding them to your compost heap. It makes a great social occasion and the taste of freshly pressed juice is incomparable to anything you can buy in the shops.

George's Garden Tip

Well, unsurprisingly, several September tasks are weather dependent (and I don't have much luck in predicting what will happen next weather-wise, so if you find that's easy do let me know!). September and March used to be regarded as the best two months for lawn care, so if you have a lawn, as contrasted with a grassy area, you could while away the hours, scarifying, moss-killing and feeding. Remember autumn fertilizer contains less nitrogen, because too much new soft growth won't last the winter as well as allowing a more mature leaf coverage. Given the difficulty in anticipating what weather to expect, I suggest you get your ducks in a row (check the fertilizer, moss-killer, state of your rake) in readiness, and when you hear there is a low coming over and we are all going to get some rain, get weaving.

Have you tried growing green manure crops? I've used mustard, grazing rye, and phacelia, with reasonable

results, but the best I've tried to date was the Kings Seeds Summer Quick Fix Mix (I've always been a sucker for alliteration!). It grew well, covered the soil well and had a lot of pretty flowers, with a reasonable vase life! In fact, in summer, I sometimes figure that the cover of chickweed et al. is a reasonable ground cover, and is quickly hoed out when the space is required. However, the most useful type of crop is the one that covers most of the soil during the winter. In these days of unusually hard downbursts, protecting the surface from capping, and avoiding too much leaching of soluble nutrients with a cover of vegetation is an asset. A members' experiment by Garden Organic found a much better cover over winter from clover sown at the same time as French beans in May, than that sown in September after the beans were cleared. Still although worth bearing in mind for next May it doesn't help so much now we're in September, but Kings Seeds and others do advertise winter mixes which are usually sown in September or October.

After many months of stop/start activities, the team at the William Collyn Centre is delighted to announce that it is back in business and looking forward to welcoming residents of all ages to a packed programme, from Tumble Tots to Ballroom Dance Classes.

September feels like a new start for the Centre after what has been a very disjointed 18 months which has included full closures, restricted opening and now, thank goodness, full return , says Helen Johnson, Centre Manager.

We had to impose many strict measures to keep everyone safe at the Centre over this period and these were fully embraced by our hirers.

Reduced capacity

Even though many restrictions have now been eased, we have kept some in place and rather than return to full capacity of up to 200 guests, we are maintaining a cap of 75 at any one time which allows users to stay distanced from others if they wish. We also request that face masks are worn in communal areas and it is then up to hirers as to whether these have to be worn during their classes.

Looking ahead we have a really full diary of events which includes regular groups running sessions for all members of the community and also many private bookings.

Businesses holding meetings are welcome to use the Main Hall if available, as this offers more space and good ventilation as well as a comprehensive AV set up for presentations.

Last but not least, in August we welcomed Ollie, a new member of staff who has joined our team to work alongside experienced Duty Supervisor Max and me. I am sure he will be a great asset to the Centre as we go forwards.

The Centre is keen to support members of the community who have been most affected by the pandemic and is running a couple of activities on weekday afternoons for older residents to encourage socialising and movement in as safe an environment as possible.

From Monday 6th September at 2.00pm, the Centre

is re-introducing Kurling sessions, a sport suitable for people of all abilities which can be played seated or standing and is great fun! It costs just £3 per person (payable on the day) and includes a hot drink.

Afternoon Tea Dances will also start shortly. Plans are being finalised so please keep an eye on the Centre's website and social media pages for more information and look out for details in next month's Parish News.

Treasure

Even in times of prosperity and welfare, there are some countries where orphaned children live on the streets, searching rubbish dumps for any items that might earn funds for sustaining food. Living from day to day, these children depend on finding just enough to keep hunger at bay. One such boy was Alfred. Out of luck, he had gone three days without eating. Weak with hunger, he arrived at a house door, intending to ask for some small assistance, but when his knock was answered by a girl of his own age, he felt too ashamed to beg for food and muttered a request for water.

"Wait here," said the girl. She went indoors and moments later, returned with a mug of milk, two large cakes and some water, offering more food when the household meal had been prepared. "How did you know I was hungry?" Alfred asked. "I could see it in your eyes," replied Suza. "They are the mirror of the heart."

Satisfied and sincerely grateful, Alfred went on his way. "I will pray that God will look after you. He loves you Alfred," Suza called out.

Years passed. Suza's parents died, leaving her with a younger sister. Their savings diminished. Then Suza became ill and her only means of survival was to undergo an urgent operation, which was performed ahead of the medical bill. Suza was in utter despair, having no possessions to sell, nor friends or family able to supply a loan, she could not cover the expense.

Two anxious weeks passed. Then, one day a nurse handed Suza her exit documents along with a letter. In complete amazement, Suza read a copy of her long-ago conversation with Alfred the street boy. Weeping, she recounted the story to her sister. "Do good to everyone, even to strangers. God knows all we do," she whispered through tears of relief. Alfred, now a qualified doctor, had noted Suza's admission to the hospital where he now worked. He was able to offer her a job when she recovered, and stated that her medical bill had been gladly settled by a mug of milk, two cakes and some water.

Jesus urged his disciples to "Lay up treasure where moth and rust do not destroy and thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Ref. Matthew ch.6v21) Our resulting Western interpretation has sometimes been of a treasure chest of wealth awaiting our arrival in our heavenly abode, a kind of in-trust account or a mystical stocks and shares benefit. However, put into the context of the request to "do good unto all mankind," we can shift the mental image of treasure to the yet unknown ripple effects that deeds of kindness, support and genuine

concern have produced. Salvation is not earned by works, but active faith will work out the blessings of God's gift of salvation in us.

The glorious surprise in heaven could be in seeing at last, the accumulation of relief, joy and inspiration that our love has supplied. The treasure garnered by generosity (and sometimes self-sacrifice) will be evident in the eyes and hearts of those who were rescued in times of struggle and despair.

Such treasure is priceless, like the unsurpassing love that we ourselves have first received from God.

Acts of kindness to our fellows may often be misted over in the histories of daily life, but in that holy place where true love, layer upon layer, builds in sustaining value, the treasure endures, an enabling force of vitality in the lives of glad recipients. The early church understood the principles of methodical and unstinting care. We can continue in their wisdom and embrace.

Proverbs 3v 27,28. "Do not withhold good from those who deserve it when it is in your power to act ... or say I'll give it tomorrow, when you now have it with you."


