

The mobile post office will stop in the car park in Orchard Close behind the old Scallywags Nursery. Posters will be put round the village nearer the time and more information will be available shortly.



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Girton Parish Council

At the end of September we said goodbye to our clerk of some 10 years, Susie Cumming, and welcomed our new clerk, Yvonne Murray. Yvonne is very rapidly getting to grips with the role and the move of the Parish Office to temporary accommodation in the Cotton Hall. The recruitment process for an assistant to the clerk continues.

Our October meeting began with observation of a minute's silence in memory of George Thorpe who passed away very recently. George has been a very faithful servant to the village having served as warden of the Town End Close Nature Reserve, and leader of the 'Green Team' carrying out conservation work on the open spaces of the village. He is greatly missed and we send our deepest condolences to his wife Viv. You can read Viv's eulogy to George on page 9.

Matters discussed at October's meeting included: co-option of a new Parish Councillor and approval for urgently needed repairs to the recreation ground play area. Instigating repairs to the play area has been very badly delayed by Covid and the matter is being given top priority. We are delighted to report that our application to the SCDC Zero Carbon Communities Fund for a grant towards heating of the refurbished Pavilion was successful and an award of the maximum amount of £15,000 was made. An application to the County Council Local Highways Improvement grant fund was also made this month. This covers parking restrictions at each end of Thornton Road and the main road junctions of St Margaret's Road and of Weavers Field.

As the dark winter afternoons approach we have been particularly concerned at the slow progress of installation of lighting along Oakington Road. As it seems unlikely that this will be carried out very soon we are pressing Highways to reinstate all the solar stud lighting along the length not currently covered. County Councillor Edna Murphy is fighting our corner to get this very important road safety issue resolved.

Remembrance Sunday's Ceremony of Remembrance will be held at the War Memorial by St Andrew's Church at 10.45am on Sunday 14th November, followed by the church remembrance service. All residents are invited to join us.

Finally, we inexplicably failed to meet the copy deadline for the October issue of the *GPN* but the report for that month may be found on the village website.

Widening of shared use cycle/ footway at Oakington Road Bridge

Girton Parish Council is conducting a public consultation to consider the implications of widening the path to improve user safety by restricting vehicle passage to a single lane.

The key changes to be implemented are:

- Widening the current shared-use path to 3m as it crosses the bridge.
- Reducing the carriageway on the bridge to a single lane to accommodate the wider path.
- Giving priority to traffic leaving the village, similar to the pinch points on the roads into Oakington.
- Installation of additional signage on the bend of the outbound approach to the Bridge to indicate the possible need to give way to oncoming vehicles already on the bridge.

The perceived benefits of the scheme are:

- Improving the safety of cyclists and pedestrians, including those using buggies and pushchairs.
- Restricted vehicle passage over the bridge will enforce speed reduction of incoming traffic.
- The perception of 'restricted' access may discourage rat running to access the Huntingdon Road and M11.
- The additional signage will serve to introduce some caution on the outbound approach to the bend where visibility is not good.
- It provides an efficient opportunity to get the bridge parapet repairs completed in a timely fashion.

Covid update

Schools and young people's health continue to be a priority for the County Council. Covid infections have risen rapidly in Cambridgeshire schools and there is onward infection affecting families too. The situation is very worrying, and against the backdrop is a large and growing number of people with long Covid and pressure on the NHS. We have not yet hit the peak of winter, when flu and other respiratory diseases are likely to put even more pressure on people and services.

The County has recommended some restrictions for schools in order to help reduce transmission. The advice is being reviewed on a daily basis. Advice given to schools includes secondary schools reintroducing face coverings in communal areas, social distancing and non-essential events becoming virtual. Pupils should be encouraged to take twice-weekly lateral flow tests.

The pandemic continues to put pressure on people and families. There will be food vouchers at half term and in the Christmas holidays, implemented as it was in the summer. Also the County has given support to a national mental health awareness campaign 'Every Mind Matters' (www.nhs.uk/every-mind-matters). Please remember there is support for people of all ages – anyone with mental health difficulties can call the First Response Service by calling NHS 111 (option 2).

For young people, YOUnited offers help to children and young people with their emotional wellbeing and mental health. It is available to those up to the age of 25 and offers a range of support including therapies, counselling and guided self-help. Referrals can be made to YOUnited by a GP or any professional working with children or young people. More information can be found at: https://www.cpft.nhs.uk/search/service/younited-195/.

Road safety and carbon reduction

The County has committed to ambitious targets both for road safety improvement and carbon reduction. Reducing speed is a key aspect of both, and as a result a more holistic approach to speed reduction is being considered, including specifically looking at the way in which 20mph speed limits are introduced. The aim is to make it easier, and with less burden on the applicant, to apply for 20mph limits, and indeed other speed limits that currently apply.

Many people have noticed that there are many trees failing to thrive near the A14. New saplings were planted by Highways England as part of the A14 programme of work but many are failing to grow. Having raised this with County officers they report that they have discussed the die-back with Highways

England, that Highways England is aware of the problem, and are attempting to correct the situation, albeit without making a huge amount of progress. Highways England's landscaping officer is currently assessing the backlog of dead saplings requiring attention. I will continue to pursue this to make sure Highways England puts this right.

£1.8m funding for skills bootcamps

The combined authority has secured £1.8 million in new funding to help more than 800 people gain sought-after digital skills to accelerate their careers.

Skills Bootcamps are flexible courses of up to 16 weeks, giving people the opportunity to build up sector-specific skills and fast-track to an interview with a local employer. They offer skills at Level 3 or above (Level 3 is equivalent to A-Levels) and aim to meet the needs of employers and the wider economy. They are for people who are aged 19 or over and who are employed, self-employed, career changers/returners/redeployed or unemployed people.

One of the two providers is the Cambridge Regional College.

Delivery of the Skills Bootcamps will be completed by March 2022. For further information and to make enquiries, visit: *growthworkswithskills.com*.

Business Growth Fund

Because of SCDC's success in getting all the government's Covid grants out quickly and efficiently to our businesses they now have an additional sum of Growth Fund money to spend. This is not for businesses to survive Covid, but for businesses that have survived to be able to grow and in so doing increase the number of people they employ, their turnover and their profits.

Grants range in size from £2,500 to £50,000. If you have a business with potential to grow, contact the council's business support team for advice and support to apply for your share of the remaining £378,610. More details here: https://www.scambs.gov.uk/business/grants-and-funding.

Additional support for vulnerable families and individuals

In addition to the direct food vouchers, a Countywide

hub is available to link you in with local support in your area. Support might include access to information and advice, more food and fuel support or access to other essential supplies. Electric bin lorries

SCDC is moving forward with its commitment to be Zero Carbon with the purchase of two more electric bin lorries. These vehicles are expensive but the savings that are made on fuel together with the environmental benefits means that they pay for themselves in a relatively short time.

Local police and fire services

There are high levels of demand on the police but they are coping. They have maintained Covid-secure standards and this means staff are available. Meanwhile, for the fire service, availability of services is good and they have maintained a Covid-secure work environment.

Hotel Felix update

The planning application to demolish the Hotel Felix *tinyurl.com/vshotelfelix*, one of Girton's most historic and best loved heritage buildings was submitted in February and validated on March 1st. I wrote to request that the application be called in to the Planning Committee and submitted my planning reasons for preserving the building on May 2nd. Since then I have had no reply to any of my correspondence. It appears that the matter has been put into the "too hard basket" and just left.

Meanwhile the applicant, owned by a venture capital firm, has paid an application fee of £25,067 and been left with a luxury hotel with a one-time £8.5 million valuation left empty and gathering cobwebs. So far they have been very patient, but it is obvious that this situation can't go on forever. An applicant left waiting for more than eight weeks can appeal to the Secretary of State for non-determination.

Over the last few months there has been a steady increase in the number of people contacting me to say that they have lodged a planning application but have heard nothing in the following weeks and months and have been unable to get any kind of update on what is happening.

Under Section 62B of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990, the Secretary of State has the power to decide that South Cambridgeshire District Council is not adequately performing its function of determining planning applications and take over its planning powers, with most decisions made by planning inspectors in other parts of the country.

Hot Tub Superstore

Observant motorists will have noticed that signs marked "Hot Tub Superstore" have appeared on the access roads to the A14 at the Swavesey, Bar Hill and Dry Drayton junctions. These have been left unchallenged for several months; I first noticed them in early June. The signs are coloured brown in the same format as signs for national parks and tourist attractions, with a pictogram of a couple relaxing in their hot tub, and are of a similar quality and design to official signs.

The Hot Tub Superstore in question is located next to Herbie's Diner on the A1307 near the Swavesey junction. There is some local sympathy for these businesses, as they have suffered a loss of passing trade during the A14 works and then during coronavirus. However, a distinction has to be made between business advertisements and road signs, which are essential for highway safety. If every business that has struggled during coronavirus put up unauthorised advertising signs, our roads would be so festooned with signs that we couldn't see where we were going.

To date Cambridgeshire County Council, which is responsible for maintaining road signs and owns the poles to which these signs are attached, has ignored my correspondence on the subject.

District Council unable to provide audited accounts

Councillors were called in for an Extraordinary Meeting on Monday 18th October to discuss problems with preparing South Cambridgeshire District Council's audited accounts. The council has been unable to provide audited accounts for the 2018/19 year within the required time. It is unable to start the audit on the 2019/20 or 2020/21 accounts and is building up a long backlog of unaudited accounts.

The auditor, Ernst and Young, has issued a report saying that they are considering "issuing recommendations to council under Section 24, Schedule 7 of the Local Accountability and Audit Act 2014". This would put the council into something analogous to "special measures".

Local Plan consultation to start in November

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Remembering George



Before writing this I thought about how well known and thought of George was in Girton and I thought I would like anyone who felt moved to, to write a little something, whether a story, a memory, an encounter or anything about George and either pop it through the door or into the box on the day of his funeral.

George was born in Uganda in 1955 where he lived until he was seven. Occasionally the smell of an exotic fruit transported him right back. One thing he did not enjoy was the cold when he first arrived in this country. He came to Cambridge in 1974 following his father and great uncle to Jesus College where he made some very good friends.

He read Geography, gaining a 2.1. From very early on and until the end he was involved with societies, charities and groups that worked to make this world a better place. After university he went to work in Arjuna Wholefood Workers Cooperative, a forward thinking chaotic place to be, which was where we met. From the time he left Arjuna he worked in and for the environment.

He eventually became Head Gardener at Trinity College, working as organically as possible, managing about 30 acres of various types of areas and a staff of twelve. Towards the end of his time there he wanted to be more hands on and so after retiring from Trinity he became self-employed and called his business Bush Doctor; he liked the differentiation from Tree Surgeon. He enjoyed punning, pruning and playing with words!

We moved to Girton in 1989, and being a particularly sociable man, he became involved with Girton Players moving on to Girton Operatic Society. He loved singing, the banter, getting involved, and the social occasions. He used to say no matter how hard he tried to look smart backstage, by the time he got on stage something was out of place. He had a lovely voice.

George had an allotment and he enjoyed the friendliness, chatting and sharing with the other allotment holders. For him it was a form of relaxation, the only imposed timetable being that of nature. He liked to look after the open spaces and was so pleased that people volunteered to help make Girton a greener space.

And then, of course, generally at the last minute, he wrote his monthly tip for the *Girton Parish News*. He even found time to go round with the Christian Aid envelopes. He taught Tai Chi in Girton, Cambridge and on Zoom. He looked after the Nature Reserve. The more I write this the more I wonder how he fitted everything in but then we used to joke that he could turn round on a sixpence.

He was also the Secretary and then the Treasurer for the Professional Gardeners Guild, I am not so sure he enjoyed being the Treasurer as much as the visits and weekends away with all his gardening chums.

He died in the Arthur Rank Hospice where the care was exemplary. He was a lovely, kind gentleman. He loved life, to chat with people about anything and everything, he cared passionately about the environment, and I feel sad that we will not able to see or read him again. We shall miss him and I shall mourn him, but he would rather that we "cracked on" and did our bit for the environment to make this a better world for now and future generations. He liked the phrase "think globally, act locally".

In (very) brief that was George and I know that he was cherished here, so if you would like to write something about him, please do. I would love to read your contribution and he would be chuffed as nuts.

The Mitten Tree project - an update


Knitters and shoppers have been busy showing their support for The Mitten Tree Project, sponsored by St Andrew's Church.

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
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Girton Cottontails Preschool

Making his Mark



In his youth during the 1950's Mark Handley, who moved to Girton with his wife Etsuko in 2016, was enthralled by the drawings by Ronald Searle in Geoffrey Willans' hilarious book *Down With Skool*, not that he modelled himself on Nigel Molesworth!

Punch, a magazine that consoled him in dentists' waiting rooms from an early age, was one of his favourite periodicals, not that he was not equally fond of the *Beano*. Mark dreamt of becoming a cartoonist but in the end had to try to do something useful instead and turned to architecture.

In 1969 Mark managed to get a cartoon published in *Punch* as a result of being a runner-up in a competition for amateurs. The drawing caught the eye of Christopher South of the *Cambridge Evening News* who commissioned him to provide amusing drawings for his column in the 1970's.

In the 1980's Mark began making linocuts inspired by Edward Bawden's large-scale works in that medium, and he produced several such works including Aldeburgh Beach (1981) (pictured below), the Wren Library at Trinity College (1983), and Hobson's Fountain (1986). In 2004 he was commissioned to make linocuts of various literary figures for a new quarterly *Slightly Foxed* whose deadlines were much less arduous than *Punch's* would have been.

In 2018 Mark finally got round to producing a book of his own entitled *Poets Cornered* containing many of his literary linocuts as well as a number of his own parodies of some of his favourite bits of poetry. To his great surprise the book received a not unfriendly review in the *Times Literary Supplement* finally justifying his degree in English Literature of many years ago.

Poets Cornered appears to be described on the internet as unavailable but is actually still alive and well and should be available at various book shops including Heffers and G. David in Cambridge, the Fry Art Gallery in Saffron Walden and at the Lettering Arts Trust Gallery at Snape Maltings for £15.

Dear Girton Parish News

This glorious Autumn we have been enjoying has brought so many residents out to enjoy their gardens. Lawns have needed a cut well into October, flowers have gone on growing longer. Who ever heard of Nasturtiums flowering so late? Autumn Half Term used to be chilly with fireworks and roast potatoes round the seasonal festivities culminating in Bonfire Night.

We have to realise that this warm temperature is part of the climate crisis being considered at COP 26. How can we each use less fossil fuels to keep our houses warm? Can we afford to install better insulation in our houses or get our landlord to bring the dwelling up to a better level of energy efficiency? Can we afford to change our central heating from a gas boiler to air source heat pumps?

SCDC has done a great deal to improve their housing so we need to follow their lead. It is worth doing your own survey of your house with a camera that measures where the cold patches are with a thermal imaging camera. Then you can find out where the cold patches are and the source of draughts. The results will help decisions on what to do about our own contribution to cutting carbon emissions and bills for energy.

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GREEN FNGERS

In the two months since my last article, we have gone through extremes of conditions. Late summer heat gave us parched brown grass and iron-hard soil, nigh-on impossible to drive a spade or fork into; grey overcast chilly days, uninviting to venture out; then, almost alternately, the pleasant shirtsleeve weather of an autumn 'Indian Summer'. Most dramatic was the day which saw more than a month's rain in one day. All those inches of rain were quickly absorbed by the soil, leaving it ideal to work ever since. Two months with the sites being populated at times by no-one; other times by the hardy few; and on those Indian Summer days, lots of individuals, couples and families busying themselves with their chosen tasks.

Our contractor with his tractor-mower cut the paths and public areas in mid-October. Members have continued to cut their own paths where the contractor's machine cannot manoeuvre. Years ago, one would have said grass cutting ends for the season about now but now mowing seems to

continue right through the year. Warmer winters? Improved equipment? Greater dedication of gardeners?

Comparing notes with other members, I think it's correct to say that the closing season has been mixed in its successes and failures. A

largely cold spring got things off to a difficult start, germination of seeds being slow or not happening. Pandemic restrictions on activities afforded more time and many of us were tempted to fill our time with seed sowing too early. Seedlings were ready to go out into the soil either too early, or at the right time but over-grown.

However, in spite of weather and timings, we carried on with our productive hobby. Some types of crops produced as well or better than previous years. Other crops performed less abundantly than usual. I can't be specific because it is noteworthy that where one member succeeded with a crop, another failed; and vice versa with another vegetable. But on

the whole there were plenty of fresh naturally grown vegetables and fruit for our kitchens.

I will mention tomatoes, having wondered two months ago whether blight would ruin our

tomato plants and fruit. The outcome was mixed. Being an airborne fungus, there may be sheltered and exposed areas. Some growers had their tomatoes ruined by blight, harvesting

few or no fruits. Others (and I'm lucky to be included) had a blight-free summer and heavy crops. I think mine was my heaviest and tastiest tomato harvest ever.

Wandering around the site, the main activities are now clearing up; enriching and turning over the soil; renovation of buildings; general tidying ... in short, putting our plots to bed

for the winter. Not the whole picture: there are over-wintering crops such as leeks, Brussels sprouts and other brassicas. And now is that time of anticipation as we study seed catalogues and seed packets, letting our minds wander to next season.

At the end of September, the Society's AGM took place. (Last year's was

not held, for obvious reasons.) Thirty-two members attended. Reports from chairman, secretary, treasurer and lettings officer were presented and accepted. Our chairman and site manager, Malcolm Frew, came to the end of his tenure after 5 years. Malcolm worked unstintingly for the Society and no doubt will continue to do so. We thank him profusely. And we offer good wishes to his successor as site manager, Alison Giles.

The Society has become increasingly aware of and involved in environmental concerns over recent years. In October, members of a local scientific group spent a few days on site. Placing collecting receptacles around the site, they were gathering information on the flora and fauna present. In due course we shall be presented with their findings. I hope to

include some facts in a future article. Members are pleased that the Society is involved in the fast-growing national and international concern over nature and the environment.



Still going strong

GPN readers will be familiar with the clear and helpful gardening tips, written each month by George Thorpe. George was a plot holder and Society member; also Girton's tree expert and adviser. We were deeply saddened to learn of George's death in late October. A lovely friendly man. As I wrote of another member once, if you were feeling low, you couldn't help but be cheered up by meeting George.

Finally, the other day I took a shortcut across the allotment and was involved in four enjoyable conversations in those few hundred yards. It delayed my day, but in the most pleasant way. It reminded me of one of the benefits of being a member of the Allotment Society: the friendships and acquaintances one makes, and the wide range of subjects we chat about.

News from Girton Glebe Primary School

It has been such a busy halfterm at Girton Glebe and our pupils have worked so hard over the last 8 weeks,

producing some amazing learning. They have now completed their first topic since returning to school and, along with class teachers, thoroughly deserved their half-term rest!

Autumn Curriculum Events

We are so proud of the work that our pupils have completed this half-term having engaged with a range of amazing topics right across the school. We are equally proud of the curriculum that we offer at Girton Glebe and further details about its design and ethos can be found at https://girtonglebe.com/curriculum-introduction.

This half-term, our Year 5 and 6 children have been studying the conflicts of the First and Second World Wars and have studied texts such as 'Goodnight, Mr Tom' and 'War Horse' to base their own writing on. The Year 5 children even had a horse visit the school site as a stimulus for their writing and Year 6 children built some incredible Anderson shelters as part of their homework.

Our Year 4 children have been studying the geography of the USA, learning about key landmarks and cities and based their literature around The Indian in the Cupboard. Year 3 studied Rocks, Relics and Rumbles, built their own volcanoes and had a visit from a geologist who shared her expertise with an enthralled class of pupils!

In Key Stage 1, our Year 2 pupils studied a topic entitled 'Land Ahoy!' which covered map skills, the location of continents and oceans, knowledge about lifeguards and they also learnt about pirates! Year 1 based their topic on 'Supertato', a story by Paul Linnet and Sue Hendra. They learnt about real-life superheroes such as Rosa Parks and Martin Luther King Jr and explored themes of equality and human rights.

Class teachers have similarly engaging topics prepared for next half-term and I look forward to seeing the work that our pupils produce in the lead up to Christmas.

Early milestones at Dovehouse Court



With October offering seasonally good weather, the Barnes team working on Dovehouse Court were able to make good progress.

Following the installation of piling mats, the piling activity itself went smoothly and was completed in just six days, which was a much shorter time than originally envisaged.

Other developments have included the installation of site welfare portakabins for the staff and the creation of a car park area on-site, providing space for some vehicles to park off-road. Construction of the ground beams has also started.

In terms of health and safety, comprehensive risk assessments have been completed and regular 'Toolbox Talks' have taken place, briefing the team on-site on specific health and safety matters.

Ann Bonnett GTC Chair said: "Significant milestones have been achieved over the last month and it is good to see activities are being completed on – or even ahead of – schedule. The next few weeks will provide more visible developments, particularly with the installation of the timber frames, a key stage in the construction programme."

Dovehouse Court will provide 15 almshouses for Village residents over 55, living in or with a close connection to Girton, as well as a new office for GTC. All will be built to meet rigorous energy-efficient Passivhaus standards.

Gemma's Trust

"Before they call, I will answer, while they are still speaking, I will hear." Isaiah 65v24.

In this month of special remembrance of our national heroes, both living and departed, perhaps we can add our thankfulness also for those whose benevolence towards us has enriched our lives. It is always deeply moving to see our young service people gathered together to sing, "I vow to thee my country." The second verse takes us on to that other country that we may also serve here and now, wherever we reside.

Out in the bushlands, two nurses were battling to save the life of a young mother after childbirth. Sadly she could not survive, but her baby, tiny and vulnerable, had been safely delivered. Now the mission station had two more orphans under its care, a newborn infant and her three year old sister. Although the days were hot, the temperature dipped at night, so keeping the baby warm became a matter of concern. Reviewing the day at prayer-time, they added a hot water bottle to the urgently needed list. But who, in these parts could provide such an item?

Ten year old Gemma made another request. "Please Lord God, can we have a little doll to comfort the baby's sister?" A few days later, a jeep arrived to deliver a large postal package, from friends far away. Such gifts were received with great thankfulness and relief as they provided medical supplies, clothing, books, pencils and crayons for the children along with sweets.

All gathered round in happy anticipation as the box revealed its treasured contents. A cheer went up as a hot water bottle was lifted from the top, an unlikely gift in such a sun-soaked place. Gemma was expecting something else. Rummaging around, she finally emerged, eyes shining and with a triumphant smile, as she held aloft a beautifully dressed, baby doll. "I knew God would hear us," she laughed and skipped off to present the orphaned sister with her own special gift.

How could two such unlikely items come to be supplied with precision and perfect timing, even though the package had been in transit for some time? The answer lies in the relationship between our compassionate God and those who listen for his voice. This is not, for most of us, an audible voice sounding in our ears, but rather it is that 'still small voice' communicating in the mind and persistently nudging our thoughts in a direction of good consequences. There may be no sense of peace until the obedient disciple has acted upon the call, bringing the divinely planned blessing to both giver and receiver.


We are, after all, the body of Christ, still on earth, the hands and feet that facilitate God's intended purposes. When we discover that a plea or supplication has been answered through the generous provision of God and through our agency, then the joy is multiplied and faith strengthened. Trust and confidence are renewed by obedient service.

There is a crucial element in the process of following guidance. We need to know and recognise the Shepherd's voice. Jesus explained:

"When he (the shepherd) has brought out all his own (from the sheepfold) he goes on ahead of them, and the sheep follow him, because they know his voice." John 10v4.

A tourist once paid a shepherd to test this verse by exchanging clothes and calling to the sheep. Immediately, the sheep recognised the familiar tones of their carer and ran to him only. Listen to the still small voice, trust and obey.
