

## **Local parish elections 2022 – a new parish council** for Girton

It is pleasing to report that we received 14 submissions for nomination as candidates for election to the council. Taking account of the five current councillors who are not standing, this means we shall be welcoming seven new councillors in May.

The seven new councillors are Angela Blackburn, John Blom, Andrew Clare, Alison Giles, Nas Hayat, Stuart Marshall and Carolyn Wright. Further details can be found on the Girton Community Website.

This must in part be due to the considerable effort put into advertising the election on our website, in GPN and on social media. These channels have been invaluable in getting out information to the Girton Village Community. Thanks to our Vice Chair, Gill, and our Clerk, Yvonne, for this.

A massive thank you also to the five councillors who are standing down and have given great service to the council. The councillors stepping down are Julie Dashwood, Val Godby, Anne Kettle, Mary Rodger and John Thorrold.

### Oakington Road street lighting

The installation of the street lighting along Oakington Road has at last been completed and apart from improving the safety of pedestrians and cyclists, it really does reinforce the point that the area is an integral part of our village. Girton Parish Council is to adopt these street lights from 4th April.

### Girton recreation ground news

The climbing frame platforms have now been received after a delay from the suppliers due to COVID. These will be fitted over the next two weeks, making a significant improvement to this well-used recreation equipment.

## Girton recreation ground pavilion refurbishment update

Detailed costings for the pavilion refurbishment works were at last received from our contractors. Regrettably, they are significantly over budget and a meeting has explored how cost reductions can be achieved without substantial changes to the current design. Our task and finish group has met to consider whether redesign can achieve further significant savings without loss of benefit to users. We will table our ideas for discussion once we have a best price for the current design.

### Pavement resurfacing

We have received a number of complaints and comments concerning the quality and location of recent

pavement resurfacing in the village. We are exploring this with County Councillor Edna Murphy who has taken it up with highways officers. It appears the cosmetic 'top coating' of less worn pavements has taken priority over substantial repairs to those in extremely poor condition.

### **Bowls Club accessibility to toilet facilities**

Prior to the paragraph in May's Girton Parish News going to print we are working with Girton Town Charity and the Bowls Club to find a solution for the Bowls club to access toilet facilities. All three stakeholders will meet to explore all viable options and aim to identify a considered proposal on how to proceed.

### FROM OUR COUNCILLORS

### **County Councillor Edna Murphy**

Unfortunately we are no further forward in getting changes from Stagecoach, following their 'merger' of routes 5 and 6. They have not answered my questions but have offered to meet local representatives. Improving public transport in South Cambridgeshire is essential and there are a number of routes we have to deliver it, through harnessing funding and coordination from the Greater Cambridge Partnership, and also government funding to the region and sub region, which recently has failed to materialise. And Stagecoach needs to play its part too. So far it is slow progress but we will keep trying.

There have been a number of concerns in the village about poor quality highways maintenance and a woeful lack of information. There have been reports of poor quality footpath and road resurfacing ('porridge' like finishes), resurfacing notices that did not include resurfacing that was in fact scheduled, lack of notice given to residents of works to take place, a lack of logic in that some paths are resurfaced which seemed to be in reasonable condition, while others nearby which are in a worse state are left. Above all the lack of information to both residents and local councillors has left people wondering what is happening and reports of urgent matters requiring repair have not been responded to.

These concerns are serious and I have been working hard to try to get a change in what has been an established culture of opacity in the operations of the highways teams. There are a number of practical difficulties such as staffing shortages and turnover, and operating through a contractor, Milestone, which will have its own Brexit- and pandemic-driven workforce problems, as well as years of underfunding. Nonetheless, there has been some addition funding available at the end of the year, and it has been possible to move an additional £1.49m into Highways to provide more funding for urgent measures such as fixing potholes, as well as accelerating technological advances which should improve the evidence base and efficiency of many highways decisions. This funding should be spent in a relatively short space of time for maximum impact.

It will take time to turn the operation around, but I am confident that the message that the current situation, and perhaps most particularly the lack of information, is unacceptable and has been heard.

### Flying the flag for the Platinum Jubilee

With the Platinum Jubilee celebrations planned for the summer, many people will be thinking about installing a flagpole to fly the Union Flag. You will notice that I referred to the Union Flag rather than Union Jack - a flag is called a jack if it is flown at the bow of a ship, and an ensign if flown at the stern. When flown on land, our flag is always called the Union Flag.

One question that I am occasionally asked is whether planning permission is required to fly a flag. The Government has written a guide for householders and other organisations:

www.gov.uk/government/publications/flying-flags-a-plainenglish-guide

The guide is easy to misinterpret on the question of how high flagpoles can be. However, the legislation, the Town and Country Planning (Control of Advertisements) (England) Regulations 2007, is clear that size restrictions - flagpole no higher than 4.6m, flag no larger than 2 square metres - do not apply to the Union Flag.

The Flag Institute also maintain an authoritative guide: www.flaginstitute.org/wp/uk-flags/british-flag-protocol which also covers flag protocol and etiquette. For example, it is legal to fly a flag after sunset, but it has long been considered as a mark of disrespect.

### **Zero Carbon Communities Grants**

Parish councils and non-profit groups or organisations that are based in the district can apply for between £1,000 and £15,000 from the Zero Carbon Communities Grant scheme. Other groups, such as social enterprises and community interest companies can apply as part of a partnership led by a parish council or not-for-profit group. There is a total of £120,544 to be allocated under two categories.

The first category is for projects which reduce carbon emissions or lock up carbon in a measurable way such as low carbon, energy saving improvements to community buildings, or tree-planting initiatives. The second category is for community engagement projects which support and encourage lower carbon living. More information can be found at www.scambs.gov.uk/zerocarbongrant.

COVID-19 Additional Relief Fund (CARF): extra financial support for South Cambridgeshire businesses impacted by COVID

Businesses in South Cambridgeshire which have been adversely affected by the pandemic, but unable to access COVID-19 support linked to their business rates, may be eligible for the latest financial support.

The Government funding is to provide additional business rates relief to support rate-paying businesses affected by the pandemic between 1 April 2020 and 31 March 2021. Full details and eligibility criteria, along with an application form, can be found at <a href="https://www.scambs.gov.uk/CARF">www.scambs.gov.uk/CARF</a>. Applications will close on 13 May 2022. Rate relief will be paid on to Business Rates accounts as soon as possible.

### COVID-19

COVID is still with us. The infection rate in England, according to ONS, stands at 7.6% or 1 in 13 people, the

highest that it has ever been. 1 in 37 people are thought to be suffering from long COVID. So take care to protect yourselves and others, particularly those who are vulnerable. Vaccination, mask-wearing, social distancing and frequent hand washing are still the best way to avoid COVID.

#### **Bin collections**

COVID is still making it very challenging to run bin collections; over 40 of the workforce of 150 are away. Despite this it is the council's intention to continue green bin collection, but if your bin is not collected at the normal time please leave it out and we will pick it up as soon as we can.

### **Council Tax Rebate Scheme**

The government's Council Tax rebate scheme for homes in bands A-D went live on 1st April. FAQs are on the council website.

### Zero Carbon Award

South Cambridgeshire District Council has been recognised for its work to tackle climate change, with a Silver accolade at the 2022 Public Sector Transformation Awards.

#### **Better Connected Communities**

Councils are urging residents and community groups to use a new personalised service which will identify free tools and funding to tackle local problems and create safer communities in South Cambridgeshire. Groups can complete a short online form outlining the initiative they want to set up or the problem they want to solve, and Council staff will offer tailored solutions. ### **Zero Carbon Communities Grants**

South Cambridgeshire's community groups can now bid for a share of £120,000 from the District Council's Zero Carbon Communities Grant scheme. The scheme has so far provided £310,000 to 51 grassroots projects that work to tackle climate change in South Cambridgeshire. The deadline to apply for the latest round of grants is Wednesday 1 June 2022. For more information contact

### GPN - true or false?

Here at the *GPN* we regularly get asked questions about how we operate, how we are funded and how to get your content included. Hopefully, the following true or false style questions will help answer some of the most common ones

### 1. The GPN began as a church publication

True. The Girton Church Magazine started in 1941 but from its earliest days included far more than just church news. Over time it became known as the Girton Parish News and was published by St Andrew's PCC "on behalf of the whole village community" under an independent editorial group. It became a completely independent village magazine about 10 years ago.

### 2. The GPN has always been free

False. The January issue was always free but the other issues were subscription only (around £1.50 a year) until the mid-1990s. Gradually the advertising increased enough to allow it to be distributed free to everyone.

### 3 The GPN is linked to Girton Town Charity

False. *GPN* is completely independent of GTC which is a separate, charitable body run by trustees.

### 4 The GPN receives external funding

False. *GPN* has to be self-sustaining. Advertising is critical to the magazine's survival. The past two years have been financially challenging with the pandemic hitting advertising.

### 5 The size of the GPN is crucial

True. Printing costs are rising and if the *GPN* goes over 32 pages there is a significant cost implication. That means a tricky balancing act for the editor deciding what there is space for and what needs to be 'trimmed' as we will always try and be accommodating to new contributors.

6 Everyone who helps produce and distribute the *GPN* is a volunteer

True. The editor, committee members, typesetters, proof-readers, distributors and everyone else involved, all give of their time freely, alongside their regular employment and personal commitments.

### 7 The GPN looks the same as it always has

False. It has changed considerably since 1990. The previous editor, Angela Blackburn, was keen to broaden the content and steered *GPN's* transformation to today's lively, colour version, winning several magazine awards in recent years.

construction area. The children have been exploring the area, building with the bricks, measuring and using the tools to fix everything at preschool!

We've also had some great covered areas built outside at preschool which have been a welcome addition. It means we can have more activities outside that are protected from the elements.



Our rising 5s have been learning about the body and being healthy this half term. We made life size body outlines by drawing around the children, then labeled one with external body parts and added organs, blood, bones and muscles to others. We also learnt about the importance of teeth cleaning and about sugar in our foods.

"Faith, hope and charity": thus runs a line from 1 Corinthians Chapter 13. I'm going to alter the trio to "Faith, hope and patience" and make it my text for May's Allotment Society article. Sowing and tending of seeds is my theme.

It's pretty certain that greenhouses, conservatories, window ledges and other sunlit warm domestic surfaces of Allotment Society members throughout Girton are bursting at the seams with, and covered in, trays and pots of sown and germinating seeds. Also, a certain amount of seed has already been committed to the as-yet inhospitable soil. (I write on April 11th).

Sowing can be considered as requiring two of St Paul's virtues and the other I have added.

Faith: our vegetable seeds range from fine-as-dust, such as lettuce and carrots; larger but still tiny such as tomatoes; pinhead size such as cabbage and sprouts; gnarled woody ones such as beetroot; easy to handle such as climbing and dwarf beans. All of them are put into pots and trays of compost; we attempt to get right the packets' instructions on depth from "on the surface" to "one inch deep". It crosses our minds: can these survive in the damp darkness of the compost? Will anything come of them? We've seen germination in the past; seed packets say "seedlings will appear in 7-14 days". And we proceed in faith.

Hope: the trays and pots are laid out and arranged (sometimes to partners' protestations). The period of hope begins. Hope which causes us to examine the compost surfaces much too early, longing to see the first tiny green tips appear. We think of our plots, working out where rows of different vegetables will be planted out or where to erect supporting canes. And we hope... hope that there will result from our sowings and tending; that there will be strong, healthy plants, ready to fill our plots in due time, late May, early June.

Patience: to alter St Paul again: the hardest of these is patience. As I have written before (and failed to observe), we must resist sowing too early and finding we have overgrown plants before the dangers of frosts are over (I think I've lost my precious sweet peas thus). Did two years of enforced inactivity instil a desire to do things?

Patience must sustain us as anxiously we scan our as-yet blank compost surfaces, almost willing shoots to appear, persuading ourselves that a fleck of something may be a growing tip. And it is essential to maintain patience in diligently tending our potential successes of later in the season. Are the moisture levels right? Are we placing trays in the best place for warmth? Should we afford protection tonight against frost? Patience everyone!

In the first two months there have been 89 tweets and replies, and a further 85 retweets sent. Likes and retweets have come from luminaries such as local author Robert McFarlane, and organisations such as the Woodland Trust, The Botanical Society of Britain & Ireland, and Froglife.

Some highlights from the first two months include:



April 1st

This is Ground Ivy. Not a true 'ivy' at all it is more closely related to mint. It was used in beer brewing before Hops became utilised. Still used for medicinal purposes and as a foraged herb in cooking (warning, it can be bitter!)



After dark a host of animals are active in our gardens and open spaces. Now is a good time to look for frogs, toads, and newts, particularly if you have a pond nearby. Other animals active after dark include Tawny Owls, mammals (deer, foxes, mice and bats)



and invertebrates. The BTO has an article on what to look for *https://bit.ly/3IIHZk1*. So get out there – we have nothing to lose but our fear of the dark!

### March 10th

Lichens are strange, wonderful organisms. They are a mix of fungi and algae. They are found on trees, rocks, stone (churchyards are great for them) and soil, and their presence is a good indicator of air quality. Find out more at https://bit.ly/3CqfSUe





March 13th

'He rises and begins to round, He drops the silver chain of sound' It was too windy to record the Skylarks at Manor Farm yesterday. But rest assured they're there – singing their hearts out.

## Small yellow beauties that come to please...

It is with a mixture of surprise and joy that we have regularly greeted a family of Yellowhammers to our garden on the south of the village recently. I sometimes wonder if there is a rota for the appearance of

less common visitors.

When we first moved in, it was a family of Reed Buntings which after a year or two moved on, to be replaced by the splendidly decked out Bullfinches who have stepped aside for a new special guest.

More common on farmland and bushy heaths, the yellowhammer was historically called the Yellow Bunting, its common name perhaps derived from the German word for a Bunting - 'Ammer'. The old Norfolk name was Guler, itself probably originating in the Anglo-Saxon word for yellow, *geolu*.

Regardless of nomenclature, for the novice without a reference book or the time to load a smartphone app, it looks the kind of small bird you normally see in the garden but a lot more yellow - the male has an unmistakable bright yellow head. Many books render the call as "a-little-bit-of-bread-and-no-cheeeeeeeee" but I think it would be more fun to make up your own way of remembering it, their calls hopefully continuing to fill the air throughout spring.

### Letter to the GPN

Dear GPN,

Many thanks to our elected representatives! Thornton Road now has had its many potholes mended with a proper half road width strip of tarmac at the top near Girton Road. Down near Huntingdon Road the strips are narrower but certainly much more likely to last a year than the little hand-filled patches of the last few seasons. Now cyclists are not taking their lives in their hands riding along these two sections and there should be fewer people cycling on the pavements. A great improvement.

Thank you also to householders who have cut back their hedges so the pavement is wider allowing two adults to walk side by side in a companionable and supportive way. Our hedgerows are full of sparrows and other birds as well as looking good, but it is pleasant to be able to walk together along our pavements without getting muddy or wet feet in winter.

Next, we look forward in Thornton Road to those same elected representatives causing yellow lines to be drawn along the sides of both ends of the road to stop visiting cars using these stretches as an informal 'Park and Ride' for a day, indeed sometimes for several days and nights on end.

After these achievements, the final greatest aim is to have a 20mph limit for all the 'Thorntons' area and Girton Road on the City side of the bridge. Then we will be on a par with the rest of Girton. That really would be a great achievement in improving road and pedestrian safety in this pleasant residential area.

### **Every word counts**

In April's GPN edition, the editorial team helpfully rectified some common misconceptions about the publication and one of the points made really resonated with me. Our GPN is run by volunteers and is free to residents therefore advertising is crucial and column space for articles is at a premium. I am extremely grateful for the opportunity to now have a regular feature in the GPN and endeavour to make every word count.

And sometimes, in any case, less is more! This relates so well to the role of a Mental Health First Aider where the words we use are not as important as the words we listen to. People often worry about what to say to someone who may be unhappy, upset or even distressed. Training in either Mental Health or Suicide First Aid, really emphasises the skills of open-ended questioning, reflective/mirroring phrases and silence. I know from the feedback from people I have supported, that the opportunity to have someone truly present and listening without interrupting, without needing to 'find out more' and without solving the problem, is actually rare and is definitely appreciated.

www.moodpanda.com is an app-based platform allowing people to track their moods. This can be helpful in drawing out patterns and in supporting how we communicate our mood/feelings to those around us.

### May wine selections

As we look forward to brighter weather and longer days in this the queen of months, here are my selections for a merry May!

### Koshu wine: the perfect accompaniment for Japanese food



Although Japan is best-known for its saké, in recent years, the quality of Japanese wine, particularly white wine, has improved enormously. The most common grape variety used for white wine in Japan is Koshu. The wines are subtle and delicate, with citrus aromas and fresh, fruity flavours.

This **Château Mercian**, **Koshu**, **Iwasaki 2019** wine is a smooth, medium-bodied wine

with refreshing acidity, a creamy mouthfeel, and a lengthy finish. With floral notes and aromas of lemon, yuzu and vanilla on the nose, and flavours of pear, peach and almonds on the palate, it is an elegant wine that expresses the unique characteristics of the Koshu grape very well. It's a perfect match for sushi and sashimi, and other light Japanese dishes. Available from Frazier's Wine Merchants - £21.99



### A local wine from Suffolk

For something from a vineyard a little closer to home, this **St Edmundsbury Pinot Noir 2020** is from Giffords Hall near Long Melford in Suffolk. The vineyard was planted on the site of an ancient glacial riverbed about 30 years ago and several grape varieties, including Madeleine Angevine, Bacchus, Pinot Noir, and Pinot Blanc flourish in the

sandy, clay soil here. This Pinot Noir 2020 is a little gem. With aromas of bramble and blackberry on the nose, and flavours of plum, strawberry and rhubarb on the palate, this is a smooth, well-balanced wine with medium tannins and a lengthy finish. An attractive and appealing wine that pairs well with duck or a Sunday roast. Available from Grape Britannia - £15.99

### A mountain wine from Savoie

North, south, east or west, wherever you are in France, you are never too far from a wine-producing area. Even in the Alpine region of Savoie (Savoy), where the fresh, light, aromatic white wines made from the Jacquère grape are well-worth seeking out.

Vineyards in the region are often planted on mountain slopes between 250m and 550m, where they benefit from a warm microclimate and the moderating effects of nearby rivers and lakes. Although the Savoie region produces a mere 0.5% of French wines, it certainly punches above its size.



The **Domaine Jean Perrier and Fils 'Altus' 2020, Savoie** has aromas of blossom, apple and pear on the nose, and flavours of pear, apricot and honey on the palate. This is a crisp, refreshing wine with high acidity and a hint of minerality in the finish, and you can feel the freshness of the mountain air as you taste the wine. A perfect match for fondue, goat's cheese or a seafood dish. Available from Majestic - £13.99

### Positive progress in a challenging year

by Ann Bonnett, Chair of Girton Town Charity

Girton Town Charity has continued to steer a very busy programme with a major new almshouse project underway at Dovehouse Court, the completion of Suffolk Terrace and the welcoming of its first residents, managing activities at the William Collyn Community Centre in response to rapidly changing COVID-19 guidance and administering the wide range of Schemes and Grants which help a wide range of Village residents.

There have also been changes to our team of Trustees and the need for flexibility in the day-to-day running of the Charity, with virtual meetings and a temporary relocation of GTC Office.

This summary is extracted from the report prepared for the Parish Council's Annual Meeting in May.

### **Trustees**

There are normally seven Trustees who serve five year terms; five are currently appointed by Girton Parish Council (GPC) and two by the Board of Trustees. We were delighted to make two GTC appointments during the year, with Dan Buck joining us In December 2020 and Andrew Muston in July 2021. We are currently looking for at least one new Trustee and we always welcome expressions of interest from residents of the Village.

### **Charity Office and Administration**

Following the demolition of 22 High Street, GTC Office moved to the Parish Office at 42 Church Lane and remained operational throughout lockdown thanks to the efficiency of our Administrators, Mrs Rachel Allchorne and Mrs Gilly O'Brien.

### **Trustees' Meetings**

The Trustees met virtually ten times between 1st July 2020 and 30th April 2021 to consider the regular business of the Charity, in addition to participating in an Extraordinary Meeting and two Strategy Meetings.

The period saw some financial market volatility which had an adverse impact on GTC funds. It was necessary to rebalance funds to cover running costs at the William Collyn Community Centre in the light of reduced income

during lockdowns, almshouse maintenance and donations to organisations based outside Girton which make general provisions for the residents of the Village.

### **Almshouses**

The Charity currently has 13 almshouses within Girton, occupied by residents over 55 and families from the community. Over 55's and

anyone with a registered disability are appointed as permanent residents; families are appointed for three years. All are managed on the Charity's behalf by the CHS Group, based in Histon.

### **Suffolk Terrace**

Three new family homes at Suffolk Terrace on the High Street were completed and ready for occupation in April 2021 and the successful applicants moved in on threeyear appointments.

### **Dovehouse Court**

The major project to redevelop the central almshouse site on High Street, has continued through the year and once completed, will provide a mix of bungalows and apartments for people over the age of 55, as well as a new office for GTC, all built to stringent Passivhaus standards.

The Trustees applied for a grant of £675,000 towards the building of these homes from Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority which was successful.

### **CarePlus Grant Scheme**

This Scheme helps Girton residents to live independently in their own homes by providing additional short-term care to suit their needs over and above any statutory care to which they are entitled, including assistance on returning from hospital. Requests for help are made by referral from GP, Social Worker, Age UK Warden or Older Residents' Co-ordinator or other Healthcare professional. During the period 41 residents benefitted from CarePlus.

### **Educational Grant Scheme**

This helps with the costs of buying books and equipment for study in further and higher education; some apprenticeships and similar qualifications at NVQ Level 4 or above. Claims totalling no more than £300 per Academic Year may be made for up to four years of study. 31 Educational Grants were awarded during the year.

### **Hospital Taxi Scheme**

This helps people go by taxi to outpatient appointments at Addenbrooke's Hospital the Rosie or Royal Papworth Hospital and some of the pandemic-designated satellite outpatients clinics, when alternative transport is not practical. The Trustees continue to be grateful to Nelsons and Wendy Barret for supporting this Scheme.

The Scheme operates a 'membership year' with a single annual renewal date on 1st April.

### **Prescription Delivery Service**

Run by the pharmacist at the GP practice serving Girton, the Prescription Delivery Service is available for patients who live within the Pepys Way dispensing area and are unable, through reasons of incapacity, to collect dispensed medicines from the Pepys Way or Huntingdon Road Surgeries.

### **Youth Project with Connections Bus Project**

During 2021 the Trustees investigated options to offer a Youth Group from a new provider and in December 2021, were pleased to award the Connections Bus Project a grant to commence a weekly youth group as soon as recruitment of the necessary staff and the pandemic allowed.

## Cambridge Citizens Advice Bureau and Relate Counselling Service

Face to face meetings at the William Collyn Centre were paused during the pandemic. Both CAB and Relate continued to provide services via online resources and virtual meetings and a range of services have been provided to help residents.

### **Age UK Activities**

GTC supports two Age UK activities. In the Community Warden Scheme, Fiona provides full-time cover with support from Jane to more than 20 villagers who subscribe. As Older Residents' Co-ordinator, Patricia has worked on a number of initiatives to broaden provision and participation in a variety of activities across the Village.

### Grants to external charities

GTC supports charitable organisations outside the Village with grants based on the number of Girton participants in their activities including Arthur Rank Hospice, Cam Sight, Cambridgeshire Headway, Cogwheel Trust, East Anglia Children's Hospice, Kings Junior Voices and Macmillan.

### **Grants to local schools**

Girton Glebe Primary School has received substantial grants for intervention, educational enrichment activities, provision of wrap-around support for the children of families-in-need and funding of school trips that could not be met by the families of the children concerned.

### **Grants to individuals**

Grants to individuals are given to cover costs such as modest fees for activities that were otherwise unaffordable, support for those in need of respite breaks and contributions towards household items such as support chairs, cookers, fridge/freezers and beds. In the year to date, 17 grants were made to individuals.

### **Future Focus**

The COVID-19 pandemic has brought many changes to all sections of our community and going forwards, our Trustees will be focusing on the new landscape and how best to support Girton residents.

This will run alongside other important projects such as Dovehouse Court to ensure that we can future proof our provision with truly affordable housing that many of our residents need.

I'd like to thank all our Trustees for their huge contribution and also our Administrators who support us and run the office so efficiently. We can't predict what challenges lie ahead but GTC is in a strong position, with a skilled, experienced and committed team to find the right solutions for us.

Girton Town Charity exists for purposes which include the relief of need in Girton, either individually or collectively, or the support of any charitable purpose for the benefit of the inhabitants of Girton.

# Girton Baptist Church Growing Believing Communities

### **Breath of life**

By the genius of modern space technology, we have been able to listen to the sound of the Martian wind as it streams across the Red Planet. The BBC also enabled us to compare the quality of sound transmission through the atmosphere of Mars, with the same sounds transmitted on our own planet Earth.

The clarity and stability of sound passing along Earth's airwaves was strikingly superior to that of Mars. The exercise highlighted the enormous benefits we take for granted in our shared conversations, music, information and broadcasts.

So many beautiful sounds reach us on the wind and lift our spirits. The woods throng with the chirping of nesting birds. The Alpine shepherds hear each other call across the valley. The lost lamb bleats and is heard by its mother. The sound of rushing water bids the traveller to come and be refreshed.

The breath of life that reaches us in myriads of ways enables us to function, communicate and connect. Now we are looking to the power of the wind to provide the energy we need for our complex existence. Not that harvesting of wind power is new. Pictures of colourful windmills turning their great sails amidst glorious swathes of tulips create perfect, iconic images

Nowadays, huge turbines stand sentinel on the hillsides and around our shores. Necessity has awakened us to finding solutions in the great force that has been a historical change-maker in the works of mankind. We can marvel again at the all-encompassing provision designed into this place we call home.

The Greek and Roman theatre players noted the benefits of building a stage where the prevailing wind would carry voices towards the audience ranked in tiers before them.

When Jesus was pressed by a great throng eager to hear his ministry, it was recorded that he stepped into a boat a short distance from the shore and began to teach. His was the significant voice that astonished the disciples as it calmed the raging wind and stormy sea, yet was so gentle with a sick child or a grieving widow.

It was this same voice that made sense of national life with illustrative stories conveying divine wisdom, and brought the revelation of Good News that God's love reaches out of eternity to embrace all who came to him by faith.

When Jesus finally called from the cross, "It is finished", he was not simply conveying that his earthly ministry, as they had known it was to cease. He was assuring those present and all the generations still to come, that the work of redemption was complete, and their debt was paid. Jesus was, in the full vigour of manhood, giving up his life and his voice, to usher in the new era of forgiveness, peace with God, and eternal life.

How do we recognise that voice nowadays amidst the clamour of sounds demanding attention, distracting and competing? Sometimes it is in the powerful oratory of a preacher addressing a vast gathering of souls, or in the hush of whispered guidance, or a message of loving concern and support. It is through our voices now that God conveys his challenging wisdom, his loving care here and now and assurance for the final journey home.

Oh breath of Life come sweeping through us Revive your Church with life and power Oh breath of Life come cleanse, renew us And fit your Church to meet this hour. Psalm 40 in the Bible, penned by King David, has been set to music many times over the centuries. It expresses prayer uttered by the Psalmist, and answered by the God who hears. Today there are hymns ancient and modern based on this Psalm, especially the first three verses. The Psalmist is in deep trouble, like being stuck in a slimy pit or in mud and mire, and he is unable to help himself. He patiently cries out to God who answers him, and sets his feet on a rock, in a firm place to stand. As a result the Psalmist has a new song of praise in his mouth, to God who rescued him. It is no doubt intentional that the exact circumstances of the Psalmist are unknown, so the Psalm can be applied to many situations.

Charles Hutcheson was a 19<sup>th</sup> century merchant from Glasgow and amateur musician. He wrote a hymn, the words of which closely follow Psalm 40:

- 1. I waited for the Lord my God, and patiently did bear; at length to me he did incline my voice and cry to hear.
- 2. He took me from a fearful pit, and from the miry clay, and on a rock he set my feet, establishing my way.
- 3. He put a new song in my mouth, our God to magnify: many shall see it, and shall fear, and on the Lord rely.

During World War II the Christian Corrie ten Boom spent time in a concentration camp for helping Jews escape from the holocaust. She later said, echoing Psalm 40, "There is no pit so deep that God's love is not deeper still."
