Thank you to everyone for looking out for our cat and your kind messages. He was taken in March from Thornton Road, but thankfully has now been found.



A big thank you to the Parish Council and all the people who helped to make the Jubilee celebrations such a success.

Transport consultations

There are a number of transport consultations currently underway.

The Local Transport and Connectivity Plan hosted by the mayor and the combined authority. This preliminary stage of consultation is meant for stakeholders including parish councils; a wider public consultation will follow. The consultation is broken into geographic areas; for us this is 'Greater Cambridge,' meaning Cambridge and South Cambs. Closing date is 4 August.

A new road Classification for Cambridge hosted by the Greater Cambridge Partnership. This seeks to reset the current road network and allow different modes of transport along different streets, including transport for people with impaired mobility. Closing 18 July

Cambourne to Cambridge seeking to provide public and active travel connection from 'C2C'. This may be of interest if you have connections in Cambourne. Support for people who are struggling to pay for essential items, food and utility bills will continue in Cambridgeshire after an extension of the Household Support Fund. In March the Government announced the extension of the scheme, awarding Cambridgeshire an additional £3.58m to support children, families and pensioners. The County Council will be offering the following schemes:

- * £1.96m for provision of food vouchers with a value of £15 per child per week, for the 2022 May half term and summer holidays. Schools and child-care settings, including childminders, will be contacted directly and eligible parents will be notified.
- * £1.2m to support households with a person who has reached state pension age by 30/9/2022 and in financial hardship.
- * A boost for other services supporting those in need https://www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/residents/coronavirus/household-support-fund

Boiler upgrade scheme opens

The government has announced their new £450m Boiler Upgrade Scheme is open for grant applications and payments. Homeowners can benefit from grants to fit clean heating systems when they come to replace their oil and gas boilers, including systems installed from 1 April this year. The scheme will improve the energy efficiency of homes, reduce energy bills and cut emissions. The scheme runs

over three years from 2022-2025, and property owners will be able to get:

£5,000 off installation of an air source heat pump £5,000 off installation of a biomass boiler £6,000 off installation of a ground source heat pump





Sunday June 12th, 5.15pm. I have shut the gates at the close of the Allotments Annual Open Day. There are never great numbers of visitors. No doubt the other dozen open gardens are superficially more attractive, giving expectations of showy herbaceous borders and rustic designs. However, my several pleasant conversations with appreciative visitors suggested they were impressed with the activities and diverse things to see around the allotment site.

Our primary purpose is to grow vegetables and fruits. And on the whole our plants are not showy ... almost 100% greenery (there are exceptions like the beautiful courgette flowers). But over the years, the site has become a considerably more diverse and colourful place. Finished for this season were swathes of daffodils, tulips, bluebells, cow parsley. Walking around this month, one admires so many 'garden' plants: Californian poppies (childhood memories of sliding off the wizard's hat caps to release the petals?), foxgloves, marigolds, sweet peas, oriental poppies, irises, peonies, cranesbill, sweet williams. Standing and watching, so



pleasing to see myriads of pollinators burrowing in and out of the flower heads. And just as lovely, great clumps of wild blue-flowered borage,

and of green alkanet (with its blue flowers!). Many more I can't identify. And also, of course, the now-established wild flower area. Coming later in the year will be dahlias, cosmos and much more. Yes, the allotment site is a diverse beautiful place and where we benefit from our primary aim, home-grown vegetables.

I was recently given a book, Weeds: The Beauty and Uses of 50 Vagabond Plants. I think the author used my plot for his research; I seem to have every one of them except (thankfully) Japanese knotweed. It was an opinion changer. The term 'weed' is so pejorative, causing us to declare war. But learning their habits, their uses, often their beauty, I'm now happy to see them around the margins of my plot. Incidentally, the book contains beautiful old-fashioned botanical drawings.

I've concentrated on plants. No space to talk about the fascinating birdlife. But a little story. I was unchoking the raspberry bushes of bindweed when a great spotted woodpecker hopped from the bindweed jungle onto the grass. Small and bewildered, clearly a baby, it retreated to its hideaway but re-emerged more distressed. A par-

ent suddenly swooped down and ushered the baby into a nearby hedge. I know no more. I hope there was a happy ending.



I ought to mention our crops.

I worry about generalising because members' experiences vary widely. But gathering reports, the consensus is that it is a difficult year and members are enduring disappointment with some crops. A wide range of poor germination, second sowings often necessary. Plants put out onto the plots not 'taking off' and remaining sickly. Bad infestations of blackfly. I heard the sad tale today of a member who picked all his pea crop and was able to freeze a weight of peas about equal to the weight he sowed. We discuss all this and come to no particular conclusion!

Wild Girton

At Wild Girton we have always been fascinated with the historical and regional names for birds – and their origins. Here we collect together a few of the various names for some of our favourite garden birds.

The once ubiquitous *House*

Sparrow has a long association with people in the UK as denoted by the term Sparrow dating back to the Old English 'sparwa'. Many (similar) regional names for the bird include Spadger, Sprog, and Spuggy. Its connection with London is reflected in the term Cockney Sparra usually applied to the more cheeky denizens of that fair(?) City.

Historically, Britain's national bird the Robin was more usually known by another name *Redbreast* in these islands. The term *Robin* - an affectionate alternative to the name Robert was co-joined with Redbreast some time in the 15th century and has remained an alternative to the shortened form ever since. It follows an English fashion for applying people's names to birds e.g. Jenny to Wren, and Martin to Swift and House Martin.

Our feeder aficionados, the *Blue* and *Great Tits*, were along with other members of the tit family grouped historically under the generic term *Titmouse*. Strangely, this has nothing to do with our diminutive mammal but derives from the Middle English term *tit* - for any small creature and Saxon mose -curiously meaning the same. Blue Tits have been variously known as Tom Tit, Betty Tit, Pickcheese (Norfolk) and Tinnock. The latter two imitative of its song.

Similarly regional names for Great Tit derived from interpretations of its call. We often represent this now as teacher teacher but to our forbears' ears this sounded like saws being sharpened. Hence we had *Sharp-Saw* (Norfolk), Sawfinch, Saw-Sharpener, Saw-Whet as alternative names as well as Sit-Ye-Down, Black-Capped Billy, and Black-Headed Bob.

Blackbirds were often historically known as Ouzels, which in turn derives from the High German Amsel – which means Blackbird. The name Ouzel survives today in the form of the mountain blackbird found on our Northern and Western uplands - the Ring Ouzel. Other names for Blackbird include Blackie, Colly (meaning: coal-like), and Cock Ouzel.

Earlybirds WI

At our June meeting Dr Neil Dickinson gave us a concise insight into the history of nuclear physics - a subject not easily disseminated to those nonscientists among us. Towards the end of

the 19th century, when many thought

'physics was all sorted out', Ernest Rutherford emerged in New Zealand, winning a scholarship to Cambridge in 1895. He worked and studied at the Cavendish Laboratory, initially working with Joseph John Thomson who in 1897 discovered the electron. Rutherford returned to Cambridge after WWI as the Cavendish professor and moved into Newnham Cottage on Oueens Road.

His career was one of hard work, ideas and frustration, but he won a Nobel prize for chemistry and earned a knighthood. He believed he had 'touched the ghost of matter' and is often referred to as the father of nuclear physics.

On July 9 we are having a stall at Girton Feast Week. There is no formal meeting in August but we will be meeting for coffee and a chat on Girton Rec on a couple of Fridays. Then on September 9 we will hear from Brenda Horton on 'Operation Christmas Child shoe boxes'.

Providing Housing For Village Residents

Girton Town Charity's remit is to relieve the needs of Village residents and one of the key ways it achieves this is by funding the provision of almshouses. It currently has 13 properties, with a further 15 under construction at Dovehouse Court.

Girton Town Charity's remit is to relieve the needs of Village residents and one of the key ways it achieves this is by funding the provision of almshouses. It currently has 13 properties, with a further 15 under construction at Dovehouse Court.

Legal arrangement

Almshouses are let as unfurnished homes with one, two or three bedrooms and are subject to different legal arrangements from private, council or housing association tenancies.

Support and assistance is also provided to enable appointees to look at the options available which include Housing Associations and private rental. Appointees are also encouraged to remain on the SCDC Homelink list.

Residents are 'appointees', not 'tenants', live in the house under licence and pay a maintenance contribution, not rent. As they are almshouses, there is no 'right-to-buy' or opportunity for shared equity.

Vacancies, when they occur, are advertised locally and Girton residents can apply and are interviewed. Decisions are made on the basis of a wide range of criteria including an interview.

Residency

With almshouses, residency for under 55's is limited to a maximum of three years. Over 55's or in the case of disability, appointments are made for as long as the resident is able to live independently.

All residents sign a Letter of Appointment which clearly states the terms and conditions of residency, including the length of the tenancy

End of the residency

For three year appointments residents receive a reminder notice several months ahead of the end of their residency which outlines the next steps they must take to look for alternative housing. Almshouse charities are the oldest form of social housing in this country, providing accommodation to those in need. Today over 36,000 people live in almshouses in the UK.

Building project gathers pace

Over the past few weeks, the Barnes Construction team has continued to make positive progress in the construction programme at Dovehouse Court.

A topcoat of render has been applied to the front and gable end elevations, carpenters have started work on the guttering and roofing detail around the staircore / bikestore roof and internally, the dryliners have continued with the first fix on the ground floor rooms. Plastering works have been completed in the bungalows and the first mist coat of paint has been applied.

Ann Bonnett, Chair of GTC said: "Following our Topping Out a few weeks ago, the focus has now switched to the internal aspects of the build at Dovehouse Court which are progressing well. We are still on track for completion before the end of the year."

July wine selections

Three refreshing white wines to savour as spring gives way to summer and we look forward to warmer, sunnier July weather.



Plaimont Côtes de Gascogne Colombard Sauvignon Blanc 2020 (France)

A crisp, refreshing wine with pleasantly perfumed aromas, this Plaimont 2020 is a classic Gascony blend of Colombard and Sauvignon Blanc grapes. Pale lemon in colour, it has apple, honeysuckle and pineapple on the nose, and

lemon, lime, melon and peach on the palate. With medium acidity and a lengthy finish, it is a well-balanced wine offering very good value for money.

Enjoy it as an aperitif, or paired with fish, or goat cheese. Available from **Sainsbury's** (£8)



Chilford Hall Vineyard Legacy 2019 (Cambridgeshire)

Set amongst the rolling chalk hills of the Cambridgeshire downs, Chilford Hall Vineyard in Linton is one of the oldest established vineyards in England. The Müller-Thurgau and Schönburger grapes used in

this blend were the first grape varieties planted on the estate.

An off-dry wine with fresh acidity, the Legacy has aromas of apple, honeysuckle and peach on the nose, and lime, pineapple and green apple on the palate. A refreshing, well-balanced wine, it can be drunk by itself or paired with a fish or chicken dish.

Available from Grape Britannia (£9.95)



Porta 6 Branco 2020 (Portugal)

Produced from grapes grown in vineyards close to the Atlantic Ocean, this is a fresh, fruity wine with plenty of personality. Aromas of blossom, lemon, apple and pear on the nose lead to more stone fruit flavours of peach and apricot on the palate.

Medium-bodied with lively acidity and a hint of minerality, this is fine by itself or with a seafood or pasta dish. This is a good quality wine at this price. Available from Tesco and Sainsbury's (£7-£7.50)

Come for the Feast

The swiftly turning pages of the calendar have returned us once again to the summer festivities of village feasts. As in many communities across the land, we come together with friends and neighbours for a time of fun and celebration, sharing food and taking part in organized events and competitions.

Feasting as a custom is as old as humanity itself, when rituals were honoured, deals done and sealed, crafts displayed and exchanged, and resources shared with goodwill, peace and hope. Monarchs used feasting as a means of displaying sumptuous wealth and power. Generous hospitality softened the hard edge of negotiation to avoid potential conflict and merriment mixed with diplomacy encouraged the arrangement of trade deals and advantageous marriages.

For the industrial heartlands, this was the allotted time to down tools and enjoy holiday relaxation. In agricultural communities, it denoted acknowledgement of mutual labour resulting in thanksgiving for harvest crops seasonally ripening.

In the Old Testament, there is a remarkable account of how the beautiful Queen Esther used exquisite diplomacy and invitations to feasts to expose a murderous plot of genocide. Having learned of the plan of Haman, the honoured adviser to King Ahasuerus, to dispose of all the Jewish families in the kingdom, Esther needed both courage and great wisdom to secure the King's favour and approval to reverse the sovereign decree.

Feast times often serve as a marker of historical events, so that each succeeding generation will keep the record with purpose and unity. The seven feasts of Jehovah were instituted for the spiritual journey of the Children of Israel as yearly landmarks of remembrance. Beginning with the sacrifice of the Passover lamb, followed immediately by the Feast of Unleaven Bread, the deliverance from slavery in Egypt is still marked each year with joy and thanksgiving.

The Feast of Firstfruits was kept on the morrow after the Sabbath when the land of Promise had been reached with its abundance of wheat, barley, vines, fig trees and pomegranates. The first sheaf of grain was brought as a symbol of thanksgiving before the Lord God. Leviticus ch.23 lists the remaining feasts as Pentecost, or the Feast of Weeks when two loaves baked from fine flour were presented to the priest followed by all the sweet savour sacrifices including the sin offering.

Following an interval denoting the passing of six months, there comes the Feast of Trumpets, for resting, then the Day of Atonement and Feast of Tabernacles, when the labours and cares of life were put aside. The people made booths of the boughs of trees and entered into a time of joy and rejoicing for grace, mercy and provision.

We have fresh memories now of Jubilee celebrations and street feasts that were enjoyed with colourful pageantry and neighbourly goodwill.

When Jesus celebrated the Passover Feast before the time of his atoning death and subsequent rising, he urged his disciples to "keep the feast till I return."

This sabbath remembrance marks the dedication of his modern day disciples to keep fresh the giving of Jesus Christ as our Redeemer.

The Apostle Paul wrote (1 Corinthians 5v7,8)

"Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us; therefore let us keep the feast, not with old leaven, neither with the leaven of malice and wickedness, but with the unleaven bread of sincerity and truth."

"Then within His home He led me Brought me where the feast is spread Made me eat with Him my Father I, who begged for bondsman's bread Not a suppliant at His gateway But a son within His home, To the love, the joy, the singing

The hymn 'What a Friend We Have In Jesus' was written by Joseph Scriven in about 1855. It seems that the words were first composed as a personal poem from Scriven to his elderly and ailing mother when he lived far away from her. Unlike other hymns Scriven wrote, it is tender and comforting in its use of language, indicating the personal nature of this hymn. Scriven himself suffered tragedy in his life. His first fiancée drowned accidently the evening before their wedding, and his second fiancée also died of an illness shortly before their wedding. The hymn therefore was born on the anvil of life's hard blows, and it offers hope:

What a friend we have in Jesus All our sins and griefs to bear What a privilege to carry Everything to God in prayer Oh, what peace we often forfeit Oh, what needless pain we bear All because we do not carry Everything to God in prayer *Have we trials and temptations?* Is there trouble anywhere? We should never be discouraged Take it to the Lord in prayer Can we find a friend so faithful Who will all our sorrows share? Jesus knows our every weakness Take it to the Lord in prayer

The answer to the rhetorical questions asked in this hymn (in verse 2, and other verses) is to, "Take it to the Lord in prayer". Some have rightly pointed out that Scriven's poetry is not of the highest quality. However, the message of this hymn is understood by all and it has encouraged the hearts of countless people for over 160 years, and it continues to do so.


