Girton Parish Council

This month we wish to say a big thank you to Angela Blackburn and Marcelo de Lima who retired from council over the last months. Their input has been very much appreciated. At our 12th October meeting we welcomed Julie Dashwood back to the team with a unanimous vote from all our councillors.

There are two further vacancies on council; we would be very pleased to hear from people of all ages in the village who may be interested in joining us.

Working together to reduce speed

Following the tragic death of Isla Cochrane in Oakington Road the chair of this council has been contacted by the chair of Oakington and Westwick Council about the possibility of a joint approach to county for a reduced speed limit.

An update on street lighting

In October's edition of *Girton Parish News*, we mentioned ownership of SCDC's Girton street lighting. Since then more information has come to light, and we are working with SCDC to identify responsibilities for these lights. Thank you to one of our residents for highlighting the need for more information.

September Full Council Meeting headlines

Our Full Council Meeting originally scheduled for 14th September was rescheduled due to the death of Queen Elizabeth II. Our meeting began with two minutes silence both for the Queen and in remembrance of Isla Cochrane.

- Girton Parish Council approved the new model Code of Conduct and signed up for the NALC/SLCC Civility & Respect Pledge along with another 463 local Councils to date.
- Girton Parish Council to document terms and conditions for all recreation ground users.
- Cllr Edna Murphy presented details of Cambridgeshire County Council's revised Local Highways Initiative soon to be available for parish councils to apply.
- Girton Parish Council approved a change to GTC Articles of Association by decreasing number of GPC Trustees from five trustees to two.
- Our committees are now back up and running post COVID and their focus is on completing their project list and resulting budget requirements for 2023/2024.
- Work to prepare the Cricket and Football pitches after this year's extreme weather conditions was approved and is now underway.

October Full Council Meeting headlines

- Council was pleased to welcome 8 members of the public to the meeting. A member of the British Horse Society requested an update about a historic discussion with Cambridgeshire County Council to provide an offroad link from Manor Farm Road to the bridleway at Oakington Road Bridge. Cllr Edna Murphy will look into this initiative following public input and detail provided by Cllr Williams in May.
- Cllr Richard Stobart of SCDC gave an update on initiation of a Girton Neighbourhood Plan. He wishes us every success with our plans.

- The Council was only made aware of the drastic changes to the 5 and 6 bus services when the new timetables were published and was not consulted. We agreed to write to Stagecoach, our County and District Councillors and our MP, expressing our concern and requesting talks to seek ways of creating a viable timetable for our residents.
- Council approved a donation for a wreath to be laid on Remembrance Sunday. Thank you to Wendy Ripley who is leading the British Legion Fund-raising in Girton. Please look out for British Legion boxes available in local businesses.
- Signage approved to highlight that Wellbrook Way woodland is the property of and maintained by the Council. This is to prevent some of the vandalism in the woodland highlighted by Girton residents.
- Town End Close hedge cutting and the three-year hedge cutting contract for Girton Recreation Ground was approved.

The Environment Committee had a stimulating workshop on 5 October to discuss priorities, in which we tackled tree-planting, a neighbourhood plan for Girton, village benches, dog bins, litter picking, expanding the graveyard, and highway issues among others.

Girton Parish Council wants to hear from you!

We are aware that some of the benches in the village are in a very poor state of repair and they should soon be replaced. However, there are no doubt other sites where a bench might be appropriate so we would be grateful for suggestions from residents. In particular none of the various out-bound bus stops has either bench or bus shelter, but we do not know how many people actually use these stops to wait for a bus. There has also been a suggestion that there should be a shelter at the in-bound stop opposite the allotments. Please let us know your views.

We are also about to start the next round of the County Council's Local Highway Initiative funding bids. These are intended to prioritise aspects such as safety, active travel, and pedestrian improvement – but do not include basics such as the repair of poor surfaces! Possibilities might include double-yellow lines and safe crossings of the main road. A separate project will be looking at 20mph zones. Again, please contribute your ideas.

We know that some residents have requested more dog bins (which are now being provided as ordinary litter bins). Each new bin would cost about £500, and the same again per annum for emptying and the District Council has to approve locations. If we were to apply for more bins, where would you locate them?

But in the short term we have some difficulties with bus services ...

Stagecoach cuts to local services take effect from November 1. The village will have no

evening bus service beyond Girton Corner. The No. 5 bus does not follow the No. 6 bus route to Oakington and now provides only a service to Girton Corner. The last No. 6 bus, out of Emmanuel Street, departs at 4.50pm. Local councillors have all registered their objections. To complain directly to Stagecoach, please email their Business Development Director david.boden@stagecoachbus.com.

Please also keep us (District Councillors) up to date. We are reporting cases of hardship directly to the combined authority.

Girton residents "bewildered and horrified" by changes to village bus service

Village bus users have been quick to contact the Girton Parish News to express their dismay at the latest changes to the Citi5 and Citi6 services by Stagecoach.

Although the Citi5 service will continue to stop at Girton Corner, it will not serve the rest of the village or Oakington, in the changes which came into force on October 31.

Meanwhile, the new Citi6 timetable means the last bus departs Cambridge at 16:50 - presenting problems for Girton residents working in the city centre and looking to get a bus home in the evening.

Rosemary Sykes, who is in her 60s, lives in Northfield and suffers from arthritis, works until 17:35 at a city centre shop and now faces a one-and-a-half mile walk in the dark from Girton Corner to get home. She told the Girton Parish News: "I am bewildered and horrified by the new Citi6 timetable which is, disingenuously being presented as an 'increased' service, deliberately overlooking the fact that Citi5 services will no longer divert through the village.

"I am struggling with the logic of Stagecoach ending the service from Cambridge at 16.50. Is it because they are short of drivers? Would it really be too much for Stagecoach to lay on a 17.50 service?"

Another Girton resident said: "It seems remarkable that Stagecoach would stop running buses some time before shops close. I also struggle to see why nearby villages have so much better a service, for example Milton with a 30 minute service until midnight, and Histon with an hourly service from 7-11pm.

"It's especially bizarre that Stagecoach can run a 17:20 and 18:20 service to Girton from Cambridge but only on Sundays."

Although the Stagecoach website states there will be an enhanced frequency of the Citi6 service, in reality this means a 30 minute service at peak times, and an hourly service at off peak times.

To Cambridge, the first bus leaves at 06:32 from Girton Corner and arrives in Cambridge at 06:45. Buses then run half-hourly until 09:47 and then hourly until 15:17, 15:47, 16:15 and 16:47. The 16:47 is the last bus to Cambridge from Oakington on the timetable.

From Cambridge the first bus leaves at 6:50, arriving at Girton Corner at 07:04. As previously mentioned, the last bus from Cambridge to Girton/Oakington is at 16:50

As detailed in the monthly Parish Council report on page 5, the council revealed they were only made aware of the changes to the Citi5 and Citi6 services when the new timetables were published and were not

consulted. The council has now agreed to write to Stagecoach, county and district councillors, and South Cambridgeshire MP Anthony Browne, expressing concern and requesting talks to seek ways of creating a viable timetable for residents.

There was an expectation among local government leaders that Stagecoach would not cut any routes, at least in the short term, after receiving a Bus Recovery Grant from central government. A tender process is now underway with a range of bus operators to try and find a new operator for as many of the 18 axed routes as possible.

Stagecoach Managing Director Darren Roe said the changes were being made because the routes had become unprofitable due to low passenger numbers and rising fuel costs.

Stagecoach were contacted for further comment but have not responded.



Update on village kebab van

A kebab van parked outside St Andrew's Church for a number of days now has a new place to park when not operating. "Brothers" kebab van now parks on

the side of the lane that leads to the MUGA and the rear of Girton Glebe School.

A spokesperson for the Parish Council said they were continuing to liaise with the licensing team at SCDC and the kebab van owner over the location.



I'm writing on Monday 17th October. The last few days have been pleasantly sunny ... an Indian summer? There was heavy rain last night, which was welcome. After the summer drought, the soil is still dry not far below the surface

Plenty of members are still working hard, in some cases working to salvage results from a difficult, for many a disappointing, season. It is now time to gather in crops such as squashes and tomatoes before frosts spoil them. Speaking of tomatoes, there was a benefit arising from the long drought and heatwave: that horrible airborne virus, blight, thrives in damp humid conditions. As far as I know, there was no blight bringing decay to tomato and potato greenery and fruits this year.

For those members who do not want a break from their plots over the winter, there is a wide range of vegetables that can be tended and harvested over the coming months. In most cases, the work of sowing and planting needs to have been done well before winter sets in. But then, onion and garlic sets will establish their root systems; broccoli, spring cabbages, kale, leeks, parsnips will stand over winter. Plucking of Brussels sprouts for the Christmas lunch is a yuletide ritual. Turnips can make a hearty gratin. A sowing of peas and broad beans will provide a harvest weeks earlier than spring-sown seed.

I was surprised to read on the internet that oriental salad leaves can be sown now and will survive all but the hardest frost. I am trying an experiment with lettuces. Mid-September I sowed Little Gem in the greenhouse. On the very evening of my sowing, Monty Don said on Gardeners' World "it's now too late for salad crops". Well, I have 39 thriving plants and will plant them into the greenhouse bed and troughs. If it works, I'll send a video clip to Monty.

So winter need not be a time of taking a 'sabbatical' from the allotment. My guess is that members will be divided into those who work hard throughout the year, and those who take a break from allotment work for a few weeks. Spring and a re-start will arrive in no time. And over the next few weeks, we'll be enjoying studying our seed packets as our orders start to arrive, and wondering why we ordered quite so many.

The allotment site in the middle of Girton is a place of bucolic enjoyment, a place of freely undertaken labours, a place yielding healthy food. But in making all that possible, there has to be efficient organisation. There is a responsibility on the Society to our landlords, the

Town Charity and the Church, to manage the site well. On this 'business' side, the Society held its AGM early this month. There were upbeat reports from the officers – the Chairperson, the Site Manager, the Secretary, the (plots) Letting Officer and the Treasurer. Such is the popularity of allotmenting these days that there are no vacant plots and a waiting list of 30. Work life, removals from the area, health issues etc. led to a turnover of 15 plots during the year. The site has 124 plots and the Society 135 members (for the mathematical perfectionists, the discrepancy results from some shared plots, and some non-plot-holding members. We members owe a debt of gratitude to the committee for managing the business side and organising working groups for maintaining the site – keeping the site in good shape, servicing the pumps, gates, wheelbarrows, watering cans; pruning the communal trees; writing the occasional letter to members whose plots get into bad order. (Note to the committee: that is not rampant uncontrolled weed on my plot. It is green manure, field mustard!)

Lessons about mental health learnt from our physical health

Lying flat down on the pavement, arm jutting out, handbag tossed to one side, the

pain was excruciating, but I was far more upset by four passers-by who neither stopped to help, or even to ask if I was ok... In this instance, my signs and symptoms were blatantly obvious. With mental ill-health, the signs and symptoms are not always as obvious or understood.

The shock of my fall had eased but the pain had kicked in. And the very strong pain medication is not an option, it's a necessity. When someone is diagnosed with a mental health condition, they may be reluctant to take prescribed medication.

I had to inform a total of 14 people that I won't be working next week, but what struck me was (1) how simple it was to explain about the broken arm and the expected recovery, and (2) how understanding everyone was, many people describing their own broken limb experiences.

Evidence shows that for mental health conditions, many people don't explain or share their true reason for being absent from work.

My family have learnt to predict what I may struggle with, from putting on socks to opening a jar, they've started putting adaptations in place. I've also had to articulate what I need when it's been less obvious. When someone has a diagnosis of a mental health condition, there's no need to predict what they might find helpful, the best approach is to ask the person.

I've been very low and less able to see things in a positive light since my accident. I can rationalise this as a reaction to my physical pain, and as a side effect of my medication. These are the emotional and mental signs of a physical issue. Sometimes it's the other way round and the physical signs are an indicator of how we're feeling.

It could be worse... At least you haven't.... Thank goodness you only... With good intentions, these phrases are often said relating to a physical injury/illness, or with a mental health condition. The fact is what someone is experiencing is real, important, and consuming for them. Being allowed to feel how you're feeling is a crucial step in the recovery journey.

I've been set some exercises to help with the recovery of my arm. The nurse recommended a little and often approach. If I put the careful work in now, it will lead to recovering to the abilities I had before the injury. In the context of mental health, recovery is viewed differently. Whilst a step-by-step approach is advocated, most people don't view recovery as returning to how things were before, instead, people describe being different, often having a new perspective.

Community Car Scheme to return in 2023

Moves are afoot to restart the Histon, Impington, and Girton Car Scheme after it ceased operating due to the pandemic. Volunteer drivers and coordinators are being encouraged to step forward to enable the service to begin again in the new year.

The car scheme was one of the early casualties of the pandemic. It closed completely in March 2020, when car journeys were restricted to single households, and most people were confined to their homes, unless for urgent medical reasons or for key workers commuting to work. On top of this, many of the volunteer drivers were told to stay in their homes when the government deemed those over 70 were at high risk.

Before covid, the scheme had been running for almost five years, co-ordinated by volunteer Lesley Kelly. It was available for anyone in the communities of Histon, Impington, and Girton, who were unable to use public transport and didn't have use of a car. The lifts requested were a mixture of medical and social events. Priority was given to health-related appointments when allocating lifts.

Volunteers needed

Histon, Impington, and Girton Car Scheme is one of around 30 such schemes in South Cambridgeshire. Organisers now aim to restart this scheme and offer lifts again from early 2023, but to do this they need volunteers. This includes a new team of drivers who can volunteer each week for as many or as few hours as they like. The drivers indicate online when they can help so the time commitment can vary from week to week. Some may offer more than one lift while others may only have an hour a week to spare. All volunteers are reimbursed for any expenses. The scheme is supported by South Cambridgeshire's Care Network, which manages the legalities such as: ensuring that the drivers have the correct safeguarding certificates and insurance.

As well as drivers, co-ordinators are needed to take on the task of organising the lifts on a weekly basis, with each co-ordinator committing a couple of hours a week on average. Previously the scheme was run manually using a large paper diary. With the relaunch, the scheme will now be run on VIA, an easy-to-use software package which runs on computers or tablets. VIA has been developed locally in Hardwick but is used by many car schemes in the UK. It enables multiple co-ordinators to share the lift requests and match lifts to drivers, making this task a lot easier.

Applications for an Educational Grant are invited from young people over 18 leaving secondary education and moving on to higher education and some training schemes or NVQ qualifications Level 4 and above.



November Wine Selection

As the nights draw in and the weather turns chilly, here are three wines to help keep your spirits up.



Finca Traversa Tannat Merlot 2021 (Uruguay)

Although less well-known as a wine-producing country, Uruguay is starting to make a name for itself, particularly for its signature red grape, Tannat. Originating in south-west France, Tannat is known for its dark, full-bodied, lush wines, not unlike Malbec from Argentina. And this Tannat from Finca Traversa, blended with Merlot, is a very good introduction to the grape.

This is a smooth, velvety wine with medium tannins, medium acidity, and a lengthy finish. Aromas of raspberry, redcurrant, and cherry on the nose lead to a burst of forest fruit flavours on the palate, with hints of vanilla, chocolate, and coffee.

An ideal match for a hearty meat dish, or roasted vegetables.

Hazel End Vineyard Bacchus Dry 2014 (Hertfordshire)

It's unusual to find an English white wine that has aged a few years, but this 2014 Bacchus Dry from Hazel End Vineyard in Hertfordshire is a real delight. 2014 was generally a good year for English wine. Eleven out of the twelve months were warmer than average, and there was also a reasonable amount of rain. The result was a bumper 2014 harvest with plenty of healthy, high-quality grapes. And several years on, this wine still has lots to offer.

With aromas of grapefruit, elderflower, lime, and a touch of petrol on the nose, leading to a burst of lime and peach on the palate, this older Bacchus has a hint of Riesling about it. It is a smooth, refined wine with good acidity and a long finish, which can be enjoyed by itself, or with a seafood or chicken dish.

Grüner Veltliner, Von den Terrassen, Winzer Krems, Niederösterreich 2020 (Austria)

This Grüner Veltliner is a fresh, elegant wine produced from grapes grown on the loess terraces along the banks of the Danube in the Wachau Valley and has all the characteristics of Austria's signature white grape variety.

Pronounced aromas of blossom, apple and peach, and a touch of white pepper on the nose lead to a delicious burst of apple, lemon, peach, and nectarine on the palate. A tinge of

effervescence adds a little sparkle to the mix and the mineral notes and refreshing acidity make for a very well-balanced wine.

A dry wine with a lengthy finish, this is a perfectly pleasant wine to drink by itself, or as the ideal match for Wiener Schnitzel. We enjoyed it with Japanese tonkatsu (breaded pork cutlet), and it was just the ticket.

The New Crown

Just before the final committal of the Queen's coffin to the vaults of St. George's Chapel, the great imperial symbols of monarchy were removed. The crown, the orb and sceptre, were placed on the high altar to be kept in safety by the nation for a royal successor. From her own testimony, we know that the Queen had already received a crown more durable and indestructible, the Crown of Righteousness. Above all other treasures, the Queen rested on the confidence that this crown was gained not by merit, nor through dynastic line, but by the grace of God in response to her sincere commitment to faith in Christ Jesus as her substitute and living advocate.

Nearing the end of his earthly life, the Apostle Paul, explained to young Timothy his expectation in these terms. "I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness which the Lord, the righteous judge will award to me on that day, and not only to me, but also to all who have longed for his appearing." (2 Timothy 4v7,8)

Adopted into the family of God, his children know that regardless of status, wealth or achievement, their greatest riches are the riches they have in Christ, and the promise of heaven is their eternal hope. Eternally connected to that great event of salvation, they were redeemed from death to life. Now they carry the honour of speaking for the King of Kings as ambassadors. This great privilege brings sacred responsibility and guidance, especially perhaps for a monarch who must live under the spotlight.

Yet monarchs, like all of us, experience the whole gamut of emotions that humanity confronts. Some have sought power; some have come with trepidation to wear the mantle placed around their shoulders. Others have stepped up with a sense of destiny that will require courage, dedication, and personal discipline, to stand as a rallying point, and curator of national identity, with all ethnicities nestling under one banner of unity. In tribute to the Queen, the great Commonwealth of Nations, joined together to create a visual demonstration of mutual bonds.

Long ago, we abandoned the principle of the Divine Right of Kings which had given an excess of unquestioned power into the hands of one individual. Thereafter, the crown was worn by the consent of the people. The monarch, like all citizens was accountable to God for mode of conduct. Rather than issuing decrees, they embraced servanthood. Queen Elizabeth said, "I do not give you laws or administer justice, but I


can give you my heart, and my devotion to these old islands and to all the people of our brotherhood of nations." In the servanthood of Jesus, she found her perfect example.

When a dispute arose amongst the disciples regarding status, Jesus taught them by saying, "You know that the rulers of the Gentiles lord over them, and their high officials exercise authority over them. Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant and whoever wants to be first must be your slave, just as the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Matthew 20v25-28) True greatness comes with humility and service.

From that perspective, Charles Wesley wrote his great hymn of worship, Love Divine all Loves Excelling. It ends with words that every disciple may echo.

"Changed from glory into glory Till in heaven we take our place Till we cast our crowns before you Lost in wonder, love, and praise."



At Girton Baptist Church we find the Psalms to be a source of great comfort and encouragement. This is in part because they reflect life as we often experience it, while at the same time offering hope. Psalm 120 is a Psalm of lament, an expression of grief and disappointment of the Psalmist's circumstances. There is plenty in this Psalm to give us a good idea of what the problem was. He was living in a corrupt and godless society, where lying lips and deceit were everywhere. It was a world of broken promises, broken relationships, and broken hearts. It was also a place of physical danger, with hostile neighbours, who presented a constant threat of war. The Psalmist, who described himself as a 'man of peace,' turned to the Lord in prayer in his distress: "In my distress I called to the Lord, and he answered me," (Psalm 120:1) This is where salvation begins.

Thomas Sternbold, who served as a courtier to Henry VIII and Edward VI, set the words of Psalm 120 to music, in the style of the time:

In trouble and in thrall unto the Lord I call, And he doth me comfort. Deliver me, I pray, From lying lips always and tongues of false report.

Although this verse comes from a different age, the words are remarkably apt for our own, an age of lying lips (fake news) and false reports, and sometimes it is difficult to know who or what to believe.

This is a prayer from a Baptist resource which we can make our own: "Lord of truth and forgiveness, by your gentle spirit move us from guilt to grace, and from darkness to light, that our lives may proclaim the transformation of the peace of Christ. Amen."
