Vision for Girton – developing our collective future

The Parish Council has decided to formulate a Neighbourhood Plan for the electoral parish. This is a document that sits alongside, and not in conflict with, the district council's Local Plan 2018, and the emerging Greater Cambridge Local Plan and helps guide planning and other policies in the parish.

Drawing on consultation with residents, businesses, landowners, and others in or affecting the parish, it is a key chance to develop a view for Girton for the next decade or more. It includes not only buildings, but also transport, nature and environment, business, facilities, heritage, protected green or other special areas, views and so forth. It is a means of all of us in Girton to set out our collective vision for the future.

After an initial period of information gathering, there will be the main public consultation phase in due course, followed by the development of the draft plan which would be expected to come back for approval in a parish referendum. It can then be adopted by the district council.

It is not a particularly quick process as it is important that it is a truly collective plan for the whole electoral parish. Please note that various committees of the Parish Council are also in the process of starting consultations within the parish to help them set out their more day-to-day plans for the next three years. The Neighbourhood Plan consultation exercise will build on these too.

The Parish Council has asked Andrew Muston (husband of Cllr Muston and a Girton Town Charity Trustee), to lead this process on their behalf in a personal capacity unrelated to Girton Town Charity. However, it's best done as a team effort so volunteers from all parts of the parish would be very welcome – especially from anyone with experience in planning or public consultation exercises.

Neighbourhood Plan

Girton Parish Council approved the production of a Neighbourhood Plan at the GPC Full Council meeting. This will enable our community to take the lead in producing part of the statutory development plan for the area.

Environment

Cllr Giles noted at the Full Council, it is great to see Girton Green Team and the Local Nature Recovery Group back up and running. The GPC Environment Committee recommended a budget to support the work of the Local Nature Recovery group. This budget was approved.

Tree replanting is underway, volunteers to help plant these trees would be very welcome as the window before birdnesting season is tight.

Girton Parish Council received one Beech tree from the South Cambridgeshire District Council's Free Trees scheme, which has been planted on the recreation ground. Cllr Giles thanked our groundsman Chris Wilson for his help planting the first tree in 2023.

Hotel Felix Inquiry (31 January 2023)

Cllr Muston attended the above and spoke of the reasons for Girton Parish Council's objection to the planning application. Cllr Muston's presentation at the Inquiry can be found on Girton Village Community Website.

Sport & Recreation Committee

Girton Parish Council would like to welcome new coopted members to this committee from Girton Colts, Girton United FC and Girton Cricket Club. We also hope to welcome further co-opted members from the Girton Bowls Club and Girton Tennis Club.

Girton Bowls Club

The first meeting of the Bowls Club Working group took place at Abbeyfield last month to address the availability of the toilets for Bowls Club members. Cllr Marshall confirmed that possible solutions for the Bowls Club requirements were in the early stages.

Support for Pay It Forward Scheme considered across two Parish Councils

After discussions between Cllr Hayat, Girton Glebe School, and Impington Village College, Girton Parish Council approved their support for residents paying extra money for school meals to support those students who may find it difficult to pay for school meals. The same motion will go to Histon & Impington Parish Council for a decision on 20 February.

Electric Vehicle Charging Points

The above initiative was brought to the Full Council again due to funding currently available from South Cambridgeshire District Council. The window for funding closes on 31 March 2023. The decision was deferred by the Council.

Cut hedges back now to avoid summer overgrowth, says Council.

Council approved an initiative to ask all Girton residents to check and act on any hedges, and trees that they own, that are blocking or impeding footpaths and footways.

CCC 20mph Scheme

This scheme has not yet been launched. However, Girton Parish Council have already approved the release of a survey to get feedback from Girton residents. This should allow maximum length of time for you to provide your feedback on this topic. Also, look out for our Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign (MVAS) sign.

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FROM OUR COUNCILLORS

District Councillors' Report, February 2023

Growth in the Greater Cambridge area and the need for transport

The Greater Cambridge area is a place that attracts businesses of all types and sizes. The upside is that this creates jobs and prosperity. Economic growth draws people to the area who need somewhere to live. The high cost of living leads to many people choosing to live some distance from Cambridge, where there are lower rents and house prices. They then commute to their workplaces in the city. Those new trips can bring increases in congestion and pollution. Affordable homes – both social rented and shared ownership is part of the solution. Another is to improve active and public transportation.

The UK Government has committed substantial funding to Cambridge under the City Deal, which led to the formation of the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP). The "City Access" proposal includes massive improvements to public transport, cycleways, and footpaths; funded by a road usage charge. The proposal outlines improvements to public transport before a road-usage charge is introduced. The consultation on the GCP's plans closed on 23 December 2022. There was an enthusiastic response from the public.

Local Plan update

Great Cambridge Planning has just published an update about the emerging Greater Cambridge Local Plan

(https://www.greatercambridgeplanning.org/emerging -plans-and-guidance/greater-cambridge-local-plan/). Recent work has shown that the projected growth will lead to a demand for more houses. Across the country, planning authorities have no choice but to plan to meet the demand. The government adopts a 'carrot and stick' approach; local authorities that deliver the number of houses that the government demands continue to have local planning control, whereas those that do not, lose the ability to decide what is built and where.

There are serious constraints on housebuilding in our area due to poor water availability. So much so, that there are plans to transfer water from other areas and to build a reservoir. These plans are in the medium to long-term and the supply shortage needs to be resolved quickly to meet expected growth.

And in other news...

Facilities Grants for those with disabilities

We have been asked to post a reminder that the Cambridgeshire Home Improvement Agency (HIA) offer a range of grants to people living in South Cambridgeshire, to help adapt their homes. These government grants are aimed at people with disabilities and older people on low incomes. More information is here: hia@cambshia.org

Campaign for more Homes for Ukraine Hosts

The SCDC campaign for new hosts for Ukrainian guests is ongoing. Our pool of hosts stood at over 600 when the Homes for Ukraine scheme first launched last year, but this has now reduced considerably. More frequent battery recycling collections

South Cambridgeshire households can now conveniently recycle small, used batteries on a weekly basis.

Adjustments to bin lorries mean that small plastic bags containing used batteries can now be left on top of green, black, or blue bins for collection by crews on their usual rounds.

Residents of flats with shared bins should not leave batteries on these bins but can take them to one of the many public battery collection points for example Sainsburys.

Fly Tipper fined

A fly-tipper has been fined for dumping rubbish in a layby after an investigation by SCDC officers. The waste, including household rubbish and personal correspondence, was found next to a public litter bin in Madingley. A Lode address was discovered in amongst the rubbish. An individual was identified and issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice of £400.

Key Amnesty

People who are misusing council properties are being offered a one-off opportunity to #DoTheRightThing

and return their keys without facing criminal proceedings during a month-long campaign by SCDC's housing team.

A "Key Amnesty" campaign called #DoTheRightThing is taking place across the district during February 2023. Additionally, the campaign is encouraging anyone who suspects housing fraud to #DoTheRightThing and report it to SCDC using the online form or emailing: fraud@scambs.gov.uk. To surrender keys, people are asked to hand them in at South Cambridgeshire Hall, Cambourne CB23 6EA, in an envelope containing the property address. No questions will be asked

Voter Photo ID

From May this year, voters will be required to show photo ID in polling stations before being allowed to vote. However, if voters think they might not have the required ID to be able to vote at a polling station in the future, they may wish to apply for a free Voter ID now. People can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate online. For further information please visit the Electoral Commission Website. Photos can be on documents like driving licences and bus passes, but there will be some of you who do not have photo ID. It is important that you do not lose your right to vote.

Guidance for councils and business owners on tackling graffiti and flyposting

The Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs has recently published advisory guidance for all land managers responsible for managing graffiti and flyposting. The new guidance has been developed primarily for business owners and landowners. The document provides recommendations for good practice in graffiti and fly-posting management.

Wood Burners

Residents have complained about the smoke from wood burning stoves. There are many of them in Girton and the smoke is hazardous for people with respiratory diseases. To report a problem, go to the District Council website. It is Environmental Health: pollution and wood fires.

The latest guidance is that sales of bagged house coal and wet wood in units under two cubic meters have become unlawful. And wet wood in bigger volumes must be sold with advice on how to dry it out before it's burned. Also new stoves will have to conform to new guidelines.

County Councillor's Report, February 2023

Local Highways Improvement and 20mph schemes

Both Girton (jointly with Oakington) and Dry Drayton have put applications forward for the LHI scheme this year which is great news. We are awaiting the publication of the guidelines and application process for the new 20mph scheme, which should appear soon. We think the window for applications for 20mph schemes will be about three months, so there will be some time to develop the proposals. Consultation is an important aspect of all these improvement schemes.

Winter road damage

The road network was already in poor condition from being in 'managed decline' for decades and has deteriorated rapidly in the winter months. The Council has responded with concentrated effort to fix potholes. There are eight teams dealing with this and they are also using two dragon patchers in the rural areas. There have been up to 5000 new potholes found every weekend for several months, and it will take some weeks to fix them. The Chair of Highways has put out the following statement:

Caring Together in Cambridgeshire

You may start to see communications being circulated online and among local publications in South Cambridgeshire about the County Council's Caring Together programme.

This is a programme that aims to transform the way older people are cared for in Cambridgeshire. They plan to work collaboratively with partners and local communities, and the aim is to help people live independently in their own homes for longer. This programme will result in a switch from social care based on county-wide contracts, to one in which people living and working in their own communities (micro-providers), will be empowered to support older and vulnerable residents. This will help people to remain living in their own homes for longer as well as adding extra capacity to the local care market. To help make sure they get the programme right, they are inviting residents over the age of 55, or looking after a person over 55, to complete an online survey and are sharing some communications with South Cambridgeshire residents to encourage this. We will be supporting this by including it in our residents' magazine in the spring.

Sustainable Girton

Only about 1% of the world's water is accessible for consumption; and although global warming increases ice melt, it will also increase evaporation. Purifying water for our consumption costs the environment, and the resulting

water in the tap costs us.

How can you cut your consumption? For the average user, unmetered water is significantly more expensive: Cambridge Water claims the average person saves £100 a year when they switch to a water meter.

The standard metered tariff is 168.5p per cubic metre (1000 litres). The average person uses about 140 litres each day, or about 25p worth (all figures are approximate and I'm ignoring the fixed charge),

25p per day is £90pa. If you are using a lot of water on the garden, half of that £90 could buy you a big water butt to collect rainwater and greatly cut your usage.

What about your bathroom? An average bath takes about 75 litres: that's nearly 90p in the week. You could halve that in the shower. While in the bathroom, consider how much you flush down the loo. Consider reducing the volume of a flush: see the links below.

How often do you wash things? Only run your washing machine when you can fill it; if you only need to wash a few dishes use a bowl. Don't use a hose or a power washer on the car; rainwater from the butt will do just fine.

Whenever you run a tap (waiting for the water to become hot), capture it if you can and use it on the garden. If the tap doesn't need to be running (while you brush your teeth) then turn it off.

One of those lovely blue-sky mornings in mid-February. I was standing at the door of my greenhouse, surveying the allotment scene. "Has spring arrived?" I thought. The meteorological start of spring is 1st March; the astronomical start of spring is 20th March. But those are arbitrary dates, irrespective of all those things that are happening to plants, soil, weather, ourselves. As I thought about spring, a jackdaw landed on a nearby plot and stood proudly erect. Was he relishing the sun's warmth? This bird wasn't the dusty grey creature of winter. His black feathers and the silvery sheen at the back of his head positively glowed as if freshly oiled. This single bird seemed a magnificent creature in his pride and lustre. Just a symbol, but I felt a certainty that spring had made its presence felt. Perhaps spring is a conviction within us and a pervasive sense that a renewed life-force is active. There may well be frosts and storms to come, but spring has announced that it has taken a foothold in the seasons. We of horticultural inclinations can prepare our minds, our planning, our seed packets and equipment for the imminent growing season.

As the weather has become more amenable and members have come out of hibernation; a valuable aspect of allotmenting has sprung up again ... meeting with old friends and acquaintances, taking a break from the work, and swapping cultivation plans, discussing last night's TV (what a relief ... Happy Valley ended well), the state of national and world affairs. One theme which pervades so many of our chats is our desperate hopes that this season will bring us far better rewards than last year. The difficult spring conditions, germination problems (arising from the transition to peat-free composts?), then weeks of soaring temperatures and drought, huge efforts of watering, parched, dusty soil: all are etched into our memories. A second successive such unrewarding season would be hard to bear.

A week of heavy overnight frosts in the first half of February made the site a winter wonderland early in the mornings. Areas shaded from the sun retained the frost all day. The frosts took their toll on some over-wintering vegetables. Some broad bean plants, usually tough in recovering from frost, succumbed and were ploughed back in. Winter cabbages, looking fine outwardly, were found to have turned into watery mush when sliced through. Today I watched a re-sowing of broad beans. The theory is that autumn planted beans will mature and produce pods earlier in the summer, whereas spring planted will mature later and be plagued by the horrible sticky covering of blackfly.

Oakington Garden Centre offered an excellent range of seed potatoes and many Society members availed themselves of the wide choice, and of being able to select healthy, medium sized tubers. These are now laid out in frost-free, light places so that they can start to put out shoots from the 'eyes' (chitting) prior to planting out around Easter time. We have to judge the timing – between being early but not so early that foliage appears while frosts are still possible. Many of us have been out at dusk to cover the foliage, having heard forecast of frost.



Over the first two weekends of January, smallish working parties assembled to carry out bramble clearance and annual coppicing within the hazel copse. Rows of

the hazel bushes take their turn year by year to be cut back almost to ground level. This produces burgeoning new shoots, and provides bean support poles and pea sticks for

use on our plots. The age range of the working parties was 2 years to mid eighties. The former was not allowed to use the power saw!



The allotment site continues to provide an environment for wildlife. Muntjak and fox have been sighted. I have seen, after a few years absence, my longed-for fieldfares, and I was thrilled by a red kite swooping low over my plot. Charms (what a lovely collective noun) of goldfinches frequently fly over the site. The green woodpecker has started up his mocking, laughing call.

Time to break off now and do some browsing through seed packets and to prepare a schedule of sowing and planting. Here's hoping for a well-balanced climate for the new season.

Public Meeting & Help our Swifts

Swifts

At the public meeting on biodiversity in Girton last year, one of the guest speakers was Rowena Baxter who gave an inspirational talk on the project she led to establish a colony for Swifts in Dry Drayton. We want to explore if this is feasible in Girton too, and we've asked her to write to us describing the process she went through in establishing the colony.

Action for Swifts

Swifts are tropical birds; they come here from Africa to breed and stay from May until the end of July. They like to find holes in buildings for their nests. Most of us try to ensure we don't have holes in our buildings, so swifts have a hard time finding homes – that is one reason why they have declined 72% since 1995. They are now on the British Trust for Ornithology's Red List of conservation concern. That being so, Rowena Baxter explains how we can help them

In June 2008 I saw several swifts prospecting for nest sites where I live in Pettitt's Close, Dry Drayton. Pettitt's Close houses are very well maintained so I knew the swifts wouldn't be successful. As a result, I put up two swift boxes in July. There were no swifts breeding in Dry Drayton at that time, so I was advised to play swift calls to attract them. I used two old speakers and my CD player, but nowadays there are simple, neat, and relatively inexpensive ways of doing this.

The neighbours were very tolerant of the constant swift screaming noise, or at least they refrained from complaining! I promised my next-door neighbour that I would open a bottle of champagne when swifts were finally breeding in our boxes. This took several years; it doesn't necessarily take that long.

Anyway, true to my word, when swifts started breeding in 2012, I invited the neighbours who had been supportive, and we had a bit of a party. Maybe because of having a glass of fizz, several neighbours said they would like a box on their house. To cut a long story short, seven houses ended up with a couple swift boxes each.



Over the last 10 years we have added more boxes and we now have about 40 boxes in Pettitt's Close including 10 integral nest holes built into the adjoining newly built

houses in Swifts Close. Last summer 27 boxes were occupied, with up to 40 chicks fledging.

Action for Swifts website (locally run)

(https://actionforswifts.blogspot.com) gives all the information you need to start your swift colony. Basic boxes are available for around £20 from John Stimpson in Wilburton (Tel: 01353 740451) and of course from the RSPB and other on-line sources.

When siting a box (and it's always better to fix two!) ideally fix it under an overhanging eave, so that it is partly protected from the weather. Bear in mind that south and south-west facing will be in direct sun at the hottest part of the day. Unimpeded access is also important, so no trees in the direct flight path, although swifts are extremely agile and can dodge aerials and a few cables, it's better to have a clear flight path especially for the young as they leave the nest on their first flight. They will drop out of the box vertically for a few feet, recover and set off on the long migration to southern Africa. So, a recommended height for siting boxes is 5m but a bit less than that is still ok. The youngsters won't land again until they are two, to three, years old, when they will start to investigate possible nest sites, not necessarily near where they were born.

Playing attraction calls will hugely increase the chances of swifts finding the boxes. It is simple to set up. Action for Swifts have a very helpful webpage here: https://actionforswifts.blogspot.com/p/attraction-call-systems-for-swifts.html.

Swifts are mostly unobtrusive neighbours and make hardly any mess, but parties of swifts, screaming and dashing around our homes is one of the most enthralling sights and sounds of summer – so let's help them find nest sites, and increase biodiversity in our neighbourhoods!

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


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Girton Walking Group

Girton WI

At our recent February meeting we welcomed Doctor Gwenda Kyd a scientist and complementary medicine practitioner. Her main interests are in plants and how we use them.

Gwenda loves learning about new plants and sharing her stories in her talks, blogs, and books. She co-devised the chemicals from plants at the Cambridge University Botanic Gardens and published a book on an extended version called "Molecular Medicine and Mischief." Gwenda published her second book titled "The plants of Doctor Bach," on the plants used to make the remedies. Gwenda gave us some very interesting facts on what we should eat per day, and that plants can add flavour to foods; she explained the difference between the various foods by giving a presentation on the benefits they had on our diets. Carrots were the number one vegetable, and most popular, along with broccoli and potatoes.

She explained what each vegetable contains in the way of vitamins and that carrots contain antioxidants, and carotene; this is good for eyes and gives you good night vision. Vitamin A in carrots prevents cancer so should be eaten for good health. Gwenda also gave us additional facts on drinks, such as coffee, wine, and beers which was very interesting. Gwenda pointed out that you can get a lot of goodness from a selection of foods and to eat a good diet containing anything and everything in moderation.

Libby Cull a resident of Girton, Green badge Guide and a Cambridge Blue Badge Guide, adapted her walking tour to give us a fascinating glimpse of the role that women have played in the

formation of Cambridge, in her talk 'Sex and the City of Cambridge-Women Town and Gown'.

Did you know that six of the Cambridge colleges were founded by women? The first being Clare College, founded by Elizabeth de Clare, granddaughter of Edward I. At this time a woman's husband had control over his wife's property and wealth, but she was a widow, able to do as she wished with her money, thankfully for Cambridge.

There have been many influential women shaping the history of Cambridge; Daisy Hopkins was instrumental in altering the legal powers held by the University; a fascinating story. Florence Ada Keynes, after her education at Newnham, became an author and a political and philanthropic influence in the 'town', becoming the first female councillor, magistrate and mayor. As well as instigating the redevelopment of the guildhall to meet the needs of a growing city, her charitable causes included the foundation of Papworth Village Settlement, forerunner to Papworth hospital. Thank you, Libby, for a spellbinding hour; I am sure that we will be talking to you about your Cambridge Spy tour and others soon. 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An update from RSPB Fen Drayton Lakes

Lapwings are wading birds that can be found in grasslands, farmland, and wetlands. They are well known for their distinctive calls, (giving them the alternative name 'peewit'), their complex courtship displays and their striking plumage, in particular their head crests. Sadly, lapwing populations in the UK have declined significantly over the past few decades, predominantly due to changes in agricultural practices and the loss of suitable nesting habitats; meaning that they are now a red-listed species in the UK and are deemed a conservation priority. Here at Fen Drayton Lakes, we have seen a steady decrease in breeding numbers, so, we are working to provide suitable habitats and to implement effective habitat management measures with the aim of helping the species recover.

Lapwings are ground-nesting birds that lay their eggs in shallow scrapes, often in grassy fields. The chicks are born precocial; meaning they leave the nest after hatching and feed themselves with the help of their parents who care for them until they fledge. Nesting lapwings require suitable grass sward and vegetation conditions to build their nests and rear their young. The ideal habitat is an area of short, grazed grass, with some scattered tussocky vegetation and bare patches with nearby shallow water margins. This type of habitat provides cover for the birds; feeding areas for adults and chicks and reduces the risk of predation.

The grasslands of Ferry Mere along the northern edges of the lake, are the best areas for nesting lapwings at the reserve, and we carry out management work to maintain it as a suitable habitat. The area is grazed by cattle in the summer and autumn to ensure suitable grass conditions the following spring when lapwings are looking to nest with a majority low, even height. This enables the birds to see around them and watch out for predators, thus making them feel more secure and more likely to nest.

Having nearby tall trees and shrubs can deter lapwing from nesting as they provide cover for ground predators, such as foxes, and perching points for avian predators; such as crows, that can take eggs and chicks. In previous years we have worked to fell trees from around the ditches on Ferry Mere, and this past winter we have spent time with our volunteer work group removing a dense area of tall trees from the lake edge very near to our shallow pools where lapwings

are often seen and have nested in the past. Not only will this improve the area for the birds, but it also has the added benefit of opening views of the lake from the footpath and the view shelter along the north of Ferry Lake.

As we head into spring the large wintering lapwing flocks will start to disperse, but we hope that some will stay and choose to nest out on Ferry Mere or elsewhere at the reserve. We will be carefully monitoring lapwing numbers as part of our annual breeding bird survey; to see the effects of our management work, and determine if there is more we can do. In fact, we are already working on plans for another project to try to ensure the continued presence of shallow pools that remain wet throughout the breeding season. Watch this space for more details in the future.

Girton Tennis Club



Our AGM will be held on Wednesday 15th March, 7.30pm at the George, Girton. Many thanks to Michelle for agreeing to host us again. Like many voluntary committees, we are fortu-

nate to have a core group of members who are willing to help keep our club running but we need more volunteers. Being on our small committee is not very time consuming and it gives you the chance to shape the way our club operates. If you are interested in how the tennis club is organised, please come along to the AGM. We will be reviewing the previous year and planning for the next membership year which starts in April.

The club purchases three types of tennis ball to support match play, club nights and junior sessions. The balls used for junior training are softer and slightly larger than the others and often have a green spot on the side. Balls used for matches and more active play tend to be 'pressurised' and may have different materials covering the rubber to make them more suitable for the type of surface and playing conditions. These balls will slowly lose their internal air pressure and their bounce can reduce in lower air temperatures making them harder to use in winter. The non-pressurised balls (supplied by Babolat currently) are made with slightly thicker rubber and keep an even bounce in most UK temperatures so are ideal for general practice. Sometimes club balls get left in the gulley around the courts so, if you find one, you may now have an idea of how it will perform!

The tennis club has use of the recreation ground courts and members who purchase a key and have a confirmed booking have court access during most daylight hours. Club members meet and play from around 7.30pm to 9pm on Friday evenings. Potential new members are very welcome to come along to our Friday club nights for one or two free sessions to check it all out.

Ballet classes in Girton

Girton has had ballet classes running for many years and they still continue today

In the late 1940's an Estonian born ballerina moved into the village with her English husband. She started classes in the Cotton Hall and soon outgrew the space so moved to the WI hall in the High Street.

Her reputation spread and she then moved into Cambridge in the old Masonic Hall which stood where the Lion Yard car park now is. She, however, kept the Girton classes going. They were taught by a succession of senior ballet students who were serious about ballet as a career. Many wanted to perform as opposed to teaching but she felt it was important that they had a wide range of experiences and training. A dancers working life can be short so to have the ability to teach was important.

As time went on and I started my three years training with her I was sent to teach the Girton classes, the difference was I wanted to teach and had done since I was about 8 years old and often was allowed to watch senior rehearsals or a class which gave me a depth of knowledge and the skills to observe and find faults which have stood me in good stead ever since. She then gave me the classes as the base of my own dance school. She knew that this was my ambition and I hope I have made her proud!

I used the WI Hall for years running classes for a variety of age groups from 4 to 18. The WI was an interesting place to teach - in winter it was very cold to begin with as the solid fuel heating needed to get going but by the end of a three hour session we were sweltering - you could not turn it down! In summer due to the corrugated iron walls and roof it could get vey hot so all doors and windows were open!

We coped with swarms of bees in the walls, frozen taps and toilets a fire in the back room which was caught in time before it got enough hold to burn the place down and the odd curious rodent running across the little stage at one end

and were sad to have to move when we were told it was no longer "fit for purpose".

We moved to the pavilion which I remember being built as one of those involved was the father of one of my students.

Now we face the Pavilion being re-furbished so where we shall be while this is happening I have no idea - it will be in Girton that is for sure. I may not live in the village but feel I am an honorary resident as I have been there every week in school time for all my teaching career.

Girton must have one of the longest running ballet classes in a village in the country! My aim is and has always been to work at the grass roots and develop the hidden talent in youngsters. I have had many go on to professional dance as a career or become teachers themselves. Meanwhile, those who have chosen other career paths have had the pleasure of dance and the confidence it brings and then bring their children to classes so I must be getting it right!

Dovehouse Court prepares to welcome first residents

Girton Town Charity's £5 million project to create 15 almshouses and an office for the Charity at Dovehouse Court is almost completed – with the first residents scheduled to move in over the next few weeks.

With only a few elements still to be finalised – including some planting in the central communal garden – the development is scheduled to be officially handed over from Barnes Construction to GTC this month.

Invitation to residents

In addition to a visit by GTC Trustees to see how works were progressing, on 10th February an invitation was extended to residents of the former almshouses in Michael's Close and High Street who were re-homed in Gretton Court for the duration of the project.

Ann Bonnett, GTC Chair said: "Feedback was very positive with future residents commenting on the space within the internal courtyard where there is a communal garden with seating, pergolas, allotment beds, orchard and walkways.

"Everyone said they were looking forward to moving into their light-filled spacious new homes, which feature contemporary kitchens with accessible cupboards, tiled wet-rooms and open-plan living space. Some have their own terrace too.

"It is very exciting to have reached this stage in the project. All GTC Trustees are

very grateful to residents around the High Street site who have been exceptionally understanding during the build. They would also like to thank Paul Darrington, Barnes' Site Manager, who has been so helpful in responding to residents questions and requests over this time."

Independent living

The almshouses at Dovehouse Court have been designed to meet stringent Passivhaus standards achieved through high levels of insulation. This results in low energy costs and improved indoor air quality, all made possible by installing energy-efficient windows and doors, with stricter levels of airtightness, mechanical ventilation and heat recovery.

Once the landscaping has been completed, an Open Day at Dovehouse Court will be arranged and publicised so that Village residents can come and take a look themselves.

the village, who meet qualifications laid down by the Charity Commission.

Dovehouse Court almshouses have been designed to meet stringent Passivhaus standards achieved through high levels of insulation and a heat recovery system. This results in low energy costs and improved indoor air quality.

The apartments include fitted kitchen, tiled wet room, open plan living space, bedroom and a small additional room.

Storage cupboards are included in all rooms and the properties are wired with Virgin and BT connections.



Landscaped communal gardens include seating areas, raised allotment beds, an orchard, outdoor drying lines and secure cycle parking. The arrivals court has off-road parking spaces and EV charging points with mobility scooter parking bays and recharge at each front door.

How glad we are to welcome March, with its longer days and better weather! And here is a selection of wines to enjoy as we look forward to spring ...

A great value Haut-Médoc, perfect with a Sunday roast : Château Dasvin-Bel-Air, Haut-Médoc 2019 (Bordeaux)



This smooth, elegant wine is from the heart of the Médoc wine area, just to the north of the city of Bordeaux. A blend of Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon and Cabernet Franc. It has vanilla, blackcurrant and dark cherry on the nose, and blackcurrant and plum on the palate.

A hint of smokiness reflects the oak ageing and there is a slight earthiness in the finish. This is a well-balanced, medium-bodied wine with medium

tannins, offering very good value for money.

This is an excellent match for a Sunday roast and will also go well with hard cheese.

A nod to Spain in this Australian wine: Yalumba Y Series Tempranillo 2019/20 (South Australia)

A Radical Solution

You may recall a little chorus from school days that offered the sterling advice:

"Enmity, jealousy, malice, and pride, they must never in my heart abide."

Indeed, you may be able to recall a list of vices that came to be known as the 'Seven Deadly Sins'. Several versions have been presented as warnings against unhealthy living. In Proverbs Ch.6, we find, "a heart that devises wicked plans" and "hands that shed innocent blood". When writing to the church of Galicia, the Apostle Paul lists anger, disputes, dissensions, and strife, all of which we may witness any day in global issues.

Addressing these prevalent matters, back in the fifth century AD, a Christian governor called Aurelius Clemens Prudentius, composed a poem Psychomachia, in which he promotes seven virtues that may counteract the destructive power of these vices in everyday life.

Kindness, when applied with sincerity, will help to dissolve envy. But, in Luke Ch.16, Jesus enlightened his hearers as he described the ultimate time of accountability. A rich man enjoyed all the comforts of his wealth, whilst at his gate, disregarded, sat Lazarus, poor and in ill health, begging for the basic means of survival.

Inevitably, both men faced death. With a reversal of status in the afterlife, came a new realization of how God assesses the attitude of the heart. Too late, the rich man regretted his negligence.

Temperance was proposed as a helpful cure for gluttony; because a fit and healthy body enables one to provide active service towards the needs and stresses of others.

Charity or love overcomes greed by putting the desire to help others above the quest to store up a never-satisfying search for more of everything, an accumulation beyond reasonable need. The

treasure that is stored in Heaven endures when all else has passed away.

Chastity or self-control is a sure means of avoiding the pitfalls that have derailed the best intentions of many luminaries whose potential might have brightened the lives of others.

Humility counteracts pride and the need for boastfulness or setting oneself up as superior in value. When Jesus became the Servant King, he set the example for all who would follow him in offering the gifts of talents, energies and resources for the benefit and blessing of all.

Then comes diligence to overcome slothfulness and the temptation to prefer a life of ease and relaxation to one of application and industry.

Finally, patience: that rare and lovely quality that offers a listening ear, a calm attention, and an attitude of waiting, rather than the impatient response of wrath that generates conflict and distress.

This is indeed an arduous list, but we come back again to the promise that we are not left alone with our unreliable efforts and lack of enduring resolve. In his letter to the Ephesians, the Apostle Paul concedes that the old inner self is separate from God, without hope and always liable to stumble and fall.

Therefore, by faith and trust in the salvation won for us in the death and resurrection of Jesus, we can "put off the old self" and its corruption. Ch.4 v 23. "Be made new in the attitude of your minds, and put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness."

So, there we have it. Virtues and vices are always tugging in opposite directions, but we are offered the most perfect solution, the most enduring gift; a joyous relief that is a radical new heart, ours for the prayerful asking.

Rest is a gift from God

This devotional thought is by Xochitl Dixon, Our Daily Bread author.

Tossing and turning in bed, I fretted over my list of weekly tasks. Family, friends, and even people I barely knew depended on me. For the fourth night in a row, I watched the clock change to three a.m. before I fell asleep. The alarm I'd set for six a.m. shocked me into starting my day. I snapped at my husband, barked orders at my son, and rushed him into the car. I don't remember driving to his school. But I'll never forget watching his teacher close the classroom door before I headed outside and collapsed from exhaustion onto the playground. A friend drove me home and promised to care for my son until my husband returned from work. My neighbour prayed over me and stayed close by until I woke up... eight hours later.

God knows His children worry and sometimes try to do too much. He also knows how desperately we need down time to rejuvenate physically, emotionally, mentally, and spiritually.

In Psalm 62, David says his "soul finds rest in God" (v. 1). For this holistic revitalisation, David needed to be silent and still as he leaned into God's proven trustworthiness as our all-sufficient hope-giver, deliverer, and protector (vv. 5-7). Urging others to trust in God "at all times" by approaching Him with honest prayers, David demonstrates bold dependence on God and His power (vv. 8, 12). God didn't design us to be weighed down by worry or the need to meet everyone's needs. He does, however, prove His dependability. When we trust His constant presence and His power, we can worship Him by resting. What a priceless gift from God!


