Girton Parish Council

1. Public Meeting

Girton on the Move Please accept our apologies for the change of dates for the active travel meeting which was due to be held on 13th March. We have decided to change this to a bigger, more interactive event which families can attend on Saturday 22nd April from 10am to 1pm. Please watch our village noticeboards, website and social media for more information.

We hope to see as many of you as possible at this meeting to find out more about Girton Parish Council and the projects underway.

2. Annual Parish Meeting

Council approved the date of the Annual Parish Meeting to be held on Wednesday 10th May.

3. Recreation Charges

At our Full Council meeting it was confirmed that all GPC recreation charges would rise by 10% as recommended by the Sport and Recreation Committee. GPC charges have not gone up in three years and with costs rising it is now time to raise these charges to support sport and wellbeing in our village. The increase will apply for all recreation users from the 1st April or the beginning of their season. Thank you to the recreation users now co-opted to the Sport and Recreation Committee for their help in this discussion.

4. Bowls Club Working Group

The Bowls Club Working Group including representatives from GPC, GBC and GTC has now met four times to address availability of toilets for Bowls Club members. Cllr Marshall who chairs this group thanked all members for the discussions which had highlighted several options. As a result of these meetings, we expect to hold an extraordinary meeting, week beginning 27th March, to identify a solution for the 2023 Bowls Season.

5. Girton Corner Telephone Box

Thank you to three Girton residents who have submitted a business plan for the Girton Corner telephone box to become a library. The request from this group was for funding of £1,500 to be granted to support the refurbishment of the telephone box. This decision was delegated to the Chair and Clerk to assist with funding and the next steps.

6. Coronation Events

The Events working group have been working hard to provide a programme of events to take place over the Coronation weekend with the themes of bringing the community to take part in the Big Lunch and the Big Help Out. The working group are still working on the request for funding and will bring this request back to the extraordinary meeting. Full Council did approve a competition to take place to design a logo to be launched this year over the Coronation. More details to follow.

The idea is to get more young people involved in Parish Council initiatives.

7. Committee News

The Sport and Recreation Committee met on Tuesday 28th February, and we are pleased to welcome to this Committee, newly co-opted members Graham Clare and Alan Richard, representing the Bowls Club and Tennis Club respectively.

8. 20mph Scheme

Thank you to everyone who has commented on our survey which asks your views on extending 20mph zones in our village. At the time of writing this article we have received 195 responses to our survey and a small number of comments on our website.

Our survey was launched on Thursday 9th March and will be open till Tuesday 11th April to give you as much time to respond as possible. A copy is available on Pages 17-20 of this magazine.

In addition to your surveys, GPC now has four weeks of road speed data captured from Girton Road and is now collecting data in Thornton Road.

9. Neighbourhood Plan

At Full Council we continue to develop the initial stage of our Neighbourhood Plan (NP) with Girton Parish Council being approved as the qualifying body for the plan. Additional decisions approved at that meeting include:

- NP covering the whole of the electoral parish of Girton (including Eddington).
- Approving communication channels for the NP development.
- An approval under GDPR for GPC sharing of information with the NP team.

10. Bridleway 99/6

Our Chair has now asked Cambridgeshire County Council's Highways Committee about the stopping of bridleway 99/6. This was done without providing a replacement, nor determining that one was not required, which we take to be in contravention of the Planning Act 2008 under which the A14 works were undertaken. We hope to hear back from CCC soon following this question.

SCDC Business Plan

Aircraft Noise

A meeting was held in Little Gransden on 23rd February to discuss the research of aircraft noise and what needs to be done. Local MPs have spoken to the aviation minister but need to do more to push for a consultation or abandonment of the new AD6 routes which have aircraft flying over our villages.

The smartphone app FlightRadar24 will identify the offending aircraft.

Accidents on the A1307

There have been a number of accidents where the Avenue from Madingley meets the A1307: the road from Dry Drayton to Cambridge. There have been two accidents in a single week. Be aware when you pass the junction that some cars are not stopping at the end of the Avenue. The Police and County Highways have been informed about recent incidents but for the moment please take care.

Drink & Drug Driving

The Police have asked us to publicise the confidential hotline to report suspected drink or drug drivers. Last month more than 80 drivers were arrested on suspicion of driving under the influence as part of a force crackdown. The hotline: 0800 032 0845 is available 24/7. If someone is in immediate danger, always call 999.

Wood Fires

It was recently reported that wood burners triple the level of harmful particulates inside the home as well as creating dangerous levels of pollution in the surrounding neighbourhood.

Now experts at Asthma UK and the British Lung Foundation are asking people with wood burners only to use them if they have no alternative source of heat.

Photo ID for Elections

The Government has changed the rules so that everyone who votes needs to have photo ID or to have a postal vote. We are concerned about young people who will be voting, some for the first time, not having a current photo card. There are no elections in South Cambs in May but they are happening in the City and East Cambs. South Cambs will see how the scheme has worked in these areas to learn how to target our voters who might miss out.

Times are tough for businesses right now. The cost of doing business, fuel prices, supply chain issues and staffing shortages have all hit hard. Wild Girton

By the time you read this we should have had our Open Meeting on developing a Local Nature Recovery Plan for Girton. Thanks to all of you that attended and contributed, and watch this space for

further updates on the actions we agreed at the meeting.



Hedgehogs

As the weather finally begins to warm and we start to welcome back the first spring plants, we particularly look forward to our first hedgehog sighting of the year. A gardener's friend in the form of natural slug and snail control, less destructive than badgers and without the fox's trademark musk, the hedgehog must be a strong contender for Britain's favourite common wild mammal.

Hedgehogs are shy creatures and also nocturnal so estimating the size of their population is a tricky job. Conservationists have been known to rely on roadkill data or reports from gamekeepers on how many hedgehogs they accidentally kill each year! Regardless, there is an agreement that numbers have been decreasing since the 70s, and in 2020 hedgehogs were put on to the national red list as a creature at danger of extinction in the UK. There is some good news however: although numbers have been decreasing overall, there are signs that hedgehog numbers have been increasing in urban areas. This good news story can almost certainly be attributed to the actions of humans, either from attempts to help hedgehogs directly, or due to a shift holistically to a more nature friendly approach in urban gardening.

Supporting hedgehogs in our gardens is extremely simple to do. Actions to take include:

- Don't use slug pellets! Hedgehogs can eat up to 100 slugs per night and so can easily be overcome by the

poison from the pellets. There have also been reports of hedgehogs eating the pellets themselves.

- Provide access to water preferably a pond. Not only do the hedgehogs need to drink but having a pond in your garden will increase biodiversity and provide more for the hedgehogs to eat. It is extremely important however to provide a way for hedgehogs to get out of your pond should they fall in.
- Be lazy. Areas of uncut grass, piles of leaves, twigs, and logs, all provide sanctuary for insects and other culinary treats for hedgehogs.
- Provide accommodation. Prefabricated hedgehog houses are available from most garden centres and if you are up for DIY, plans are easily accessed online to make your own. Hedgehogs hibernate in the winter and they need somewhere safe to do that. Come spring, they will also use the shelter as somewhere to raise their hoglets.

The final and most important way in which hedgehogs can be helped is by providing them safe access to your and also your neighbour's garden. Hedgehogs are constantly searching for food and one garden is not enough to meet their needs. Studies have shown that

hedgehogs roam 2km on average each night and amorous males are more likely to clock up 3km! Roads are far from their preferred habitat, and having safe access to a network of gardens will



benefit them greatly. Guidelines for the creation of hedgehog holes in fences recommend a diameter of 13cm - just ensure, before you get your tools out and start cutting, that the fence belongs to you, or you have permission from your neighbours!

Tell us about your hedgehogs. As part of the Local Nature Recovery Plan, we would be very keen to know how many gardens in Girton have hedgehogs visiting. Do you have them in your garden regularly? Have you seen them in 2023 yet? Perhaps you have not yet seen them in the flesh but know they visit because of droppings they have left behind (distinctive in that they are almost black in colour and have many shiny pieces of insect carapace incorporated). Maybe your street already has a coordinated network of connected gardens? Please tell us about them by emailing: <code>lnrp@girton-pc.gov.uk</code> and we can start to build up a picture of Girton's hedgehog population.

GIRTON GARDEN SOCIETY SUMMER COACH TRIPS







You are invited to join our members on our coach trips which are planned for this summer to two well known gardens.

On Wednesday 21st June we are visiting the gardens and nature reserve at Pensthorpe near Fakenham in Norfolk (www.pensthorpe.com). The Millenium Garden was designed by Piet Oudolf and has 150 species of shrubs, grasses and climbers. There are various smaller gardens and many sculptures (see the website). Pensthorpe is also an internationally recognised nature reserve teeming with flora and fauna. There is much to see.

Access: Surfaces are grass, loose gravel, tarmac and boards. There are wheelchair friendly routes and electric scooters can be pre-booked.

Facilities: These include the Courtyard cafe, and a gift shop.

We will leave Girton Church bus stop at 9.15am and hope to return by 5pm. The cost, including coach and entry fee, is £31 per person.

On Wednesday 19th July we are visiting the world famous Beth Chatto Garden near Colchester, Essex (www.bethchatto.co.uk). There is so much to see here from the innovative gravel dry garden created on a former car park to the beautifully landscaped sloping lawns, dells and damp woodland areas. The planting is exquisite with some unusual plant combinations. There is a well stocked nursery where you can purchase plants propagated from the gardens.

Facilities: These include Chatto's tearoom, the nursery and gardener's shop. Food and drink may not be taken into the grounds but picnics are permitted in the adjacent field.

Access: The site is gently sloping with grass, bark, earth and gravel paths. Wheelchairs are welcome but pushing can be quite strenuous. There are many benches for a rest but the site is not really suitable for smaller mobility aids such as wheeled walkers because of the slopes and surfaces.

We will leave Girton Church bus stop at 9.15am and hope to return by 5pm. The cost including coach and entry fee is £31 per person.

"An Evening at Palm Court" by Girton Musical Theatre

"An Evening at Palm Court" was a sidestep from Girton Musical Theatre's usual full-blown G&S production. Staying with tradition, our evening commenced with Jerry Harrison's cleverly written and well sung house-keeping notes, followed by music from Girton's answer to the Palm Court Orchestra. The eighteen-piece orchestra under the baton of MD Patricia Davies, treated the audience to a few well-known orchestral pieces, taking us back to a more genteel era.

This interlude was followed by a one-act play written by Damian Trasler, "Murder in Twilight Gardens" about four amateur sleuths in a retirement home trying to solve a murder within their community. A neat little piece where the ladies, with the help of their activities manager, endeavour to make their perceived clues fit their chosen perpetrator.

The second part of the evening was back to Girton Musical Theatre's forte - Gilbert & Sullivan's "Trial by Jury". As with most Gilbert & Sullivan operas, the plot of "Trial by Jury" is somewhat ludicrous, but the characters behave as if the events are perfectly reasonable. The story concerns a 'breach of promise of marriage' lawsuit in which the judge and legal system are the objects of light-hearted satire. Costumes, particularly for the ladies, were, without doubt, lovely. This was another amusing piece to complete the evening. The whole programme was well thought out. Everything worked well together and, as always, there were a few little humorous quirks sneaked in to snag our attention.

Spring bulbs are still giving colour in April to our gardens, parks and meadows. After garden bulbs have flowered this month, use a tomato feed and do not cut leaves until they turn brown naturally to encourage a healthy flowering crop next year. Trees, shrubs and young plants also need feeding now to stimulate new shoots and plant growth. Use a fishbone and blood fertilizer with high Nitrogen factor. Phosphorous in the form of bone meal builds healthy roots in newly planted shrubs and vegetables and can be spread on borders without diluting.

We can bring instant colour to our gardens by planting primula and polyanthus in pots and front borders. Half-hardy flowers including nemesia, rudbeckia, cosmos and French marigold can be grown now under cover. Hardy annuals such as oxalis and clarkia can be sown indoors and outdoors. Be watchful for aphids on shoot tips and wipe off before they multiply. Cut away unwanted suckers around the base of trees and shrubs. Many garden plants are flowering earlier giving extra colour and this year for the first time my garden rosemary had flowers in January and my quince is out a good month earlier too.

Most top fruit and soft fruit are hardy, but spring flowers and buds are especially vulnerable to frost and may need protection to crop well. As perennials begin to grow, put in stakes to avoid stems being damaged. Tie in climbing and rambling roses to maintain the coverage you wish.

Ensure spare ground is well fed and raked and sprinkle seeds such as nigella, cosmos, and Californian poppies in any gaps in the beds. They should germinate in a matter of days. Not all bedding plants are hardy and shouldn't be planted out unprotected until after the last predicted frosts.

Early April is still good for pruning. Lavenders get straggly and do well with a hard prune. Cut back old brown fern fronds to make way for new ones starting to unfurl. I leave mine over winter for their autumn colours but cut back now and within weeks healthy new leaves unfurl.

Back now to regular lawn cutting. Do first cut at highest blade setting after a dry spell, followed with a good lawn feed. Gradually reduce blade height over coming weeks. If time, scarify lawns to remove old thatch and winter debris that starve lawns of light and air.

Pick a dry day to clean your patio. Remove pots and furniture, then brush with a stiff broom to remove debris and weeds. Regular pressure washer use can cause surface degradation, pitting and damage between slabs

as our patios age. Here are a few alternative methods, more time consuming but effective. Fill a watering can with warm water and mix in cup of washing liquid, soap or baking soda crystals. Pour across the area and scrub with broom. Alternatively pour over 50-50 solution of white vinegar and water. Leave to soak for 20 minutes, then go over with stiff brush. Mop with clean water. Leave to dry before replacing patio pots. If paving is particularly dirty, use more vinegar than water. You may need to repeat process next day for the best results. Always use white vinegar, as dark vinegar stains. White vinegar can damage some materials, so keep away from garden furniture. If you use a targeted patio weed killer spray, make sure to protect nearby plants.

When restocking garden pots perhaps reserve one pot for culinary herbs such as: dill, lemon balm, marjoram and thyme. Not forgetting a small pot of basil or parsley on our kitchen window ledge.

Signs and lines will be installed in line with current traffic and road safety manuals. If a new area is changing to 20mph local residents will be informed in advance. Signs will mark the entrance and exits of a 20mph area where the speed limit changes. Smaller repeat signs or on road markings will supplement these signs.

Process

Our questionnaire will be available until Tuesday 11th April. Members of the Parish Council's Environment committee will analyse your responses and prepare a proposal for Full Council on 13th April. This will allow us to meet Cambridgeshire County Council's deadline whilst giving you the longest possible response time. If successful, we anticipate working on detailed design and a formal consultation between September 2023 and March 2024. If agreed upon, construction would then go ahead March to July 2024.

On Thursday 2nd March, Girton Glebe Primary School


was a hive of colour and excitement as the children and staff dressed up as their favourite book characters to

April Wine Selection

As we begin to experience the joys of spring again, here is a selection of wines to tempt your taste buds.

A very appealing Rioja to brighten up any day: Baron de Ley Reserva 2018, Rioja (Spain)

Tempranillo is Spain's principal black grape variety and is grown widely throughout northern and central Spain. It is particularly associated with wines from Rioja,



located in the Ebro River Valley, around 60 miles south of Bilbao. This is a very appealing Rioja. It is a smooth well-balanced wine, with medium acidity, medium tannins, and a lengthy finish. Deep ruby in colour, it has aromas of plum, blackcurrant and cloves on the nose, and plum, cherry and chocolate on the palate. The barrel-ageing gives the wine additional characters of vanilla and oak. A wine which can be enjoyed by itself, but which also goes well with lamb, duck, or a roast vegetable dish.

A little gem from New Zealand: Main Divide, Riesling 2019 (New Zealand)



Although we might automatically think of Germany when we think of Riesling, the grape is very adaptable and is grown in many different parts of the world. With a preference for cooler, more temperate environments, it is quite at home in the Waipara Valley region on New Zealand's South Island. And this Main Divide 2019 is a fine example of a New Zealand Riesling. With floral, honey, orange peel notes on the nose and flavours of citrus fruits, nectarine, and honey on the palate, this is an off-dry wine with lively acidity and an unexpected

but very pleasant spritzig touch to it. A mediumbodied, well-balanced wine with a long finish, it will go well with seafood, duck, or a slightly spicy Asianinspired dish.

A refreshing white wine from Staffordshire: *Halfpenny Green Bacchus 2019 (Staffordshire)*



The Bacchus grape variety was created in the 1930s in Germany from a cross between Silvaner, Riesling and Müller-Thurgau. It is well suited to the UK climate and seems at home here. This delightful Bacchus wine from Halfpenny Green Wine Estate in Staffordshire is redolent of a walk through an English orchard. A light-bodied, dry white wine with refreshing acidity, it has aromas of apple and pear on the nose leading to a burst of similar flavours on the palate, together with additional overtones of white peach and lychee. It is a wine you can

enjoy by itself, and it also pairs very well with fish or chicken dishes.

Trustees report a successful year 2021/22 for GTC

This summary is extracted from the Trustee Report submitted with the Annual Report and Accounts for the year to 30th June 2022.

Progress in expanding the number of almshouses in Girton, increased use of the William Collyn Centre and take-up of Schemes and Grants on offer to residents, added up to a busy year for Girton Town Charity during 2021/22. The following are headlines from the report.

Almshouse provision

This year has seen major strides towards increasing the number of almshouses, available to the over 55's who are resident in or have a strong connection with Girton. Once completed, Dovehouse Court on High Street will provide 15 additional modern, energy-efficient homes, as well as a new office for GTC. Completion and handover is scheduled for Spring 2023.

William Collyn Centre

Following the decisions to move away from management of the Centre by Cambridgeshire ACRE, it is now run and managed by part-time Duty Managers.

Bookings from local groups, residents and organisations outside the Village have enabled the Centre to attract revenue to help defray the maintenance and staffing costs, with the difference met by GTC from unrestricted funds.

Grants awarded

A range of grants were made to benefit all sections of the community. These included the Educational Grant Scheme which provided assistance to 25 recipients towards buying books and equipment for recent school leavers who have moved on to further and higher education.

Trustees also awarded a grant to the Connections Bus Project to commence a weekly youth group operating from the Cotton Hall which is seeing regular use from residents.

A total of 30 grants were made to help individuals meet needs arising from a range of requests spanning support for special needs, enhancement of mobility and coping with medical conditions.

Twenty six residents were helped through the Care Plus Scheme which delivers support over and above that provided by statutory care. The Charity's Hospital Taxi Scheme continued to be popular and currently has 250 members who enjoy a subsidised taxi service to

get to hospitals on the Cambridge Biomedical Campus, Brookfields Hospital in Mill Road, and the ARU University Eye Clinic.

Community help

GTC continues to support Age UK's Community Warden Scheme to help around 20 Village residents who subscribe to the Scheme, as well as the Older Residents' Co-ordinator. Further grants were made to organisations such as St. Andrew's Church, Girton Glebe School and Girton Colts Football Club.

The Sculptural Railings continue to be enjoyed by residents and visitors alike, together with the Sensory Garden which is now well-established, used and much appreciated by Village residents. A contract with the design company provides maintenance of the garden on a weekly basis and it is anticipated that some replanting and upgrading will be required over the next 12 months.

Investments

The Charity's main source of income continues to be from investments, with additional revenue from the rental of almshouses, income from the Community Centre and a Gift Aid payment.

The Trustees successfully applied for a grant of £675,000 from Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) towards the construction of Dovehouse Court properties.

Reserves policy

GTC's primary objective is the provision of almshouses within Girton, ensuring that there are sufficient reserves to take opportunities as and when they arise. Its secondary objective is to make grants and provide other assistance to those who are in need, hardship or distress, generating sufficient income from its investments, on an annual basis, to meet its current and estimated future demands.

For longer-term maintenance of the almshouses, GTC makes provisions in line with the recommendations of the Charity Commission and the Almshouse Association for both cyclical and extraordinary repairs, and the funds are kept separately in appropriate investments.

Applications for an Educational Grant are invited from young people over 18 leaving secondary education and moving on to higher education and some training schemes or NVQ qualifications Level 4 and above.

The Grant covers books, equipment, tools or other direct costs relevant to the course and is a maximum of £300* per year for up to four years.

The next payment date for grant applications received will be July 2023.

Applicants must have lived in Girton for a minimum of two years immediately before leaving secondary education.

Updates from St Andrew's Church

As we prepare to celebrate Easter, Christians throughout the world are thankful for Jesus' defeat of death and showing the first fruits of a new created order in which all things will be made well. However, Christians are also aware that Easter is not only the promise of "pie-in-the-sky-when-you-die"!; Easter is also the promise of "steak-on-your-plate-while-youwait" (with apologies to any vegetarian readers).

Because we have no fear of death, followers of Jesus can live in joyful fullness of life in the present. Christian people throughout the ages have taken Jesus' promise of new life and have used it as a springboard to campaign against the social ills of the time. From providing medical care and education to the masses, to campaigning against the slave trade; to promoting higher standards in the prison estate; to Justin Welby's recent campaign against predatory "pay day lenders" - Christians are often found in the vanguard of social action.

At the moment we are concerned about social isolation and climate change. We have therefore been developing plans for some years to improve our church building to these ends. Over the summer our hope is to open the west end of the church and to introduce a servery into the north-west corner. This will enable us to provide more flexible space for the social events that

are so vital to the proper functioning of community life. We have also introduced an electric heating system that not only keeps us warm, but also reduces our need to burn gas. Once the refurbishment of the west end is complete our next iob will be to introduce solar panels onto the roof of the church to offset our increased energy

use and to make the building as carbon neutral as possible. (You can read more about our current plans on the church website: www.girton.church.)

We had a great World Book Day, with some brilliant costumes including: tigers, hungry caterpillars, the


smartest giant, Matilda and more. We read lots of stories together that day, and in the afternoon the children made their own books, making up the stories and drawing the illustrations.



The victory of Jesus at Easter

Easter is about the victory of Jesus over sin, evil and death through his sufferings and resurrection. The well-known hymn "Thine Be the Glory" is a favourite for Easter because it expresses this victory. The tune for the hymn was originally written by Handel for his oratorio, Joshua, for the chorus "See, the Conquering Hero Comes". This tune was appropriate because just as Joshua overcame evil through military force, Jesus overcame the invisible spiritual powers of evil, not by physical force, but by laying down his sinless life. Both Joshua and Jesus were conquering heroes. In fact, the Greek name Jesus is essentially the same as the Hebrew name Joshua, and it means "The Lord is salvation". This is the salvation we desperately need today.

"Lord, we thank you for your victory at Easter over sin and death. Help us to believe and to celebrate your resurrection at this Easter time. Amen."
