

We have extended our opening hours and are now open on a Tuesday afternoon from 2:00pm to 6:00pm. Nurse Sally and Dr Ho join us for this shift and of course the dispensary will be open. We are hoping that the extra hours, as well as us being open on a Monday from 3:00pm to 6:00pm, will offer up some flexibility when wanting to collect medications and make appointments.

Over the next few weeks, you may be asked some questions regarding your medications. This is purely an opportunity for us to ask if everything is OK, and for you to tell us if you have any issues with your medications that you would like to discuss. On the most part, one of the Girton team will be able to help you, but if it needs further input we will contact your GP. If you live within our dispensing area, and are registered with our surgery we can also fulfil scripts you are given from the hospital, dentist and private clinics.

Can we gently request that if appointments are being made for our younger members of the community that you make them for a suitable time? We have had some instances lately where appointments have been missed because "my child didn't get up in time"...

From 1 August you will start to see green stickers on your bags...yes! It will be flu appointment season!! We are having a flu surgery at Girton on 23 September. Many of our councillors were at the Girton Feast and really enjoyed hearing your views on the day.

Key points from our July Full Council Meeting

- Welcome to our new Parish Councillor Leslie Lampe, co-opted in our July meeting.
- The need to consider a civil burial ground for the future.
- GPC to work with organisations in the village on increasing food trucks in the village.
- Local Nature Recovery Group to work with Girton Glebe on a 'Green Fingers Club.'
- Need for more volunteers to help with Nature and Biodiversity in Girton.
- Holding more events to show what Girton has to offer! Look out for the Open Day (part of Open Cambridge) on September 11.
- A huge thank you to all the sponsors of the Village Planters. More information on this in September's edition of Girton Parish News.

Correspondence from residents to the Parish Council received this month.

Correspondence this month has focused on:

- Treatment of grass verges
- Fly tipping at Washpit Lane
- Emptying bins on Huntingdon Road and for the Feast
- Village planters

Many of the above have now been actioned or will be brought to Council in the next two months. Thank you to all residents who have raised topics for consideration and decision by Council. Please keep them coming. If the Clerk has missed any of your emails, then apologies - please contact us again.

Local Highways Improvement application

It was highly gratifying to see that the LHI application, made in conjunction with Oakington and Westwick Parish Councils, for introducing safety improvements on Oakington Road was scored very highly by the panel assessing the applications for South Cambridgeshire, with an average

score of 4/5, second of all the schemes in the district. That the panel agreed that demonstrable local support had been shown was particularly pleasing. We expect this means that the scheme will be highly prioritised by CCC. The Highways committee met on July 4th but, at time of writing, I have not seen the outcome of this meeting.

GPC logo competition

Congratulations to the winner of our Logo Competition, Alicia. Also, many congratulations to second and third place.

Thank you to all of you who took part in the competition, we were really pleased with the number of entrants. The winners of our Treasure Hunt Competition will be announced next month.

Hotel Felix inquiry

Thank you to the member of the public bringing a request to June's meeting to request GPC consider what action should be taken after receiving the result of the Hotel Felix inquiry. In July's Full Council a task was delegated to Cllr Muston and the Clerk to write to the appropriate bodies regarding the result of the inquiry to highlight the lack of health provision to support a care home on the Hotel Felix site. We will keep you posted on this initiative.

Fly Tipping at Washpit Lane

Thank you to our residents for reporting the fly tipping which could be quickly registered with SCDC as a result of you contacting us. Tens of bin bags were dumped and cleared by SCDC, who reported at July Full Council that they are now developing a service level agreement for any future incident.

Successful Performance outlined in year-end report

District Councillors heard about successful performances in a meeting on achievements in areas like environmental protection, affordable homes, and growing businesses.

Additionally, a "mystery shopper" update showed almost nine in ten people (88%) spoke to a contact centre team member on their first attempt when ringing South Cambridgeshire District Council and 100% were offered help or assistance.

The Business Plan Progress Report is a year-end report covering the council's four key areas: growing local businesses and economies, affordable housing, being green to the core, and being a modern and caring council. The reports were reviewed by SCDC's Scrutiny and Overview Committee on 8 June 2023, and you can check them here:

Making Connections - the next steps

On 21 June, the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) held an Extraordinary Joint Assembly/Executive Board meeting, and a separate Executive Board meeting, to discuss a revised package of measures to upgrade public transport, improve air quality, and cut congestion on the roads.

On Thursday 29 June, following a lengthy debate, the Executive Board outlined the need for the region's transport network to be upgraded to support its growing needs and decided that - while no options should be taken off the table at this stage - the original Making Connections scheme should be modified.

The five members of the board requested officers to develop a revised package of measures to transform the way people travel around Greater Cambridge, reflecting the public's feedback to the Making Connections consultation and following discussions with the Joint Assembly.

In the autumn a detailed proposal will be brought back to the GCP's Joint Assembly for scrutiny before the Executive Board decides how to proceed with any scheme.

The updated proposal could include changes to the operating hours of a Sustainable Travel Zone and a more extensive package of exemptions – including possible free days for account holders or no charge for hospital patients and visitors.

Any potential scheme would be phased in over time, with the GCP committing £50m of upfront investment in the region's transport infrastructure to improve public transport and active travel.

On Saturday 1 July, nine of us had a delightful walk from St Ives across Hemingford Meadow to the Hemingfords, returning via the convenient National Trust picnic tables at Houghton Mill!

Saturday 5 August: Cambourne – Caxton – Bourn

This is another attempt at the walk we had to abandon last year after a confrontation with Travellers! We start at 10am at the car park for the Cambourne Nature Reserve (CB23 5AB is the nearest postcode) and walk through the nature reserve and on to Caxton, then turn east towards Bourn and return through the reserve. Girton Garden Society

Welcome to August! At this time of year many people are leaving their gardens for a fortnight while they go away on holiday. What to do about all those plants? Although so far this year has not seen the

searing heat of last year, Cambridge can often be very hot, so it's probable you will need to take precautions. The best thing to do is to join Girton Garden Society and prevail upon a kind fellow member to keep an eye on your plants while you're away – but if not, here are some of the tricks I have found useful over the years.

Outdoor containers: move them somewhere shady and give them a good soaking – in fact overwater them. Move them first, as they will be a lot heavier when they're wet. For crops grown in containers and grow bags, I recently tried empty cartons, with holes punctured in the lid. Fill them with water and place them upside down, somewhere secure against wind rock (e.g., against canes), on your containers. It worked quite well, although I realised afterwards that you need to puncture two holes: one causes clogs, more allows too much to drain away too fast. Tetra packs and rigid bottles worked better than milk cartons.

House plants: the recommended method is to use capillary matting with one end in a large tub of water and stand the plants on the other end of the matting. They need to be at a lower level than the container with water. I now do the overwatering trick just before I go away. Leave them with water in their saucers. Plants can still wilt with this method, but mine have always survived.

If you want to be ambitious, there are self-watering systems with varying levels of sophistication, and a timer attached to the garden tap. I have only used them when we had just had the garden re-landscaped, and a new lawn laid. It was a faff, but it worked. I found that having leaky hoses all along the beds and the lawn was fine until winter came, and then taking them up, re-reeling them and finding somewhere to store them, was a nuisance, so after that we abandoned the system. We now leave the permanent planting, and crops in the ground, to look after themselves.

Another summer task is pruning anything in the plum/cherry/peach (Prunus) family. At any other time of year, there is a risk of silver leaf, a fungal infection. We have a very big red cherry tree quite close to the house, with splendid red leaves. We loved that tree when we first came, but familiarity breeds contempt, and I am increasingly aware that it is a very untidy tree. So, much to our (adult) children's alarm, we have bought one of those Henchman tripod ladders and are taking the offending shoots off, a few every summer.

I couldn't finish without an update on our war of attrition. Sadly, the squirrel is winning. It has dug up every crocosmia bulb in the garden, snapped off all my tulip and peony heads, raided the figs and strawberries while they were still green, and dug holes in the lawn, yet still has the temerity to scamper happily about. I am now off to Google "squirrel proof planting". Have a good summer!

Wild Girton

Girton's traditional orchards

In May 1914, just before the outbreak of the First World War, Bidwells held an auction of properties in Girton at the Red Lion Hotel in Petty Cury. Among the successful bidders

that day was Charles Coe, who bought lot 12, shown on the map that accompanied the sale. There he planted an orchard that still exists today, although the Coe family sold the property in 1992. At the end of the nineteenth century and into the first half of the twentieth, there were many such orchards in Girton and some of them are shown on the sale map. (You can find others on historic Ordnance Survey maps of the area.)

Like other orchard keepers in the villages around Histon, the Coes would have found a ready market for their produce through the Chivers enterprise that delivered fruit to London by rail as well as making jam in their factory. Over the course of the twentieth century, however, the market for locally produced fruit declined and just two of the old orchards survive intact in Girton now – Lot 12 at the top of Manor Farm Road and the orchard at Girton College. Nonetheless there are undoubtedly fragments of other old orchards – single trees or groups – surviving in the gardens of Girton to this day.

In an old orchard, the trees, the land they stand on and the hedges that surround them, are habitats of immense value, a bulwark against declining biodiversity where a variety of species can survive and prosper. The old fruit trees were grafted to standard rootstocks that produce the magnificent, tall, widely spaced and longlived fruit trees that are typical of a traditional orchard. The dwarfing rootstocks that make

short (and shorter lived) fruit trees that grow in dense plantings in intensively managed modern orchards only began to be widely adopted by commercial growers in the mid-twentieth century.

Traditional orchards combine aspects of many different habitats into a mosaic of features that allows a wide variety of animals and plants to interact and thrive. The tall open canopied trees and the grasses on the orchard floor are akin to open woodland with underlying meadow, while the surrounding hedges provide thicker cover for nesting and hibernating, and ponds and ditches are a source of water and damp marshy environments.

We can see the web of interactions between the species of animals, plants and fungi within this mosaic unfold as the orchard year moves through its seasons. In April and May, the glorious months of reappearing leaves and abundant blossom, the flowering trees provide a rich source of food for pollinators such as bumblebees, while the tussocky meadow grasses are an ideal place for their nests. Birds such as tits, jays, woodpeckers and owls will be building their nests and rearing their young within the nooks, crannies and hollowed out trunks of mature and ageing trees.

As the grass grows, together with flowering plants such as vetches and orchids, it provides food for caterpillars that in turn will feed hungry young birds, while the survivors will emerge as butterflies that swarm through the orchard in high summer, searching for nectar among the wildflowers and the hedge brambles. The fruit harvest from late July onwards is enjoyed by humans and animals alike – foxes and badgers, birds, butterflies, wasps and many more all feast on the fruit, either on the trees or as windfalls. This is the season too for cutting the grass and raking it off, either for compost heaps or to be used as mulch around the trees. The warmth of the rotting hay is an ideal refuge and egg laying site for grass snakes

With the onset of winter, the fallen fruit is a vital food source as it rots and in December and January, resident birds are joined by flocks of migrating fieldfares and redwings to squabble over the pickings that remain. This yearly sequence occurs against the longer cycle of growth and decay in the orchard trees. As they mature and age, the trees accumulate a patchwork of mosses and lichens and fungi. Dead and decaying branches and trees, standing or fallen, are ideal habitats for insects and other invertebrates that feed on rotting wood.

The resilience and richness of the orchard depends on the interconnected mosaic of habitats and species that

it provides and supports. The gardens of Girton are another such mosaic and several, perhaps many of them, contain fragments of old orchards in the form of mature and ageing fruit trees. These trees are significant for more than their fruit, so it doesn't matter if your old plum or apple tree is rather feeble and unproductive, it is doing so much for the environment! The more we know about this mosaic, the more we can promote and preserve the interconnectedness on which it depends.

New Study shows additional benefit of Almshouse living

Girton Town Charity's almshouse residents often highlight how much they enjoy the opportunity to live independently in a supportive community – but there are other benefits too as a recent report by the Bayes Business School* has shown.

Currently 36,000 people live in 2,600 almshouses in the UK which vary in terms of location, size and eligibility criteria.

Girton connection

GTC currently provides 28 properties within the Village,



intended for those living in, or with a strong connection to Girton, including 15 recently completed apartments at Dovehouse Court.

Some are designed for families to enable them to save and move into their own housing in due course and others are for active retirees who can live independently.

The findings of the Bayes Business School study focused on almshouses for active retirees and found that in general, residents enjoyed longer lives than those living elsewhere – around two years on average.

Supportive community

Some of the reasons for this included the benefit of living independently in a supportive community where there was a sense of belonging, with like-minded neighbours who could provide companionship.

Often, as in the case of Dovehouse Court, almshouses are constructed on three sides of a quadrangle around a central communal garden, with attractive planting and scating to encourage social interaction.

Ann Bonnett, Chair of GTC said: "It is good to see that there are positive benefits of almshouse living, highlighted in this latest study. We know from our own residents that they appreciate being able to live in wellbuilt, energy-efficient homes alongside others with whom they can socialise if they wish. There are opportunities for communal gardening in the raised vegetable beds and the support of GTC's office near by.

"This avoids the problems caused by loneliness and isolation which can arise if older residents live alone and without regular interaction with others."

How it works

GTC's almshouses are let as unfurnished homes and subject to different legal arrangements from private, council or housing association tenancies.

Residents are 'appointees', not 'tenants', live in the house under licence and pay a maintenance contribution, not rent. As they are almshouses, there is no 'right-to-buy' or opportunity for shared equity.

Residency for under 55's is limited to a maximum of three years. Over 55's or in the case of disability, appointments are made for as long as the resident is able to live independently.

All residents sign a Letter of Appointment which clearly states the terms and conditions of residency.

Being Chosen

At the moment I'm watching the brilliant, independently funded TV series "The Chosen." It tells the life of Jesus through the eyes of those chosen by Jesus to follow him in his earthly ministry. As well as telling the story, the series also creatively and respectfully tries to fill in some of the gaps left by the gospel writers. (What does Jesus mean when he says to Nathanael: "I saw you under the fig tree" in John 1:48? Why is Nathanael so amazed by this? Watch series two episode two to find out!)

Part of the brilliance of the series is the way each of Jesus' chosen followers must make sense of their own calling and that of others. Matthew is portrayed as a socially awkward genius-with-numbers, and he and his fellow-chosen grapple with why Jesus would call someone who has spent his whole working life in league with the occupying Roman powers. Peter, James, and John can all be bossy and self-important, and difficult for the others. Mary Magdalene struggles with her own past, as well as wondering about why she, a woman, has been chosen in a way so contrary to cultural expectations at the time. Thomas often feels like a bit of an outsider.

All of them struggle to understand who Jesus is and why he does things that, to their eyes, are so unexpected (or even plain wrong). They feel exhilarated and unworthy at the same time, but gradually come to see how Jesus uses each of the gifts and experiences that they bring to the group.

The wonderful news is that Jesus still calls people. He still chooses people to work with him and for him for the sake of the Kingdom of God. He uses our skills, our experiences (good and bad) and our abilities and makes them more than we thought they could be.

Perhaps you've sometimes wondered about who Jesus is. Perhaps you've been following him for decades. Perhaps you want something new to watch! I certainly recommend The Chosen. You might even find that Jesus has chosen you for something!
