Bowls Club

Girton Parish Council was pleased to see five members of Girton Bowls Club attending our Full Council meeting on 13th September 2023. Thank you to Roger Webster for speaking in the public participation session at the beginning of the meeting. There has been a working group including GBC, GTC and GPC looking at facilities for Wellbrook Way at the bowling green since January 2023. Provision of toilets, including disabled access, and provision of a club house – both on the bowling green - were approved by councillors. The next step is to get these facilities in place and agree the terms and conditions for use. Grants are being sought to assist with the funding.

Maintenance person/Parish Ranger

At September Full Council, there was also approval for the engagement of a maintenance person/Parish Ranger to allow the council to become more proactive in required maintenance and asset management throughout the village. This position has been approved for 6 months to allow GPC to undertake a backlog of work and to consider what this position should look like going forward. Pavement/road issues in Girton (CCC Highways)

As you will have seen from Cllr Edna Murphy's report there is a new local Highways Officer. He has already walked a number of areas in Girton that have been raised by residents and by GPC for review. We have worked with him to ensure all these issues are logged on the CCC fault reporting website and have feedback that work will be undertaken. This project continues and we hope the red/white barriers will have been replaced with stainless steel bollards by the time you read this. What this project has highlighted is the full available width of the path leading to the Recreation Ground as cars are parking further back. Thank you to our contractor Michael Church of MC Garden Maintenance for treating the weeds on the path to improve the path to further improve the entrance to Girton Recreation Ground.

Litter Bin Replacement program

Girton Parish Council continues its replacement of dog poo bins with the new SCDC combi bins which have a greater capacity, and which take both types of waste. Three bins are now in place at

decade! Hopefully there are many "quick wins" amongst them so we can see and appreciate their input to the parish.

The table left is a balanced cross section of the (some edited) summaries provided in the survey. Much is positive but there are clearly aspects to be addressed.

The most common thread (392) comments) revolved round "facilities." The GPN and The Glebe received the most plaudits among many parish institutions praised and valued. However, lack of other facilities for general living and working dominated (around 70% or responses). Life in Girton is clearly not wanted to all be about houses. That said, 30 out of 39 responses about housing were about the lack of affordability and types for young to middle aged residents.

It is probably no surprise to you that the next most common aspect was "transport and traffic" (310 responses of which only 5% gave it as a strength). The bus service is clearly a widespread bone of contention, as is looking for improved cycle inter-

connectivity. The Neighbourhood Plan can build on the latter, but it is for local councils to push the former.

While 89% of 36 responses considered the linear nature of the built-up area to be a negative feature, over two thirds of 148 responses commented positively on the overall sense of community. We seem to be long and thin, but well joined up in spirit.

Of 110 responses concerning "development," 83 saw threats in being swamped by Eddington and Darwin Green, or in having new housing but without necessary associated facilities. There is obviously work to be done regarding making the new areas of housing being a perceived benefit to Girton.

From Our Councillors

County Councillor's Report

Public transport improvements are needed

Although the congestion charge is not going ahead, efforts by the County Council and the combined authority to improve public transport, are continuing. The consultation on the Sustainable Travel Zone scheme had produced an overwhelming response from the public in support of improvements to public transport, albeit for funding not to come from the Greater Cambridge Partnership's congestion charge. A key issue now is to ensure that the combined authority commissions bus services are of a better quality than they are now. This means bus reform – either 'enhanced partnership' or 'franchising'. The latter gives the authority much more control over what service is provided, and how it is delivered. It is important to ensure that we get a different kind of service than what is provided now. It will be important to consider how to pay for improvements, there are a number of options to consider, including government funding.

Path resurfacing request successful

Thank you to all the work that has gone into calls for resurfacing work on Woody Green. The footpath, connecting Duck End and St Vincent's Close, has been in an appalling state for some time. Despite great pressures on funding the project to resurface this footpath has finally been given the go ahead! The work should be done some time before spring next year.

Parish application for 20mph speed limit through the village – results out soon

The decision on Girton Parish's application for 20mph is awaited eagerly and I hope very much it will be successful. There has been a very large number of applications throughout the county, and demand far outstrips the resource to allow all applications through. It is encouraging that so many believe that reducing traffic speed, and thus improving safety for pedestrians and cyclists, is a positive step for a community to take. Keeping fingers firmly crossed for this initiative!

Flood risk mitigation investigation – update from Environment Agency

Following on from my update in last month's Girton Parish News, here is an update from the

Environment Agency team on their progress and plans:

We are reassessing the fluvial flood risk to the village of Girton from the Washpit and Beck Brooks, and investigating whether a scheme is viable to help manage the risk and consequence of flooding. Potential options for a fluvial flood risk mitigation scheme have been investigated previously though a scheme was determined to be unaffordable under the HM Treasury funding rules prior to 2012.

With updates to the funding policy, we have been reviewing what has been considered to date and looking at other options that should also be considered. Using updated hydraulic modelling we will test these options to assess their feasibility and affordability. It is possible however that we still may not be able to deliver a scheme if affordability and funding challenges cannot be overcome.

Over the next few months, we will be going through the process of assessing the potential options to alleviate fluvial risk from the Washpit and Beck Brooks to make the community more resilient to flooding. We will be asking those that have an interest in the scheme to get involved in this process to help us identify options that we could consider. More details regarding how we intend to gather this information will come out in the coming months.

Letter to the editor

It has come to our notice that, whilst the majority of

dog walkers behave responsibly, a small number do not. We have witnessed dogs being blatantly taken across the children's play area, the football fields and cricket pitch, despite notices on the gates telling them not to do so.

We are all aware of tragic cases that occasionally hit the headlines, of young children and babies being attacked by dogs. "Not my dog, he wouldn't harm a fly" we hear you say – but dogs and children are both unpredictable, and either could stimulate an attack.

Dog poo is also a very real problem in our village. Again, the majority of dog owners act responsibly, pick up the poo, dispose of it in an approved place, or take it home. Nonetheless, dog poo litters the dog walking areas, often being cleaned up by other dog owners (to whom we are very grateful), or, almost worse, put in plastic bags and hung up in hedgerows.

So, please, dog walkers of Girton, use the approved dog walking route and pick up any poo they leave behind. Maybe visitors to our village may not know the guidelines so please inform them.

We don't want to spoil anyone's pleasure in walking their dog. But these small adjustments to your dog walking habits will go a long way to making Girton a safer and pleasanter place to be for everyone.



As the autumn evenings start to draw in, here are three interesting wines to help keep your spirits up ... Cheers!

A refreshing Grüner Veltliner from Hungary

TI A fre th TI gr ap

Little Cricket Grüner Veltliner 2021 (Hungary)

Though Grüner Veltliner is perhaps best known as Austria's signature grape, this very good wine from neighbouring Hungary is a fine example of this grape variety.

This is a refreshing, crisp wine with aromas of green apple and pear on the nose, and flavours of apple, melon, citrus fruits, and a hint of pepper on the palate. A dry wine with a lengthy finish, this is a very agreeable wine to drink by itself, or as an

ideal match for a salad or seafood dish. It will also go well with a slightly spicy Asian dish.

A rich, flavourful Chardonnay from SE Australia



PepperBox Chardonnay 2022 (South Eastern Australia)

Although an oaked Chardonnay may not be to everyone's taste, this PepperBox Chardonnay from the Casella winery in New South Wales, is a very good wine.

With pineapple, mango and vanilla aromas on the nose, and tropical fruits on the palate, this is a wine with plenty of character, a creamy mouthfeel, and a smooth buttery finish.

It can be enjoyed by itself, or with a seafood or poultry dish.

A smooth, enticing blend from the Kent Downs



Meopham Valley Vineyard Union Red 2022 (Kent)

This smooth red wine from Meopham Valley Vineyard in the North Kent Downs is a blend of Pinot Noir, Regent, Triomphe and Léon Millot grape varieties.

Aromas of bramble, cherry, and blackberry on the nose lead to flavours of black fruits, chocolate and coffee on the palate, and the nine months' oak barrel ageing gives a hint of spice and smokiness.

A well-balanced wine with medium acidity and medium tannins, this is a very appealing wine that can be enjoyed by itself or with a warming autumn casserole.





Last winter brought some devastation to gardens. Shrubs such as *Hebe, Pittosporum, Choisya, Ceanothus*, winter flowering clematis and star jasmine died or were damaged.

The Royal Horticultural Society advice now is to plan for all extremes of weather and this after advice for many years has been to plant drought tolerant species. Last summer was so hot and dry but winter was particularly harsh. Then February 2023 was the driest for 30 years while March was the wettest for 40 years. It seems that plants find it harder to deal with fluctuations in temperature and to cope with waterlogged soil and then dry soil. So do check on the hardiness of plants before buying and plant diverse plants which can deal with extreme heat and others that can deal with extreme rain or cold.

To reduce winter weather damage, organic material such as well-rotted manure or composted bark or mixtures including spent compost from pots can be used to mulch plants around the base and up to 4 or 5 inches deep. Plants in pots should have their saucers removed, placed on supports and be moved near to the shelter of the house or a warmish greenhouse. Horticultural fleece can be wrapped around pots and it is possible to put bubble wrap under the fleece, and to also cover the earth around the base of the stem/s while leaving some room to breathe. However, do check as some plants may need some water in a dry autumn/winter. Horticultural fleece can also be placed over vulnerable plants and shrubs in the garden. Plants could be moved to less cold parts of the garden. I lost one star jasmine but another in a more sheltered spot survived. Advice is to keep an eye on the weather.

On a positive note, loads of plants survived and we can enjoy the autumnal jewel colours of asters and dahlias, chrysanthemums, the vivid blue of *Ceratostigma* and *Caryopteris*, and the lovely Fuchsia magellanica with their fountains of paler flowers. Shrubs and trees with reddish leaves at this time of the year include the stunning acers, *Euonymus alatus* and various *Sorbus* species such as mountain ash, and many have stunning berries such as *Vibernum opulus* and holly.

October garden jobs include planting spring bulbs and evergreen shrubs. I now regret not taking photos of the garden throughout the year. I forget where spring bulbs are planted and that some plant and colour schemes need improvement and now is the time to transplant.

Time now to empty and clean water butts. A last mowing of the lawn is worth doing, with perhaps spiking to avoid water logging. Although it is time to rake up leaves for leaf mould, it is important to collect and destroy (not compost) leaves from shrubs and roses with black spot, fungus damage, mildew, etc. Put grease bands around trunks of fruit trees. Prune climbing roses and other dormant shrubs, cutting about 0.5 cm at an angle to let water roll away from the stem and cutting above a healthy and outward facing bud. Seek out bare rooted plants and shrubs, which are cheaper than pot grown but plant speedily. Autumn is also the time to take cuttings and collect seeds and the topic of propagation will be discussed in the Girton Garden Society meeting in October.

Girton W.I.

Our President welcomed us all back to the W.I. after our summer break and introduced Geoffrey Heathcock who is the

Branch Chairman and Presenter of the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. He started his talk by informing us that the Institution is the largest charity that saves lives at sea around the coasts of the United Kingdom, the Republic of Ireland, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man. He was most interesting to listen to and filled us in with many situations that occur whereby the lifeboats are called out to help, and I hasten to add not all calls are necessary. He began his lifeboat career 32 years ago as a volunteer, and at present, they have 400 volunteers who do not receive payment for their training. The running costs are huge, and last year it cost £188m to run their lifesaving service all funded by their generous supporters: as keeping a modern fleet of lifeboats ever ready to go to the rescue from 238 lifeboat stations is an expensive business. They also do not get any help from the

government. Lifeboats can do 250 mile round trip. Sometimes the coastguards get hoax calls from young people calling them for help when they are not needed and therefore a waste of time. Incidentally the Duke of Kent is their President, and he named a new lifeboat in Norfolk called "The Duke of Edinburgh," to commemorate the Duke of Edinburgh's long-standing commitment to maritime services.

We thanked Geoffrey Heathcock for coming along to give us such an interesting talk.



News & Events

Thanks to everyone who attended the Open Evening at Town End Close nature reserve on September 11th. We had some interesting sightings around the pond and reserve.

The Local Nature Recovery Plan Group is holding another village Open Meeting at the Pavilion on Wednesday 4th October at 7.30pm. This is our chance to update the village on the progress of the plan and get your views on what should happen next. We also have some exciting news of plans for the Hibbert-Ware Memorial Garden (opposite St Andrew's Church). All welcome! Please do come along.

What you can do in October

October may be the month where we really feel the transition towards winter, but it can still throw up some warm, balmy days. It is a great month for photography as the shadows lengthen and the trees turn from green to gold.

Wildlife sightings can be spectacular. The autumn bird migrations reach their peak as the last of our summer visitors; swallows and warblers, leave our shores to be replaced by birds coming to spend their winters here.

A lot of this movement happens without us being aware, yet as we sleep millions (yes, millions) of birds are moving overhead. But step outside on a moonlit evening and you may be able to catch a glimpse, or more likely hear some of the birds that are migrating over our sleeping towns and villages. The most commonly heard call is the thin 'tseep' of migrating Redwings, a thrush that visits us from Scandinavia.

Sometimes this migration is visible during daylight hours too – Cambridge ornithologist Simon Gillings once clocked up over 1000 Redwings over his house in a two-hour morning session.

We know more about this invisible migration taking place at night due to the advent of 'noc migging' - the use of audio recording equipment left on all night where birders use computer software to analyse the resulting 'sonograph' (a visual representation of the sounds heard) to see which birds were passing overhead. The aforementioned Simon Gillings is one of the leading exponents of this technique and he has recorded sea ducks Sandwich Terns, and waders alongside the expected winter thrushes and finches.

The results of this migration can become apparent in Girton too. Take a walk around our farmland this month and you may find Redwings and Fieldfares feeding on autumn berries in the hedgerows. And closer to home, you may well find the Blackbirds or Robins on your bird table are not the same birds that were present during the spring and summer. Instead they may be birds that have

flown here from the Continent to enjoy warmer winters here.

Autumn berries are a feature of this month, resulting in some spectacular displays. And while the main flowering season is over, it is surprising how many plants you can find in bloom if you keep your

eyes peeled. October flowers can include White Campion, Devil's Bit Scabious, Sneezewort, Catsear, and Chicory amongst others. Teasel seed heads will host flocks of Goldfinches.

But one of the most important flowers at this time does not look like a flower at all. It is the flower of Ivy, a much derided and underestimated plant which hosts a large variety of breeding birds and insects in the spring and summer and is equally important for our late-flying pollinators - bees, butterflies and moths. So if you have any ivy in your garden, please do not hack it down but

leave it to flower to benefit our invertebrates. Those butterflies and moths also have their last hurrah this month. Butterflies to look out for include Red Admirals, Commas, and Peacocks. There are also some spectacular

moths to be found including the Brimstone, the Frosted Orange, and the Light Emerald. If you have the chance to attend a moth trapping session, do so. You won't be disappointed.

Finally, October is one of the best months to go looking for fungi. Care should be taken as some mushrooms can be poisonous, but this should not put you off from hunting down some of the most fantastic structures and shapes nature has to offer. Look out for bracket fungi that grow out of tree trunks, fly agarics (look like the traditional red capped toadstools from children's books), puffballs, and inkcaps.


There are growing numbers for our popular indoor Kurling sessions, as well as many people enjoying the other fitness/




