

# **Girton Parish Council**

# Council tax precept

Girton Parish Council (GPC) is beginning to consider the village precept for 2024/2025. Over the last five years the precept, which is the amount of your council tax

that goes to GPC to provide local services and maintain GPC assets, has been raised by only £7.03 for a Band D house (2023 raise 92p). Girton's precept is also lower than most of the surrounding villages.

### Girton Glebe assembly

Cllr Muston and the GPC clerk were lucky enough to attend an assembly at Girton Glebe school on 9th October 2023. We were there to present awards to all entrants of our GPC logo competition and our Coronation Crown competition and while we were there, we asked the students to tell us:

- 1. What they think would be the best name for Girton Parish Council by filling in a short online survey. We would like your help too. What do you think is the best name for your local council? Circle the name you like best on the poster on page 11 of this Parish News and drop through the Girton Recreation Ground letter box.
- 2. What would make Girton's Play Parks great for more details see the separate poster on page 28 of this Parish News.

We are thrilled that we are already receiving responses. Thank you! We hope to give you the results in December's Girton Parish News.

### Girton's LHI bid with Oakington and Westwick

Following on from GPC's successful LHI bid to reduce speed on Oakington Road to 30mph it is extremely pleasing that the application to extend the existing 20mph zone all the way to Huntingdon Road was successful, being ranked 4th in the county for all applications.

A great deal of time and effort was put into this application, resulting in it being of a high standard and, most importantly, effective. Thanks to everyone who was involved in this process, in particular the hundreds of residents who responded to the public consultation, allowing us to show that the proposal was one clearly supported by a majority of the village, and identified as an important safety measure.

# Responsibility for trees & development of tree policy for GPC

GPC has been working with a number of residents to confirm responsibility for trees that may be on GPC, Cambridgeshire County Council or South Cambridgeshire District Council Land. We have funded a tree survey of one of these trees which took place on Monday 16th October to further understand

GPC's responsibilities for our trees and green spaces and to inform a future GPC tree policy.

GPC has also been looking at improving some of our green spaces at Wellbrook Way and Mayfield Road. We also have an ask that all of you will be looking at your green areas and cutting back. See our poster below which will be going up on all noticeboards and local social media.

# Council programme to replace dog poo bins with new combined litter bins

The bins approved in June full council are now being delivered and installed. Thanks to South Cambs District Council who have provided the budget for the replacement litter bin outside Girton allotments.

**Recreation Ground car park safety improvements** 

Bollards have now been fitted at the recreation ground car park. Many thanks to S J Pollard for fitting the bollards with minimal disruption. Thanks also to everyone who gave feedback and suggested that GPC need to consider the car park markings as well. GPC has now approved full markings of all bays and the work should have been completed by the time you read this.

Wellbrook Way Play Area/Girton Recreation Ground Repair work to the surfaces at Wellbrook Way play area were completed on 17th October. Meanwhile, GPC have been pursuing the fitting of the two table tennis tables at Girton Recreation Ground and are considering extending the base of these tables to improve the playing area.

### Be a hedgerow helper!

Now that the nesting season is over it's time for all of us to take a good look at our hedges and shrubs!



If you have plants that are right next to roads, pavements or footpaths, now is the perfect time to check them and ask the question, is this blocking the way of my fellow residents? A number of residents have pointed out places where hedges, shrubs, and trees make it difficult to get past, especially on our pavements.

Please check any of your vegetation that adjoins public paths and see if it strays onto the path. Think about whether someone in a wheelchair or pushing a buggy would struggle to get past without having to go onto the road or into a (potentially muddy) verge. Think about whether someone might get a nasty surprise from a stray overhanging branch.

It is the responsibility of all landowners (including the Parish Council) to make sure that plants from their property don't obstruct public highways, pavements and rights of way. In the coming months we will look at any obstructions that remain and start to take action where necessary.

If your plants are causing a nuisance, but you are struggling to cut them back, please get in contact with the Parish Council and we will try to help you out.

The terrible state of Girton's pavements hasn't helped, but we have been pushing the County Council to attend to these and we have been told that there will be a number of repairs in the next few months.

So, please be a hedgerow helper and make it as easy as possible for everyone to get around Girton!

# **County Councillor's Report**

### More 20mph schemes get the green light

Girton Parish Council has been successful again! This time it's been confirmed that their application to extend 20mph throughout the village has been approved. It was a competitive field but even so Girton's application scored highly.

The County Council is keen to find additional funding to increase the number of applications it can support. With 88 applications received, it is clear that this type of road safety measures are very popular with residents and local communities.

# **Huntingdon Road/Eddington lights – cycle safety concerns continue**

During the summer the phasing of the lights turning right to Eddington were changed to see if this reduced the backing up of congestion, and thus pressure on cars to drift into the cycle lane.

Officers have now been back to check what the situation is now that the new year's patterns have settled and it is clear that while the phasing has made some difference it has not substantially affected the way in which traffic moves into the cycle lane. Officers are now looking to secure funding for installing wands along the most affected part of the cycle lane as a way to actively discourage cars, vans and buses from physically encroaching into the cycle lane.

# Weeds and street sweeping

At the County Council's Highways & Transport Committee meeting on 3rd October the issue was raised on the relationship between weeds and street sweeping. Some residents have complained about debris from unswept streets (District Council) being caught up in weeds from uncleared gutters and gullies (County Council). County officers are now working with District Council officers about how better to align and coordinate the management of our streets, kerbs, gullies and gutters.

# Free vehicle checks

A series of free vehicle checking events is being organised around the county throughout October, in support of the national campaign for safer vehicles. Members of the public are invited to attend a free vehicle check session, where they will be taught how to conduct a simple check on their own vehicle and spot potentially dangerous problems. The check consists of examining tyre condition and tread depth, ensuring correctly working external lights and correct washer fluid levels. A free top-up of screen wash will be offered and help with future checks.

The events are being delivered by the Vision Zero Road Safety Partnership, of which Cambridgeshire County

Council is an active member. The partnership aims to reduce the number of road traffic collisions across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough and for zero deaths on the county's roads by 2040. CFRS is urging residents to keep in mind some simple steps when using electrical devices, especially those with Lithium-Ion batteries. The idea is that by following a few simple safety measures, like adding fire safety as a bedtime routine and being awake when using and charging some devices or appliances, people can keep themselves and their families safe in their homes.

# Free Electric blankets will help residents most in need this winter

South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) is offering 532 residents the opportunity to claim a free electric blanket (also known as a heated throw) as a cost-effective alternative to central heating. Residents selected to qualify will be those who are (as of 1st July 2023) claiming Council Tax Support and Attendance Allowance, PIP or disability living allowance at the higher rate.

Qualifying residents will receive a letter in the coming weeks from the council telling them they are eligible and how to claim their free blanket. Only people who receive a letter will be able to claim a free blanket.

Analysis has shown that running an electric blanket costs just 5p per hour, compared to an average central heating cost of £2.03 per hour.

# Saturday 4th November: St Ives and Fen Drayton Lakes







If I had written yesterday, Tuesday 10th October, I would have been enjoying the sun, the warmth, the stillness of the autumn weather. Early October has seen an Indian summer. Long ago the Met Office defined Indian summer as "a warm, calm spell of weather occurring in autumn, especially in October and November". Origin uncertain, but 'India' is thought to be North American, not Indian subcontinent. Today has seen a transition to a gloomy English autumn.

As the satisfactory and productive allotment season (what a relief after last year!) ends, it has been a bonus to work out on our plots in warmth under blue skies. What leisurely thoughts have we been musing on?

Perhaps about how quickly the months go by when one works through the horticultural calendar. As we clear away the faded plants, it seems no time since we were sowing the seeds, planting out, watching growth get underway. And now, so soon, we are harvesting final produce, cutting back, dismantling support structures. I've noticed how the landscape changes as these structures come down. And was it really a year ago that we were compiling and sending off our seed orders for next year? I sent my 2024 order off this morning: as usual, too many types and packets. I bet I'm not alone in getting a frisson of anticipation as we select our choices of vegetables (and flowers).

Other reflections will be about the successes (and a few failures). We may accept that we (or our soil) cannot grow certain crops. Or conversely decide to attempt a crop we haven't done before. Of course, there is loads of satisfaction as we remember all the fresh produce that has been taken into the kitchen and onto our plates or is now stashed away in the freezer for the coming months. I refuse to decry all shop-bought food, but we can take pride in knowing our produce is fresh and free of chemicals. It may be partly in the mind, but our stuff tastes better. I bang on a lot about tomatoes, because I believe here is the biggest difference in taste between home grown and shop bought. I heard a radio programme recently about some tomato production in the Netherlands. It sounded more like the output from the oil and petrochemical industries. Who can bear that when you have sown seeds, carefully potted on, planted out, watered, fed with organic liquids; watched the fruits form, turn from green to red and yellow. Then we enjoy them in salads, cooked, or turned into sauce.

Another feature of plant life is the amount of foliage growth that is produced. We sow seeds, some as fine as dust, the largest no bigger than a bean. But through soil nutrients, water, sunlight and warmth, those tiny little stores of potential life produce over a few short months huge volumes of foliage (as well as the fruits). So much that it can be a problem to get rid of it. Putting it into compost heaps/bins to break down into compost to enrich soil in future years is ideal but some is too woody, shows sign of disease, or is too much for our composting capacity. We each find our disposal method.

Something I have been reflecting on while working out there in the warmth is the beauty and delight in nature manifesting itself. For example, there is a tree stump covered in ivy at my entrance onto the site. I've long known ivy berries are the favourite of butterflies, wasps, and bees. But I've never known my ivy stump to play host as intensively as over the last few days. Flights of red admirals, that gorgeous red and black butterfly hover over it and settle on the berries, many at any one time, fluttering like bats at a distance. If I brush against the ivy, wasps/bees and red admirals ascend in a cloud and re-settle.



Flocks of goldfinches fly across the site. The green woodpecker is always around. Then I think of that report published last week, the one that breaks one's heart: the way climate and habitat is changing so that 14% of the world's wildlife and flora will disappear within our lifetime. I think of birds I used to see locally commonly, but now seldom or never. Yellow hammers, greenfinches, house sparrows, chaffinches, bullfinches, and many more. Spending time on the allotments, seeing flora and fauna around us, kneeling on the earth, hands dirtied by the soil, must surely affect us, benefitting our health and wellbeing. But for the future ecology there is a feeling of helplessness, but we must all act and speak in any way we can to roll back these grievous predictions.

# Launch of the Local Nature Recovery Plan

We were delighted to welcome members of the community to the third public meeting held by the Local Nature Recovery Plan Group, on 4th October at the Pavilion.

The meeting provided an opportunity to reflect on community events held in the last six months and the progress already made with the plan. This included two open evenings at Town End Close, a trip to Dry Drayton to see the swift colony there, a wildlife friendly gardening day, a stall at the Girton Feast, and a photo competition. A network of WhatsApp street champions has now been set up to help spread the word - get in touch if you would like to do this for your local WhatsApp group.

The main, and most exciting, order of business was the presentation of Girton's first Local Nature Recovery Plan. Developed over the past 18 months, with input from the community and various experts, this comprehensive plan provides an overview of the biodiversity already in Girton and proposals for ways to

conserve and enhance it. It's also available on the Girton Parish Council website – do have a look!

The plan includes a range of great projects, from surveying wildlife to installing bat boxes to a community lending

scheme for equipment such as a trail camera and a moth trap. The first project that the group plans to take forward is a re-design of the Hibbert-Ware Memorial Garden, an ambitious and nature friendly proposal for this wonderful community space. At the meeting, we heard details of these exciting plans from local wildlife gardening expert Liesbeth ten Ham (Purple Flowers Gardens and Mosaics).

Of course successful delivery of the plan will depend on volunteer support from the community as well as funding. We will be seeking help for both of these, and please get in touch with any ideas or if you would like to be on our mailing list. We can work together for nature in Girton.

# Hibbert-Ware Garden needs your help!

The story of former Girton resident, Alice Hibbert-Ware, is both inspiring and fascinating. Born in New Zealand in 1869, Alice was a self-taught naturalist, and one of the first women elected to the Linnean Society. She was a passionate and inspiring educator. as well as a keen researcher. In 1935 she was asked by the British Trust for Ornithology to lead an inquiry into the feeding habits of the little owl that led to the species being protected. She moved to Girton in 1931 and was manager of the village school (then in Cotton Hall) and manager at Impington Village College, as well as a member of the Girton Parish Council. She lived here until her passing in 1944.

The Hibbert-Ware Memorial Garden, at the top of Church Lane, was established through local fundraising to commemorate the many contributions of this pioneering scientist. We are now raising funds to re-design this garden, enhancing the biodiversity of this community garden while remaining true to its original dedication.

# Yalumba Y Series, Viognier, 2021 (Australia)

Generally associated with Condrieu in the Northern Rhône region of France, Viognier is an aromatic wine with wafts of honeysuckle followed by stone fruit flavours of apricot and peach. Heady and rich, these wines might not be to everyone's taste, but this South Australian Yalumba Y is a lighter, fresher variant of Viognier which retains the stone fruit

With peach and elderflower on the nose, and apple, peach, and nectarine on the palate, this is a refreshing wine to enjoy by itself or with grilled salmon. It will also go well with a creamy chicken dish or a slightly spicy dish.

Girton Town Charity was recently singled out to showcase its new development of 15 future proof homes for the over 55s, as part of a regional meeting for almshouse professionals.

It welcomed more than 30 representatives of almshouse charities throughout East Anglia to the William Collyn Community Centre, followed by a visit to Dovehouse Court in the village.

Guests were welcomed by Ann Bonnett, GTC Chair and Tom Lee, Manager of the Centre before hearing a short history of the Charity from Trustee Robin Hiley.

Nick Phillips, CEO of The Almshouse Association, praised GTC for "leading the way" in the movement by funding and building new almshouses which are built to the stringent standards required for their Passivhaus accreditation and have first-class sustainability credentials.

He highlighted the 'cutting edge design' of the Dovehouse Court homes where residents are already enjoying living in a secure and

warm environment, which has been well-designed, with a communal garden as well as individual raised beds to grow flowers and vegetables.

Latest research shows that people living in almshouses live on average two and a half years longer because they have a sense of connection with others as part of a sociable community.

Ann Bonnett, Chair of GTC said: "It was a great honour to be asked to host this regional meeting and to be able to share our journey in creating these almshouses for the future. Not only did we enjoy excellent attendance but many came to visit Dovehouse Court after the formal sessions to see at first hand what has been achieved.

"This visit was a great reward for all the hard work and inspired vision of our Trustees over many years to bring the new almshouses to fruition. My thanks go to them and to the excellent team who worked on the project."



Our President welcomed Petra Tucker who lives in Cambridge and is a children's nurse at Addenbrookes Hospital.

She also spends time at H.M. Prison Littlehey, helping the prisoners to make various items for our homes such as cushions, tablecloths, and decorations. They are called "stitchers," and the idea behind it is to encourage prisoners to learn how to stitch and take an interest in a rewarding craft, this helps to relieve their boredom and gets them out of their cells for a time to mix with other people. This charity was founded by Lady Ann Tree, a British aristocrat and social reformer, prison visitor, and prison rights activist. She listened to the prisoners and had a vision of fine cell work. Prisoners would get paid a small amount for their work, help others learn to stitch, and enjoy chatting while working on their chosen product.

Petra read out a letter from a prisoner who said how grateful he was to have had the opportunity to learn how to stitch, and to also receive a letter back from a grateful person who was now enjoying a beautiful and individual, handstitched item, in their home. This meant a lot to the stitchers.

Finally, Petra passed around some of the cushions and tablecloths for our members to look at and we all admired their wonderful work which looked so professionally done. A selection of the prisoners' work was on sale should we wish to purchase an item.

We thanked Petra for coming along to give us this extremely interesting talk.

# **Earlybirds WI**

Dr Neil Dickinson returned to the Earlybirds in October to give a fascinating talk on butterflies. This was interspersed with wonderful

details — and photos — from his own life, from childhood to student to father, revealing his interest in butterflies from an early age when he first read British Butterflies by George E Hyde. We were shown slides of numerous butterflies, many of them blue, Dr Dickinson's favourite colour. As a child, he would catch and pin the insects; but times have changed and rather than collect the butterflies he searches for them and photographs them. And they are beautiful, from the Adonis Blue to the rare Large Blue (extinct in Britain), and the paler Churchill Blue.

Then there is the White Admiral, a master of flying, while others glide, or fly through the tops of oak trees; and if you see a Green Veined White butterfly on your cabbages, fear not – it is not the one who destroys your crop. Butterflies like warmth and so tend to be found mostly in the south of the country but climate change may of course influence their behaviour. The lovely, large, Swallowtail is rare but has been seen around the Norfolk Broads, while the bright and familiar Comma is often seen in our gardens including my own. Keep an eye out for these colourful creatures.

# **Shrapnel**

In keeping with national tradition, we will gather again this month at our memorial sites to remember and honour our war heroes. We give thanks for the freedom that was won by their courage and sacrifice.

Many of those who survived the horrors of conflict returned to civilian life still suffering the wounds and scars of the battlefield, both physically and mentally.

Recalling one of the many experiences of such times, a nurse serving in an outpost hospital recorded an important lesson she had learned. A soldier with a puncture wound in his shoulder arrived for assistance. Having cleaned the damaged area, the nurse prepared to shield the wound with a sterile dressing. The medical officer on duty however, asked instead for a small silver probe. Inserting it into the wound, he gently moved the probe until he found a spot where the soldier winced with pain and cried out.

"Now fetch me the forceps please," the doctor requested. With care he then extracted a small piece of black metal, the shrapnel left embedded in the flesh, and finally allowed the wound dressing to be applied. He then explained that with the shrapnel still remaining, the wound would continue to cause infection and pain and never truly heal. The doctor used the probe as an instrument of discernment and the forceps for deliverance.

Brother Roger of Taize once noted that "in every man and in every woman there is a wound inflicted by failures, humiliations, bad conscience." He suggested that such wounds can be inflicted at times when the soul longed for the comfort and direction of infinite understanding, but the need was not met. Thus, we may continue to carry deep within our memory, the hurts that still bring suffering and even a bitterly distorted outlook on life and relationships. Is there a cure? For those who sincerely seek it, the alleviation of this suffering may be found in the healing power of Christ.

Firstly, there has to be an honest recognition of the source of the pain, and secondly, a true desire to be free of it. When Jesus encountered a sick man at the Pool of Siloam, he realized that long-term invalidity had deeply defined the man's self-identity and prospects. Jesus therefore checked that the man was ready to embrace the fundamental changes that healing would bring to his daily life from that time onwards. (John ch.9)

So it is with us too as we confront the source of inner pain and address the issue of forgiveness, not only towards the one who inflicted it, but perhaps to own our own part in the damaging process.

Forgiveness and mercy often walk hand in hand.

Mercy has been described as being like "the gentle rain from heaven", twice blessed as it "blesses him that gives and him that receives". (The Merchant of Venice)

Nothing is lost in God's hands. To Brother Roger there is always hope. "Transfigured by Christ (the wound) is changed into a focus of energy, into a source of creativity where communion, friendship and understanding burst forth." (1981 letter)

As with the benediction of mercy, where it applies, so the gift of forgiveness cleanses, refreshes, and generates healing. Only by surrendering the painful shrapnel of experience into the vast eternity of God's love will we know the relief, comfort and reassurance that supplies new vitality, vision, and aspirations for the way ahead.

If LOVE can be the silver probe and CONFESSION the forceps, then FORGIVENESS can work as healing balm.
