

Joint statement from Girton Parish Council and Girton Bowls Club (Agenda Items 23FC/190.4 & 23FC/190.5)

Girton Parish Council and Girton Bowls Club are delighted to announce that after long but positive negotiations we are able to confirm that approval has been given for toilets and a club house to be built at Wellbrook Way within the grounds of the Bowls Club. This will raise the profile of the Bowls Club and make it a facility the whole village can use and be proud of. Our thanks go to the committee members of the Bowls Club and the Parish Council whose commitment to achieving this has finally come to fruition.

Improving Girton Parish Council Assets for the Community (23FC/190.2)

Quotes from a master planner, Wilby & Burnett, were approved with the aim of improving assets owned by Girton Parish and a focus on optimum use for Girton residents. This appointment will help the council, key user groups and residents identify projects for delivery. The plan will include consideration of the development of the Girton Recreation ground pavilion and look at possible quick wins for some areas of the project. There will be a focus on social value and value for money to ensure that as many people in the village as possible benefit from the projects which GPC initiates and supports.

Civil Burial Site for Girton

In our Chair's report for February there is information on a meeting with Girton Town Charity and St Andrew's Church to discuss burial needs in Girton. It was estimated that the existing burial ground may have another 20 years before it would be filled. The need to consider possible needs for a civil burial site, suitable for people of all faiths and none was agreed.

You may have noticed two new table tennis tables are now available for use at Girton Recreation Ground. We hope that you will make good use of these new facilities. Special thanks to Angie Vidler, our Facilities Manager and Cllr Nas Hayat for spearheading this project.


What is a 'Climate Emergency'

Climate Emergency definition:

A situation in which urgent action is required to reduce or halt climate change and avoid potentially irreversible environmental damage resulting from it: "millions of people around the world took part in protests against inaction on the climate emergency" · "they are asking lawmakers to declare a climate emergency and terminate all current fossil fuel projects and proposals".

Please let us have your views on whether you think Girton Parish Council should call a Climate Emergency and finally for this month please take a look at your hedges before bird nesting season begins and cut them back. If there are any areas that you feel need cutting back, please report them via our new 'We want to know' online tool!













From Our Councillors

District councillors' report

People on low incomes are encouraged to check eligibility for energy bill discount

The government is encouraging people on low incomes to check if they can benefit from a £150 rebate on their energy bills (https://shorturl.at/bgnuQ). The help is available to over three million households in Great Britain that are most at risk of fuel poverty, with many receiving the discount automatically. However, some customers in England and Wales have been sent a letter asking them to confirm their details by calling the Warm Home Discount Helpline so they can check their eligibility and get the rebate. Customers should stay alert to potential scams and report them to relevant authorities where they are suspected (https://shorturl.at/nzQT7). Households who need to provide more information should call the helpline on 0800 030 9322 by 29 February to get the support they are entitled to.

Cold Weather Payments have also been triggered to help households receiving certain benefits to stay warm this winter. The scheme – which runs until March 2024 – provides low-income households with an automatic payment of £25 following periods of cold weather. Further information about the Warm Home Discount Scheme (https://shorturl.at/apzT8) is available here and households can check if they are eligible for the support via the online eligibility checker (https://shorturl.at/gwFUY).

Improving Home Energy Efficiency

Action on Energy (https://bit.ly/Action-on-Energy) is a partnership made up of the six councils across Cambridgeshire - helping to support people to create more energy efficient homes. The partnership offers advice on a number of grants including:

- The Home Upgrade Grant 2 (HUG2), offers funding from government, see https://shorturl.at/bkoD5, delivered by Action on Energy and can provide home energy efficiency improvements for people on low incomes with properties not heated by gas.
- Boiler upgrade scheme (https://shorturl.at/ouQ89). Grants are available from government to replace gas boilers with cleaner heating systems.
- The ECO4 (https://shorturl.at/bchrs) and Great British Insulation (https://shorturl.at/nCOX0) schemes.

National Storytelling Week

Stories teach us about the world, they allow us to step into someone else's shoes and feel empathy, they help us to relax and escape and they can help develop essential literacy skills. We celebrated in school with additional trips to the library (which is now being brilliantly looked after by our wonderful Volunteer, Alison), with chances to hear favourite stories told by adults and those written by Girton Glebe children themselves, buddying up to read with other classes and much more!

As part of this special week, Headteacher Mr Butler, and our Early Years Lead Mr Holt, visited Cottontails Nursery to share some of their own favourite stories. We are looking forward to our next story-telling celebration: World Book Day on Thursday 7 March.

International Baccalaureate

This half term, the staff at Girton Glebe have fully immersed themselves in preparation for becoming an IB School. Before this half term, teachers researched the IB and delivered staff meetings to the rest of the staff about elements relating to the theory of IB. These "nanosessions" were really engaging and enthusiastic sessions.

Since our return after Christmas, our weekly staff meetings have focused on developing our curriculum and aligning it to the IB pedagogy. We have had some

productive and collaborative planning sessions, which have enabled us to develop engaging 'Central Ideas': these are broad statements that underpin what we will be teaching and learning each half term. Some examples of Central Ideas that classes will be investigating include 'Forces and movement can cause a process of cause and effect' and 'Our local area is influential in the world's use of technology.' As we continue to develop our curriculum, we will constantly reflect on these Central Ideas and adapt them if needed. We really enjoyed discussing possible class texts to link to each Central Idea and were really pleased to see some old and new favourites make the list: The Boy at the Back of the Class, The Colour Monster, The Boy who biked the World and Anne Frank's Diary to name a few.

It has been wonderful to see our children at Girton develop their understanding of the IB too. In a whole-school assembly, we looked at the IB Learner Profile, which includes a broad range of characteristics and responsibilities that go beyond academic success. We compared the Learner Profile to our six core values. The children engaged in discussion with their classmates to think about which of our core values align with the learner profile. It was lovely to see the children make these links and be able to explain so enthusiastically why they link together. For example, we linked the learner profile of 'thinker' to our core value of curious. We also had fun thinking about ourselves and which of the learner profile characteristics we already exhibit.



Girton Local Nature Recovery Plan Working for wildlife in our village

Wild Girton

The Wonderful World of Moths

Do you love watching Spring Watch? Are you amazed by the diversity and ingenuity of wildlife on these islands and eager to find out more? One way you can do this is to take part in a citizen science project, such as the RSPB's Big Garden Birdwatch. Having little or no prior knowledge isn't a barrier to participation either, just an interest in learning.

Take beetles, for example. In the British Isles there are over 4,000 different species, a greater number than any of our other plant or animal groups. By comparison there are only 1,100 British wildflowers, so moths with over 2,500 varieties don't do too badly in the league table of diversity. In fact, they are vital pollinators and, in their turn, a valuable source of food for bats: each species of moth having its own ecological niche, which explains why our wildlife is so vulnerable to change and interference. Surprisingly, certain species will be active throughout the year, even during mid-winter.



Whatever takes up residence in our gardens needs food. Wildlife can consume our cherished plants, and this can be disfiguring. For example, the partial defoliation of weeping birch trees in summer by Buff Tip Moth caterpillars, seen above.

Sometimes misleadingly labelled 'infestations' with advice of how to dispose of the invaders, they are, in truth, very good house guests. They strip leaves from a tree, but do no lasting damage, and are good enough to move on to a different host the following year, allowing the tree to recover and look just as good as always. The adult moths have also evolved a brilliant disguise,

resembling a twig when at rest. How much better it is to enjoy the progress of these incredible animals as they transform, than to kill them off, whilst denying other garden visitors a valuable meal.

Unfortunately, box plants have not fared so well. Whilst the damage the Box Tree Moth and its caterpillars does is devastating, the situation can be managed by cutting plants down to the base and allowing them to regrow. By keeping the regrowth compact any newcomers can be removed more easily. Without natural predators in the UK, our wildlife is beginning to adapt to new species such as this, with jackdaws, sparrows, starlings, and blue tits seen feeding successfully on the caterpillars.



So, what of citizen science? If you are interested in learning more about these important creatures, the Local Nature Recovery Group will be running further moth surveys (see advert for details). It is a chance for budding Chris Packhams and Michaela Strachans to get involved in the vital job of recording the species living locally. Not only will this support the work of other naturalist organisations and the 'big picture' of how UK wildlife is faring, but it will also help us to understand the value of our gardens to the wider ecosystem upon which all living things, ourselves included, depend. What could be more interesting than that?

There is no anxiety of deciding on a theme for this month's article. It is "Farewell to the readers of my bimonthly allotment musings for the GPN." Looking into my documents folder, it appears I have been contributing for about 12 years. At the start of my contributions, I had a full-sized plot ... however did I manage it while working full time? ... home at 6 o'clock and out to the plot.

Then, as ageing advanced, I reduced my holding and continued to love the hobby in retirement. But just before Christmas, I received bad news regarding my health. In short, strenuous activity like digging, water carrying and all the bending and stretching were now beyond my powers and could be dangerous. With enormous sadness, I gave up my tenancy of 23 years. The committee has agreed to let me continue in my greenhouse, and I remain a member of the Society, thus being entitled to go out onto the site.

However, no longer engaging in the main activity of the allotments, I would feel a fraud if I continued to write for the Society.

There has been satisfaction and pleasure in the bimonthly task. But also 'suffering'. On the downside has been occasional writer's block, with the resultant laying awake the night before deadline date for submission. The awareness of the long period between writing and GPN publication date. Today I could describe a dreadful day of non-stop rain and sheets of water on plots; but readers might open the March edition on a glorious spring day half a month later. I had to keep in mind that the article is not for allotment members (we have our own monthly newsletter); it is for Girton residents in order to convey the life of one of the village's many diverse groups. Tips and descriptions of vegetable growing techniques are not appropriate for the majority of residents who don't grow vegetables (as opposed to the Gardening Society's article, which does advise, most readers having gardens). Worst of all, I've always been aware of my limited horticultural ability and the restricted range of stuff I grow (admittedly, I have frequently heralded the success of my 'signature' crop ... the delight of home-grown tomatoes). I fear the thoughts of the real old veterans.

Well, there are the woes of this upstart author. But there has been much enjoyment in composing my article. At regular intervals, I have reflected on the essence of the Society and the site, and then tried to distil that essence into a 750'ish word essay. I look out from my study window, observing prevailing weather conditions, watching the labourers in the fields, weighing up the

growing crops at their various stages, admiring or critical of the state of soil cultivation, noting the spread of sheds, cloches, netted areas, plant supports. I recall the benefits beyond vegetable growing ... the sense of involvement with nature, getting hands into the soil, learning soil structure and care, the range of birds, mammals wild flowers living on the site. And I can wander around the site, observing at close range. I think of fresh vegetables being brought into the kitchen. I recall a few extracts from GQT and make the odd book recommendation. Then comes the attempt to convey to Girton gardeners and non-gardeners what a busy and rewarding part of Girton life is the Allotment. I hope I may have to some extent succeeded.

There is one aspect of allotment life which I have saved until the end: the forging of friendships and the linking with acquaintances. I now count a number of members as such. We talk, we compare our tastes in good coffee, we rejoice and grieve at football results, we assist one another with big jobs or during absences on holiday. Looking back, I feel I hardly noticed covid lock-down; with so much time spent on the allotment, friendship and meeting (was it 2 metres apart?), life remained good and warm. And more honourable than Downing Street parties.

That's my signing off. From April, I'll be opening the GPN with you all to read about The Good Life.

Earlybirds WI

What interesting talks we've had! Firstly, in January Honor Ridout gave us a history of Sturbridge (not Stourbridge) Fair, from the time of King John in 1211. Originally held on the feast of the Exultation of the Holy Cross on 14 September, for three days,

the fair grew over the centuries to become one of the most important in Europe. Every purchase for the household could be made – from musical clocks to silverware, textiles, spices, soaps, books, and baskets. Plus of course there were refreshments – coffee houses, ale booths, food stalls and a famous cheese market. There were even sales of second-hand goods for the less well off, and a horse fair. Booths were built, prefab style, with bedrooms at the rear to aid security. The university retained "quality control" over goods and held courts to fine anyone selling faulty wares.

A procession with a bellman, the Grand Marshall, redcoats to police the fair, the mayor, bands, and more led to the opening of the fair which had to be proclaimed.

Sadly, over the last two centuries the fair ceased to have the prominence it had once had. It dwindled and by the 1930s was merely a few stalls. However, there is still a small ceremony every year with a proclamation by the proctor of the university. You may like to attend, it's due to take place on 7 September 2024. February brought a delightful talk from Leisbeth Ten Ham, encouraging us all to make our gardens homes for wildlife. Leisbeth is a garden designer but not one that will transform your garden in a week. Leisbeth is a "slow designer," passionate about working with nature over time to make space for plants and creatures alike. We were told that 56% of species in the UK are in decline, with many including the hedgehog critically endangered. Over 40 million birds have vanished from the UK in 50 years – Leisbeth recalled having seen hundreds of lapwings in her childhood but none for many years. Wildlife gardening is not as many of us thought abandonment. It means managing the space – wilding grass needs cutting to enable butterflies to feed and lay eggs, plants need pruning to encourage regrowth. Butterflies, ladybirds, and bees will eat the aphids – there should be no need for chemicals. We as gardeners need to be ecosystem engineers.

Leisbeth is involved in the redevelopment of the Alice Hibbert Ware Garden in Girton and gave us a historical background to this wonderful lady in whose name the garden was established. Alice was a naturalist and ornithologist, one of the first women elected to the Linnean Society (devoted to natural history). Alice was famed for proving that the little owl was not a danger to chickens as had been previously thought, and which had led to their near destruction. Alice's garden is a haven amid a busy village, and Leisbeth and a team of volunteers are raising awareness of it, making it more attractive and more diverse. You may like to get involved.

If you live in England or Wales, you can call "Help through Hardship" for free, to talk confidentially to a trained Citizens Advice adviser on: 0808 208 2138 (Open Monday to Friday, 9am – 5pm. Closed on public holidays.)

They can help address your crisis and provide support to maximise your income, help you navigate the benefits system, and identify any additional grants you could be entitled to. If needed, they'll issue you with a voucher so you can get an emergency food parcel from a local food bank.

March Wine Selection

Three appealing Italian white wines to put a spring in your step!

With their wide variety across the country, Italian white wines never fail to surprise (and delight) me, and here are three appealing wines to tempt your palate this month:



The Society's Falanghina 2022 (Campania)

Falanghina is an ancient white wine grape variety from Campania in southern Italy, which typically has flavours of orange peel and citrus fruits. This Falanghina from the Wine Society is a crisp, refreshing wine with an

attractive tanginess and flavours of citrus and nectarine. A dry, medium-bodied wine with a pleasantly long finish, this can be enjoyed as an apéritif or with a seafood dish, such as garlic prawns, swordfish, or a seafood salad. It will also go well with a creamy pasta dish.

Sainsbury's Taste the Difference Discovery, Verdeca 2022 (Puglia)

This dry white Verdeca made from grapes grown in Puglia in the heel of Italy is part of Sainsbury's new Discovery Selection.
Although the grape variety is not very well-known, it is an interesting aromatic wine to explore. With rose blossom, honey and citrus notes on the

nose, and flavours of lemon and peach on the palate, this is a refreshing wine with a smooth, rich, almost buttery, mouthfeel and a lingering finish. This is a very good value wine which is perfect as an apéritif and pairs well with a seafood, chicken, or creamy pasta dish.

Vallade Gavi DOCG 2022 (Piemonte)

Produced from Cortese grapes grown in the Piemonte region of north-west Italy, this Gavi is a well-balanced, lightbodied, easy-drinking wine. With light floral aromas of blossom and peachy notes on the nose, and flavours of green apple, pear, and a hint of almond on the palate, this is a crisp, refreshing wine with medium acidity.

You can enjoy this by itself or as a pairing with white fish, chicken, or a light pasta dish.

An Italian Wine tour

After my last visit to Piemonte, Italy a couple of years ago, I thought hard about why I was stepping on the plane to come back to the UK. Sometimes as a Brit you feel repressed by nature, even if you're actively trying not to live that way. It's in the woodwork of our grey, drizzly climate. Italy as a country is far from perfect. However, the art of living is something taken very seriously indeed, and it's hard not to admire Italians for it and not become dewy eved about the place. Evelyn Waugh perhaps captures the English desire for "la Bella vita" best in Brideshead Revisited where Charles likens his experience of Venice to "drowning in honey". For greedy hedonists like me who love history and being surrounded by beautiful buildings, people and glorious food it is paradise.

Italian wine, however, has a different reputation in the UK for most. Without knowing where to look the delicious affordable bottles remain only the preserve of the privileged and knowledgeable. This is heartbreaking in my view. As a result there are some even in the wine trade who are immune to its charms. My last visit was a revelation. I loved other Italian wine regions before I went but I have to admit I had only experienced Piemontese wines that were largely expensive, tannic and disappointing. I couldn't have been more wrong! THE PASCHAL LAMB

Easter arrives early this year. The commercial world has eagerly set out its stall, and the world of nature vibrates with the joy of regeneration. But behind all the seasonal activity, lies a deeply profound and life changing significance.

Picture, if you will, an elderly man and his young son making their way, step by step together towards the mountains of Moriah. The father, Abraham, knows that under divine instruction, he is approaching a place of extreme testing and sacrifice. Would his nerve hold? Would his faith and trust crumble when the dreadful moment came? Could he without dissent, offer Isaac, the son of his love, and on whom rested the covenant promises of God, upon the altar as directed?

Isaac has a question. "My father, the fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for sacrifice?"

Abraham replies, "God himself will provide a lamb."

And God did so. Right at the last moment of Abraham's trial, God provided a ram caught in the thicket, a substitute for Isaac, and Abraham received the promise that through his offspring all nations would be blessed.

Generations later in the history of Abraham's descendants, the Israelites were about to embark on the journey of a lifetime out of the bondage of slavery in Egypt. That night the angel of death would pass over the land, taking the firstborn of every family except for those whose homes were marked by the blood of a substitute lamb.

As the feast of Passover is remembered to this day, the vital importance of the saving mark of the substitute lamb preserves the central theme in memorial, of God's provision of the Paschal Lamb.

Around the fields of Bethlehem, the shepherds would keep watch over their very special flocks. These were the lambs reared for the temple sacrifices for the trespasses of the people, the substitute Paschal lambs.

As Jesus began his ministry, John the Baptist stood beside the river Jordan. Upon seeing Jesus, John turned to his own disciples and announced, "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world."

He had seen God's provision, the one who would offer himself as that final sacrifice, once for all. (John 1v29)

"Paschal Lamb, by God appointed All our sins were on Thee laid; By Almighty love anointed Thou hast full atonement made. All Thy people are forgiven Through the virtue of Thy blood;

Opened is the gate of heaven Peace is made for us with God."

J. Bakewell (1757)

As we view the array of symbolic Easter gifts and take part in rituals both of fun and of memorial worship, let us contemplate the endless blessings afforded to us by faith.

Where human demerits are exposed by the light of divine holiness, there is forgiveness.

Where guilt blights peace, there is freedom and deliverance.

From the mastery of addiction, there is an escape and an open road of new beginnings.

Over the chasm of failure and default, there is a bridge to eternal blessing, life hope, joy, and great expectations. Enjoy this very special season and carry all its gifts into the rest of the year. Happy Easter to all.
