

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Girton Poppy Appeal raises over £9.500!

This year Girton raised the magnificent sum of £9,730.78. Thank you to everyone who supported this worthwhile cause again in any way. From the volunteers who sat in Sainsbury's foyer at Eddington, to the businesses in the village that had collecting boxes on display and to all those who donated money. The Royal British Legion was formed in 1921 as a charity to raise funds for ex-servicemen who had been disabled in the Great War of 1914 - 1918. One founder of the charity, Field Marshal Douglas Haig adopted the Poppy as the symbol of the Royal British Legion which we all recognise today. Originally, the black centre of the Poppy was stamped with 'Haig Fund', but this changed to 'Poppy Appeal' in 1994. Although a Century has passed since the formation of the Royal British Legion 'Poppy Appeal', the work carried out by the charity continues to be as relevant today as it was 100 years ago. Matters discussed at November's meeting included: review of COVID safety measures at council meetings; reconsideration of the Parish Office location with a decision to reopen the pavilion office once communication utilities have been restored; appointment of chair of the finance and resource committee; a range of measures to improve operational efficiency and governance; formation of a task and finish group to review standing orders and policies and permission to approve the appointment of a contractor to conduct a survey of all trees on Parish Council land. It was also agreed that we should consider village participation in the forthcoming Platinum Jubilee Celebrations in 2022 including the 'Queens Green Canopy' initiative.

We will be reviewing the response to our Oakington Road bridge path widening consultation at the next meeting but have noted that to date several responses, including that of one of our district councillors, are conflating the issue of the pathway widening with the problems of flooding being exacerbated by the bridge. These are in no way related, and any of the current proposals will make no difference to any flood mitigation measures under consideration now or in the future.

It was also noted that following the very sad loss of George Thorpe we are in need of a volunteer to lead the Green Team which was established and led by George for a number of years. Anyone who feels they could step up to this role is encouraged to contact the clerk or chairman.

Residents will be aware that we have begun to make use of our speed monitoring/recording equipment which we initially located on Cambridge Road. This was provided by the County Council and we are allowed to use it for up to four weeks in any single location. It measures and records vehicle speeds in both directions of travel to provide data to support any speed restriction proposals. We will be moving it about the village in the coming months.

Reinstatement of solar stud lighting along the section of Oakington Road from the bridge to the business park was promised for the 18th November but then delayed by red tape in obtaining permission for the work to go ahead. At time of writing we do not have a confirmed date for the work but we are pressing the Council on the urgency of the matter.

It was most encouraging to note very high attendance at the Remembrance Ceremonies held at the War Memorial on the 11th and 14th November. Thanks go to Wendy Ripley, who has again managed the Poppy Appeal in the village, and who organised the participants and wreath layers on the Sunday.

The Chairman, Councillors and Staff of Girton Parish Council wish all residents a Happy Christmas and a peaceful and prosperous New Year.

FROM OUR COUNCILLORS

County Councillor Edna Murphy

A key area of concern is the trees planted as part of the A14 project. Many residents have noticed the poor state of trees which were planted in numbers adjacent to the A14 including the 'sound barrier' near Washpit Lane and Weaver's Field. Newlyplanted trees are failing to grow or have died and so many of the plastic tubes are just filled with weeds.

National Highways (formerly Highways England) has a contractual obligation to replant for a period of 5 years. They say they are addressing the backlog of dead saplings and replanting them, but they are moving far too slowly. Right now they're trying to work out how many have died, and making a list of how many to replant. But it is getting late for this year's tree planting season, and even if they are replanted it is not clear that newly planted trees will have a better fate.

It could be National Highways is just inefficient, or they could be wasting time until the obligation to replant times out. I am working with colleagues who are similarly concerned to challenge National Highways to grasp the problem and address the fundamental issues so tree planting happens now, and can be successful. We are calling upon them to publish their data on progress with tree planting and explain when replanting will happen and how they will ensure these saplings will thrive. There are so many reasons why the tree planting must succeed. I will be reporting on progress in future editions of Girton Parish News.

In other news... a number of important decisions have been made recently by the County Council, including support to rethink the 20mph policy and the rules around introducing it. The County has had an overly restrictive policy on introducing 20mph which has limited progress on this front. The Highways Committee will consider more detailed policy proposals in their December Committee meeting. The intention is to make it easier to reduce speed limits, including 20mph. This has potential to support aspirations to manage speed reduction in a more holistic rather than piecemeal way.

We have previously committed to continuing the holiday support programme for children from disadvantaged families. But at the recent Full Council it was approved to create a fund to support children from disadvantaged families, particularly bearing in mind the combined effect of changes to Universal Credit and increased cost of living. The

fund will help with access to education and sport and other ways to enhance their life chances.

Also note that the County Council was successful in applying for Enhanced Response Area funding from the government. This provides additional funding for the County to help deliver more vaccinations and boosters, to tackle the very high levels of infection.

Widening of the cycleway at Oakington Road Bridge

In last month's edition of the *Girton Parish News*, a consultation was called on the above project. The aims are to widen the shared use cycle/footway by narrowing the road and to repair a crack in the wall, called a parapet, next to the footpath. Having thought about this and consulted with some of the nearby residents, I have decided to oppose this scheme for the following reasons.

- 1. Flooding In October 2001 and again in July 2012, residents of Dodford Lane, Fairway, Northfield and Oakington Road suffered from devasting flooding. Duck End and Gretton Court are also at risk for the next flood. The Environment Agency's Floodline issued alerts in Nov and Dec 2012, Feb 2014, Apr 2018 and on Christmas Eve last year. The Oakington Road Bridge is the cause of these problems, having too small an opening underneath and a base, called an invert, that is too high, with insufficient fall in the watercourse upstream. For decades, the Environment Agency and the County Council have "kicked the can down the road", hoping that the problem will go away. It is predicted that climate change will lead to higher rainfall in the UK; at some point this bridge must be replaced. Making minor cosmetic changes to the top of the bridge without fixing the major problems underneath is sending a message to our flood-prone neighbours that they are "out of sight, out of mind".
- 2. Poor cycleway strategy Cyclists, pedestrians, horse riders, motorists and public transport each need their own networks. For too long the County Council and the Greater Cambridge Partnership have been trying to shoehorn infrastructure into places where there is simply not enough room. The side of a road is the most expensive, the most dangerous and most polluted place to build a cycle path we should be building an off-road route up to the Guided Busway instead.

3. Pollution - Only a tiny proportion of the cars on our roads have regenerative braking. According to the latest data from the SMMT (Society of Motor Manufacturers and Traders) even most new cars don't have it. Every time such cars stop, their kinetic energy is wasted. Road obstacles may slow the traffic, but they come at a terrible cost in pollution and wasted fuel. It is unfair for the residents who live along Oakington Road to be subject to this additional noise and pollution.

New Year's Day Walk, Saturday 1st January, 2022

Linton – Hadstock – Icknield Way circular walk, 5 miles, 3 hours.

This is a pleasant walk on footpaths through fields in gently rolling countryside with some good views. As it is midwinter, be prepared for muddy conditions! Bring food and hot drinks.

Meet at Linton Industrial Estate. Take the A1307 (Haverhill Road) to Linton. After Linton Village College go through two sets of traffic lights; after the second, take the next right-hand turn signposted to Hadstock, Linton Zoo and Industrial Estate (the road is called 'The Grip'). After a couple of hundred yards the Industrial Estate is on the right, before you get to Linton Zoo. There should be plenty of parking there on New Year's Day.

As it is a little farther from Cambridge than we normally go (and it is the morning after New Year's Eve), we thought we would make a slightly later start at 10.30am. The drive from Girton takes about 30 minutes.

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As another strange year ends and the world continues living with Covid, I am sure many of us will have discovered these last 21 months how many beautiful walks Cambridge and its surrounding regions provide. Our gardens have given us an extra room for family and social gatherings when Covid restrictions allowed. Christmas planning and festivities in December will take up a lot of everyone's thoughts but there are many productive garden tasks we can still do.

December is a good time to tidy up the garden, protect plants from frosts and plan for the spring. Not forgetting cleaning and sharpening any garden tools. Before the soil gets too cold, you can still split plants and replant in the ground or pots. There is still time to plant bulbs in large pots of compost ready to fill any gaps in spring borders for next year. If the ground is workable and you can plant bulbs to the correct depth, you can still plant tulips and daffodils into January! Bulbs planted at the correct depth will develop roots through to the spring and aren't affected by frost.

Cold wet weather can damage trees, shrubs, and garden structures such as trellises. If possible, improve the shelter for your vulnerable plants in the ground. Plants at risk in the ground or in pots can be wrapped in protective fleeces. Greenhouses provide shelter for vulnerable plants. The main loss of greenhouse heat is from draughts through the structure, so seal cracks and replace broken frames and ensure doors and vents fit snugly. A layer of bubble polythene on the inside of greenhouses helps maintain some heat over winter but every layer reduces about 10% of light which can impact on plant growth. On warmer winter days, ventilate your greenhouse to reduce humidity and risk of disease.

Winter pruning is still possible, climbing roses will benefit from removing diseased or damaged growth and tying in new shoots. You can prune your acers and vines as they will bleed sap if pruned later. Winter pruning should be avoided though on wall framed apples and pears, but open grown varieties benefit from pruning as that gives the structure balance and encourages quality fruit production next year.

Clear away large areas of fallen leaves from the lawn or paved areas as they can harbour disease and give a slippery surface in winter months. The leaves will rot down in leaf or compost bins, ready for next year. Take care not to let leaves accumulate around alpines as they will die if left damp for long. Covering bare patches around alpine clumps with gritty compost will encourage regrowth. Hopefully removing leaf debris around plants will prevent slugs and snails from setting up home over winter.

As the nights draw in, houseplants add a touch of seasonal joy but remember they need less water in winter months. Christmas cactus (Schlumbergera) with their abundant, brightly coloured flowers at this time of year look attractive anywhere indoors. I take cuttings once they have flowered from the end stems, placing cuttings in water for a few weeks until the roots appear, then I plant into smaller pots of well drained compost which you can leave with little attention for next few months, watering spasmodically until they begin to produce healthy growth. Re-pot then into larger pots and by next Christmas you will have a mini flowering plant. If you have a poinsettia over Christmas, protect it from cold draughts and allow them to dry out slightly between watering to make them last the whole Christmas period and well into January.



Pyracantha bushes

No front door is complete without a Christmas wreath. Making your own wreath using readily available materials from your garden is fun and one all the family can enjoy. Stems, leaves and flowerheads will make beautiful wreaths or try a living wreath from succulents and grasses too. Cinnamon sticks and baubles can brighten up homegrown foliage if required. Garden foliage can also make an attractive balustrade over fireplaces or up a stairway, using soft garden wire for support and anchorage, adding Christmas decorations if you wish. We have a large holly bush in our back garden, laden with red berries in November and early December but by Christmas most berries have been taken by the birds. However, the pyracantha bushes in our front garden are abundant with orange, red and yellow berries at this time of year and they provide a good substitute for any foliage decoration we choose. All good fun but I must remember to wear gloves to protect my hands from any prickly foliage! Wishing you all a merry Christmas and a happy New Year.

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

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Girton's Edgelands

It's easy to envision the ideal English landscape as open fields bordered by ancient hedges, oak

trees standing proud, and the sound of birdsong bathing it in pastoral glory. In most cases, local reality may be somewhat more mundane, but as you walk down the path along Bunker's Hill to Eddington, between the fences, piles of rubble, unpainted tarmac and paths yet to be trodden, there is more than enough of interest and beauty to occupy a naturalist for as long as they have to spare.

The unnoticed spaces within and between buildings, may not draw the human eye but other species regard it simply as habitat to colonise, and in which to flourish. On a larger scale, Girton's own edgelands between the village and Eddington have more to offer than may appear at first. The empty and apparently unloved spaces around urban or even suburban spaces are often seen as something to move through with disdain rather than a place to stop, look, contemplate, and engage with, but they offer much to those willing to look beyond the thinly grass-skinned rubble piles and sense of impermanence. In the space of a few hundred pages in their book Edgelands, Paul Farley and Michael Symmons Roberts changed the way I regard these spaces forever. Just as when you stare at a shrub or grass for long enough, the multitude of insect life seems to loom into view from nowhere. I now see these transitional, liminal spaces as a different rather than diminished opportunity to hunt unusual and usual flora and fauna. If you stop and look for more than a few moments, nature does show its hand.

At some point, Bunker's Hill ends and a path begins that bisects some soon to be populated suburban bliss. For the moment, the resident Skylarks and Pied Wagtails don't complain about the slow progress of the development as they claim the space as their own, unchallenged. As the Kestrels shift their static positions westwards using their enhanced vison to spot fresh animal trails, they care nothing for the unopened units around Sainsbury's, their hearty lunchtime options available all day without the need for a mask or a Nectar card.

In a strange way, I like the fences along the path. It provides habitat for wildlife to remain undisturbed, beyond our reach, even temporarily. Soon enough we'll take the space back, so even if it's not the bucolic idyll we might prefer, let's still enjoy what it can give to us rather than passing through as quickly as possible.

This past year I have particularly enjoyed exploring English and Welsh wines and it has been a delightful voyage of discovery. So much so that I have included some choice wines from our fair isle in this list of Christmas wines for you to enjoy either with food, or simply when you are chilling out with your favourite film or book over the festive period. Merry Christmas!

Apéritifs

If sherry is your favourite pre-prandial tipple, **Don Gaspar Dry Amontillado Lustau** has a pleasant nutty and dried fruit flavour, together with a hint of tanginess. Perfect with cured meats, manchego and olives. Waitrose (£11.99)

If you're looking for a refreshing sparkling wine to get your Christmas lunch off to a fine start, **Nyetimber Classic Cuvée MV** is a treat. With flavours of honey, almond and brioche on the palate, this is a very fine and elegant sparkling wine which is consistently judged top of its game. (£32.99, also available as a half bottle).

Or why not try a fresh and light Greek white wine? The **Moschofilero-Roditis 2020** is part of Marks & Spencer's Food range. This dry white wine with Muscaty, honeyed tones and a minerally, lemon tang creates a well-balanced wine with a lengthy finish. Marks & Spencer (£8.50)

White wines

Paco & Lola Albariño 2019 is described by Decanter as 'everything you want on the palate, and more'. A fresh, lively wine with flavours of lime, lemon, peach and a touch of salinity is a perfectly balanced wine that will match perfectly with white meat and fish dishes. Tesco, Sainsbury's (£12-£14)

The Camel Valley Atlantic Dry 2020 is a delightful dry, medium-bodied wine with refreshing acidity and flavours of apple and peach. A perfect wine for a fish or seafood dish. Grape Britannia (£14.99)

Sainsbury's Taste the Difference Jurançon Sec is a well-balanced dry wine with flavours of apple, pear and grapefruit. The wine has medium acidity and a medium finish, and will handle the myriad flavours of a festive Christmas lunch well if you prefer white wine with your main dish. Sainsbury's (£9)

Red wines

With all the complex interplay of flavours associated with a traditional Christmas turkey lunch, a wine with lower tannins will cope better. This **Winbirri Signature 2017** grown in Norfolk has blackberry and cherry flavours, together with a hint of toastiness and spice. It will be an excellent match for your turkey and trimmings. Grape Britannia (£14.99)

A Malbec from Cahors will go well with duck or pork and Le Grand Retour 2018 is a dry wine with medium acidity and medium tannins. It has flavours of blackberry and jamminess, with a hint of chocolate and liquorice, and is a well-balanced, medium-bodied wine. Majestic (£11.99, Mix Six £9.99)

For something bolder, this **1000 Stories Zinfandel 2018** from California is a very good full-bodied wine with intense black fruit flavours and vanilla and caramel on the palate. A well-balanced wine with a lingering finish, this will hold its own with roast beef or similar strong flavours. Tesco, Sainsbury's (£15).

Dessert wines

Taylor's 10-year old Tawny Port has a fruity, nutty flavour to be enjoyed with cheese or dessert, or post-lunch while watching the Queen's speech. Sainsbury's, Morrisons, Waitrose (£16-£22)

Another treat is the Australian Campbell's Rutherglen Muscat. This is a lusciously sweet wine with flavours of fruitcake, dates and nuts, this is a smooth, wonderfully balanced wine. A perfect match for cheese or dessert. Majestic (£14.99, Mix Six £12.49)

Or why not try a Welsh fortified wine? The **White Castle Vineyard 1581** is a cracking way to finish your lunch. Or perhaps with a mince pie later in the day. Well, anytime really – it's a delight. A soft, smooth wine with a long finish, it has rich blackberry and plum flavours on the palate. In a word, heavenly. Grape Britannia (£27.49).

Girton author's book published – forty years on!

When Jane Bower wrote *Thread and Thrum*, her first novel for children, in the early 1980s, she did not imagine that it would be published forty years later, when she had retired. Her father, Len Bower, was a trained book illustrator before he became an art teacher. Girton residents will remember Len as the subject of Jane's solo show *Daddy's Diaries*, performed for the St. Andrew's makeover. Len illustrated *Thread and Thrum* superbly – but later lost his sight to Macular Degeneration. 30% of the income from the book goes to support the Macular Society.


Meanwhile, for Jane, life – and primary teaching – got in the way, and her manuscript and Len's superb drawings languished in a filing cabinet. Lockdown and retirement coincided for her and she re-read it.

"It was staggering how language patterns and attitudes had changed," said Jane. "I had to do a huge amount of rewriting and remove references which were now shockingly non-PC!" The book came out in December 2020, by which time Len, aged 100, was ill. Jane was allowed to see him at Christmas, face to face for the first time in ten months. Len died on January 4th 2021.

The readership Jane had in mind when she wrote *Thread* and *Thrum* were the very first children she taught. She went on to become an arts specialist, and designed the ceramic courtyard features and wrote and directed a play at Girton Glebe Primary School. She gives regular talks on her book and other subjects.

Thread and thrum is an old phrase meaning the good and the bad together. Suitable for age 7 to adult, this is an exciting and imaginative story designed to be read aloud in schools, read alone, or in book groups, and includes discussion points.

Thread and Thrum is available in bookshops and on Amazon.

Almshouses are meeting the need for housing in our Village

In recent years, the scarcity of affordable rented accommodation in the UK has made the role of almshouses increasingly important in providing much-needed social housing for families and the over 55s. In our own Village, Girton Town Charity currently funds 13 almshouses, with a further 15 under construction at Dovehouse Court on the High Street.

Girton has a long history of providing almshouses, stretching back to the start of the 19th century when homes were located at Camping Close in Cambridge Road and between Gretton School Old Rectory site and St Andrew's Church.

As an almshouse charity, GTC provides 100% of the funding, with no cost to the taxpayer, to maintain and

build new homes which are made available to those with a Girton connection.

There are currently seven GTC almshouses at Centenary Court in Wellbrook Way, three at Suffolk Terrace on the High Street and three individual houses within the Village.

Resident appointees

All these two and three bedroom unfurnished homes are let as almshouses and are subject to different legal arrangements from private, council or housing association tenancies. Residents are 'appointees', not 'tenants', live in the house under licence and pay a maintenance contribution, not rent. As they are almshouses there is no 'right-to-buy' or opportunity for shared equity.

Vacancies are advertised locally for which residents can apply and be interviewed, with decisions made after careful consideration on the basis of a wide range of criteria.

With GTC almshouses, appointments are initially for three years except for those over the age of 55 or in the case of disability.



Suffolk Terrace

The newest homes in the almshouse portfolio are three terraced properties on the former WI Hall site, which were completed earlier this year. Called Suffolk Terrace as the hut was originally used by the Suffolk Regiment, these two and three bedroom homes each have a private garden and off-road parking space. All include high levels of insulation and energy

efficient heating systems.

High Street

The next major almshouse project is on High Street where work is underway to create 15 homes for the over 55s, as well as a new office for GTC, all built to Passivhaus standards.

Dovehouse Court has been designed to meet the future needs of the elderly, allowing for extended independent living including easy wheelchair access. Homes have individual terraces or balconies, and open onto communal landscaped gardens, an orchard and allotments. Completion is scheduled for Autumn 2022.

Contemporary living

Ann Bonnett, Chair of Girton Town Charity added: "As an almshouse charity, we are committed to providing homes that will meet the needs of our residents, both families and the over 55s.

"With Suffolk Terrace completed and Dovehouse Court underway, we are looking forward to having age-appropriate affordable almshouses that are not only practical and energy-efficient but also enjoyable places to live."

At Dovehouse Court, works are now entering a more exciting stage, with progress becoming more visible as you pass by the site.

Since the update last month, groundworks have been completed, together with the departure of the last excavators, concrete lorries and stone deliveries.

The last few weeks have seen the installation of the beam & block flooring, followed by the bricklayers getting the remaining blockwork up to base plate level in readiness for the arrival of the timber frames.

We hope that residents will be interested to see the installation of the timber frames in early December which will take the construction to the next important stage."

Christmas is about...

Have you ever played the game in which you type the start of a sentence into Google (other search engines are available) to see the suggestions? This afternoon I typed in "Christmas is about" and discovered that Google prompted me with 3 main suggestions: family, giving and Jesus. As a vicar I'd obviously hoped that Jesus would be higher up the list, but I do want to commend the other two as well

For the Christian, Christmas is about family. It's about a family; a young, unmarried, pregnant girl and her faithful, slightly bemused, fiancé travelling together to a small town where they find little welcome and unexpectedly become the start of a whole new family. The birth of Jesus is a decisive moment in the great drama of creation; the moment at which God becomes one of us in all of our weakness and frailty. Through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, God inaugurates a whole new creation in which, by God's grace, we become brothers and sisters of Christ and so children of God. A whole new, global family, in which the bond of our common baptism in water is as thick as the blood of human families. So yes, Christmas is about family. A whole new family centred around Jesus.

Christmas *is* also about giving. But not just the giving of presents. At Christmas we remember God giving *us* a gift – his own son. And it wasn't a cheap gift either; the gift of that child at Christmas was the most precious thing God had to give. Christians gratefully receive God's gift of Jesus, his son, because (like all good gifts) this present reveals the depth of the giver's love for us. So yes, Christmas *is* about giving. God's gift to us. Our gifts to one another are right and good, but they pale in comparison to what God gives to us.

So come and join us this Christmas as we "unwrap" God's gift to us. Because Christmas *is* about Jesus, as well as spending time with family and giving gifts. There are lots of opportunities to join together with the rest of God's family and spend time with his gift.

Come to the Carol Service (19th Dec at 6pm); or there are still a few spaces left at Christmas Dinner and Carols at the Old Crown (15th Dec); why not bring the kids to Christingle on Christmas Eve (11am and 3pm – please book in advance, see the website).

You could come to the hush of midnight mass on Christmas Eve at 11:30pm, or just come and enjoy Christmas morning (10am)! If you genuinely can't get to anything over the Christmas holidays, then why not come along and hear our children's choir church sing (they are great!) on 9th Jan at 4pm as we remember the visit of the Three Wise Men
