February's storms have battered the village with substantial damage to trees.

The roots of a mature tree on the edge of the recreation ground have been ripped out of the ground with the tree lodged against an electricity pylon.



Another tree in St Andrew's churchyard has been badly affected with branches causing damage to the graves below while another tree at the junction of Girton Road and Mayfield Road was also damaged.

The storms caused damage throughout the village and in another incident a car port was ripped away from a wall and blown over the roof of a house onto the opposite side.

We need you - come and join your Parish Council

The Girton Parish Council is in need of new councillors. We currently have three vacancies and not all current councillors will stand again when the council is due for re-election in May 2022. As a councillor who has worked with this group since 2010, I wanted to share with you the value of becoming involved with your village. If you care about our environment and you want to ensure it is fit for you and your family, why not come along to a council meeting, and see what it is all about. I guarantee you will make new friends, you will understand much more about your village, and you will help to steer the plans for the future.

The need for the Parish Council becomes apparent when "something must be done," everyone tends to look to the council to do it - whatever it may be. That is on top of the usual business of providing and maintaining recreation and open spaces in the community such as our recreation ground and pavilion, play areas, cutting the grass at the churchyard and more. We also actively support services in the community.

With significant grant funding from the county council, we are currently about to begin work on improving our pavilion by enlarging the hall to allow wider usage and creating improved sports changing facilities. Importantly we will also be creating a parish office accessible to all on the ground floor of our building. We will also create an extra meeting room and add value to the facility. We hope to have a stage in the main hall as part of this ambitious plan, and an improved kitchen facility for all users.

Girton has a very active sport facility with football pitches envied by visitors. We also have tennis courts, a MUGA (Multi Use Games Area, which is an all-weather surface arena for sport), outdoor gym equipment (trim trail) and of course a bowls green at Wellbrook Way. The council operates a number of committees responsible for various aspects of council activity. For example, we have a sport and recreation committee which assists the development of sport and leisure in our village, and the environment committee looks after the management of our open spaces and footpaths.

The council is also the primary point of contact for county, district, and others. So should your interest be pathways through and around the village, highway safety, potential flood risk or rewilding, you can become more involved and link with county and district to learn more and help influence our future.

Once every four years we have an election, when the whole council is elected by you, the residents of Girton. So, it is a very opportune time to offer yourself for election and to make a difference.

This year's election will run alongside district council elections. However, while the district council elections will be fought on party lines, membership of the parish council is not political, and most councillors do not disclose their political leanings. Councillors are there to take decisions in the best interests of the community.

We are pleased to say we have recently appointed a new clerk and an assistant, and this has allowed us to develop a robust approach to the challenges we face. Both these people are very approachable for you to talk to. Our chair and I as Vice Chair are also very willing to give you an overview of what this commitment means should you wish to consider standing for election.

So, the new council will be an interesting and exciting team of residents who care, who want to make a real difference for the community. We need you to be part of that; anyone over 18 and registered to vote and resident within one mile of the village is eligible to be a parish councillor. We need key people from all backgrounds and ages who can bring a range of skills, experience, and enthusiasm to maintaining Girton as a truly wonderful place to live.

The chairman, with the support of County Councillor Edna Murphy, recently presented to the Highways Panel, our application for double yellow lines at the major road junctions of Thornton Road, St Margaret's Road and Weavers Field. This appeared to be well received but the outcome will not be known for some time. We have also received confirmation that the much heralded new lighting along Oakington Road is to be finally installed in the second half of March.

This represents the culmination of a council aspiration dating back many years, revived in earnest in 2019 and made possible by an ultimately successful application for funding by the A14 Legacy Fund. Details of the installation appear elsewhere in this edition of GPN.

From Our Councillors

County Councillor Edna Murphy

As we approach spring the hope is that Covid infections, illness and deaths will decline and the disruption to education and our lives will reduce. Although we may be losing Government-imposed restrictions this does not mean we should stop doing things we know help keep our family, friends and neighbours safe, such as mask-wearing, limiting time indoors and taking LTD tests before meeting people. We need to use common sense and continue to act cautiously until the level of infections is reduced further. Covid still has potential to cause harm and it is not done with us just yet.

Bus routes "merged"

Residents have been dismayed by the recent news from Stagecoach that they will 'merge' routes 5 and 6 producing a slower service and with some elements no longer provided (for example to the Crematorium). Stagecoach says they are struggling to find drivers and also passenger numbers are down. But they also said they didn't believe there would be many complaints. They are planning to get feedback in person and are arranging a meeting.

Water contamination

Reports of local water contamination have caused concern. It is vital to be able to understand any potential long-term health implications of any level of exposure. I support the call for the Drinking Water Inspectorate and the County Council's Director of Public Health to investigate the incident and issues surrounding it, and for these bodies and Cambridge Water to make the information public. We are pushing for Cambridge Water to dramatically improve the way it keeps residents informed and updated as this has not worked well recently.

Setting budgets

In the last fortnight the county, fire authority and police have all set their budgets for next year. In very difficult circumstances the county will increase the Council Tax by 4.99% but there is help for those who are in financial difficulty. The county's budget manages to absorb (and not pass on) many cost increases but also does make provision for support for care leavers, establishing a Just Transition Fund (to support inequality and tackle the climate emergency) and increase support for biodiversity. It allows for flood resilience schemes to be

extended and provides the Household Support Fund for a further year.

Post Office in Girton

The van visits the car park at the back of the old Scallywags nursery in Orchard Close on Fridays, 1.30-2.30pm. It provides over-the-counter services but will also get cards and stationery items for you. You can also pay in cheques to your bank if you have paying in slips. The post mistress is very helpful and friendly.

I would like to thank the Social Club for offering her the use of their facilities if needed.

Road Surfaces

We reported the pot holes in Thornton Road, and it is planned for the road surface to be repaired at the end of March. Signs will be erected nearer the time. The pavement surfaces in High Street and Bandon Road have also been reported.

Business Support

I have been endeavouring to contact businesses in Girton to make sure they are aware of the business support from the Council. The latest edition of the business support newsletter is online now. You will find it on the South Cambs website.

Buses

Local bus services have been changed. The number 5 from the city centre now goes through Girton and Oakington on its way to Bar Hill. This makes the journey from Girton to Bar Hill longer, and, in my experience, more crowded. The number 6 has been changed to two journeys per day and goes to Madingley rather than Bar Hill.

The County and District Councils want to encourage the use of buses so that cars are used less, and it has been worrying that some people have said they will use their cars instead of the new bus services.

Another concern is that there is now no bus going to the Crematorium.

I understand that there is a shortage of drivers and this is the reason why Stagecoach has reduced the services. I have been in correspondence with them and will continue to pressure them to improve the services.

Meanwhile, I heard that some people, who have no car, cannot get to the Crematorium so I contacted the Town

Charity. The Trustees recommend residents experiencing difficulty getting to the Crematorium to apply for an Individual Grant-in-Need for taxi fares. To contact them you can call 01223 276008 or email gtc@girtontowncharity.org.uk.

Other work for Girton

There is a cover missing from a stop tap at the bus stop near Thornton Road. This is a trip hazard so I have reported it to the Council and the Cambridge Water Company whose property I think it is.

Finally I had reported a blocked drain in Girton Road. It has been inspected and will need further work to clear the blockage.

The Parish Council has been concerned about the broken doggy-poo bin near Hicks Lane. A resident tried to free up the lock which was rusty but could not get it to move, so I ordered a new one from Waste Services.

Omicron Hospitality and Leisure Grant

This grant is aimed at businesses within the hospitality and leisure sector which were trading as registered business rate payers in South Cambridgeshire on 30 December 2021. These businesses could be eligible for a one-off payment of up to £6,000 depending on the rateable value of each business.

There is also Additional Restrictions Grant (ARG) topup payment, which is a limited, one-off fund and it is the council's intention to make use of this by providing support to eligible businesses that do not have a rateable value and/or are ineligible to receive the Omicron Hospitality and Leisure Grant (OHLG) but nonetheless operate in the supply chain to OHLG businesses.

Business Grants@scambs.gov.uk or calling 01954 713 000. The deadline to apply for both grants has now been extended until Friday 11 March 2022.

Five Year Land Supply

The Five Year Land Supply is a concept in the English planning system that requires local authorities to have allocated enough sites in their Local Plan to satisfy five years' worth of demand for housing. If this measure falls below five years, property developers can appeal

when their schemes are rejected and have decisions overturned..

At a recent planning appeal the five year land supply was challenged but the planning inspector found that the council does have a supply still. The inspector found 'the council's housing land supply as at April 2021 was 5.6 years, a slightly improved position compared to 5.07 years at the time of the last appeal.' This is a relief but no doubt eyes will be closely peeled on the next published figures.

Civil Parking Enforcement

South Cambridgeshire is one of only a few places in the country where a local council doesn't have the powers to deal with illegal and inconsiderate parking. The district and county councils are working together with the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) on a civil parking enforcement plan that would involve responsibilities for dealing with the illegal parking shift from the police to the county council. This will mean drivers parking illegally, such as on double yellow lines, could be issued a ticket by civil enforcement officers and ordered to pay a penalty charge.

The county council will now prepare an application to the Secretary of State for a Special Enforcement Area, via the Department for Transport, to introduce the scheme. Subject to the approval of this application, it is expected that civil parking enforcement could begin in South Cambridgeshire in the autumn of next year.

A long held aspiration to bring street lighting to a dark and apparently neglected part of the village will reach fruition shortly. Following a protracted negotiation with the A14 Legacy Fund the installation of 10 street lighting columns between Gretton School and the entrance to Camboro Park business park is scheduled to take place between March 14th and 31st. Traffic control measures using lighting or stop go boards will be used temporarily to facilitate the work but it is hoped that inconvenience to residents and road users will be kept to a minimum.

There are numerous plants that have developed clever adaptations that help them reduce how much water they need and their overall dependence on water. So what are these adaptations, and which are the best plants to help you reduce your summer watering regime? This illustrated talk will explain.

Nothing is so beautiful as Spring (especially with a glass of wine in hand!) ...

As we start to put away our winter coats and our thoughts turn to spring, it's also a great opportunity to put the heavier winter wines to one side and try something a little lighter wine-wise, too. Here are a few suggestions to savour as you enjoy the thrill of the new season and prepare for the first lawn mowing of the year!



Paco & Lola, Albariño, Rías Baixas, 2020 (Spain)

With its Atlantic climate, moderate year-round temperatures, ocean mists and above-average rainfall, the Rías Baixas region of Galicia in the north-west of Spain is more reminiscent of Ireland than the sun-drenched beaches of holiday-destination Spain. But despite the

dampness, the area is also blessed with many hours of warm sunshine, enabling the Albariño grapes to ripen and produce wines that are naturally high in acidity, with floral aromas, and citrus and stone-fruit flavours.

These light, fresh, lower alcohol Albariño wines make for an ideal aperitif. And given their maritime context, they are also a perfect partner for seafood.

This example from Paco & Lola is a fresh, lively wine, with zippy acidity and a lovely long finish. It has aromas of lychees, apricot and peach on the nose, and flavours of lime, lemon, peach and a hint of minerality on the palate.

Chapel Down Rosé Brut NV (England)

Made from Pinot Noir grapes grown in Kent, Sussex and Essex, this rosé sparkling wine from one of England's finest wine producers was a Platinum Award winner in the Decanter World Wine Awards 2021.

An elegant wine, it has aromas of fresh strawberries, rhubarb, redcurrants and gooseberry, with a hint of croissant in the background, and flavours of strawberry, raspberry and lemon sherbet. Light, delicate and fruity, with a crisp acidity and a fine mousse, this is a little gem.

This is an ideal sparkling wine to enjoy with family and friends as you welcome the new season. It goes well with smoked salmon and light pasta dishes and is a perfect match for rhubarb crumble.

Mud House Pinot Noir 2020 (New Zealand)

If you prefer a red wine, a Pinot Noir is a very good choice for this time of the year with red fruit flavours which may be complemented by subtle oak-derived notes of smoke and cloves. A versatile grape, Pinot Noir pairs well with a variety of dishes – from salmon and tuna to

roast chicken, lamb and duck. It also goes well with a tomato-based pasta dish or pizza.

The Mud House Pinot Noir 2020 hails from Central Otago in New Zealand. This wine has red cherry, raspberry and bramble aromas, with a hint of peppery spice on the nose and fresh fruit flavours of raspberry and redcurrant on the palate. It is a well-balanced medium-bodied wine with medium tannins and a medium finish, which can be drunk by itself or with food - it goes particularly well with lamb or duck.

Wild Girton

The UK is one of the most nature-depleted countries in Western Europe. The causes of this sorry situation are many and complex, but it does mean that any minor change we make to reverse this trend can help. The key lies with our outdoor spaces.

With the pressures on land use elsewhere, any improvements we can make in our gardens and other outdoor spaces will have an effect on our fightback against biodiversity loss, however small.

So where to start?

At its base, soil health is critical for a biodiverse garden. Any experienced gardener will tell you that the regular addition of organic material such as farmyard manure or well-rotted compost will improve the quality of soil, particularly with our challenging clay soil.

Next, planting shrubs, hedges, and trees to attract wildlife. Reducing the number of exotics in a garden and instead planting more 'native' plants will lead to an increase in the number of insects, butterflies, and bees. The Royal Horticultural Society has a database of 'Plants for pollinators' https://www.rhs.org.uk/science/conservation-biodiversity/wildlife/plants-for-pollinators which is a great resource when trying to decide what to choose for your garden or outdoor space.

If you have a balcony, planting pollinators in pots such as lavender and mint will attract bees. Adding a climber against a wall such as honeysuckle will also act as an insect magnet.



Go 'wild'

Leaving a bit of the garden to go 'wild' can also improve biodiversity. Though it goes against gardening orthodoxy, leaving patches of nettles and ivy helps butterflies and birds. Or turning over part of your lawn to a wildflower meadow. Adding a pile of dead leaves can attract amphibians and wood mice if you are lucky.

With the pressure on natural habitats, we can help by putting up artificial homes for bats, birds, and bugs. When trying to decide where to locate your box, think about shelter and climate. South facing walls are usually best but, if it is a bat or bird box not in full sun or too close to an existing bird feeding station.

Finally, if you are lucky enough to have the room, digging a pond is one the most effective actions you can take to increase biodiversity in a garden or outdoor space. It can attract damselflies, dragonflies, and other invertebrates. Join the conversation about wildlife and biodiversity in Girton on our new Twitter page twitter.com/Wild_Girton. Stagecoach's decision to axe the Citi 6 bus route in January has been met with dismay by many residents. The only bus service coming through Girton now is the Citi 5 which runs from Cambridge, through Girton and on to Bar Hill, Longstanton, Willingham, Over, Swavesey, Fen Drayton and Fenstanton.


dent in Hicks Lane said: "I would like to suggest the parish council, or our county councillors, on behalf of the village, ask Stagecoach to reinstate the Citi 6 service. The Citi 5 is usually late and overcrowded, as Stagecoach are trying to make one service cover two quite different routes."

Another resident in Dodford Lane added: "The problem living this end of the village is that the Citi 6 service was, and to others, an integral lifeline to travelling into Cambridge or to go further afield."

The latest timetable for the Citi 5 route can be found on the Stagecoach website at

https://www.stagecoachbus.com/timetables. Make sure your location is set as Cambridge before searching, then enter "5" in the download bus timetable pdf box. The current Citi 5 timetable has two stops in the village, Girton Corner and St Andrew's Church, with buses running both ways every half hour from just before 6.30am through to 10.30pm.





Sunday 13th February. I'm listening to Gardeners' Question Time on Radio 4. The first questioner describes how she sets up her sowing, potting-on, planting-out, schedule on Excel Spreadsheets. She wanted advice on the difficulty of schedules in view of the shifting patterns of the seasons, unusually early warm spells and destructive late cold spells.

My first response was amusement that I wasn't a lone 'nerd' in bringing Microsoft office facilities into the service of my gardening. Why not use the 'sort' function to list operations into date order? I have also written before about an allotment friend who uses Excel to work out volumes of his produce and profitability.

The GQT panel suggested that, first and foremost, we should use common sense in planning our sowing and planting times, and in all our horticultural activities. We shouldn't be slaves to the instructions on the back of seed packets. Time to sow in Scotland is not the same time as in southern England. Nor have the seed packet dates taken into account the recent and rapid changes in the arrival and departure of the seasons. And we all have our own experiences of varying conditions: remember last spring with its early warmth and encouragement to get underway, only for cold and wet to then take over and spoil or setback our too-early efforts. I bet there are few of us who have not lost young plants, even under glass, to frost; or who have not listened to the forecast and rushed out in the evening to struggle with covering potatoes which have pushed through. The GQT panellists ended by saying "don't put all your eggs in one basket", or rather "don't sow your entire seed packet in one go".

For years, as I survey the allotments from my study window, or while walking around, I am struck by the multiple varieties of methods, constructions, techniques and timing evident over the site. Evidence that common sense, experience, flexibility are our watchwords. I've remarked on this before: so many approaches to cultivating throughout the site, and yet on the whole we all succeed in growing and harvesting fresh, organic vegetables, fruits and flowers.

Girton Allotment Society enjoys engagements with other village organisations and events. Over recent years, the Society has hosted a soup kitchen at the annual Christmas tree shredding, though unfortunately this year because of Covid precautions we couldn't offer

this service. Plans are already in place for the Allotment and Garden Societies' presence at Girton Feast Week's Saturday climax on Saturday 9th July. They are organising a vegetable and flower competition, open to all Girton gardeners (details in May GPN and from the Garden Society website). There will also be a stall selling vegetables, fruit and flowers (a chance for the village to sample what society members produce).

Within the Allotment Society, there are opportunities to socialise. Working parties gather to maintain the site in good order. I squeezed into the February GPN a collage of pictures of coppicing the hazel area. Once a month, on Sunday lunchtimes, members are invited to gather in the communal orchard area, bringing flasks of coffee, getting to know one another, discussing horticultural hopes and plans. These days, there is quite a big turnover of plot holders and so these gatherings help us to get to know each other amongst the comings and goings of membership.

I'll end where I began. You will be reading this at the beginning of March. All of us plot holders will be full of anticipation, studying our seed packets; watching our seed potatoes chitting (growing shoots) as they sit in a sunny, warm situation; writing up our sowing and planting schedules; and getting close to making a beginning to the new season. And, of course, as the weather gets warmer, the soil drying out, the blustery winds calming down, we'll be out there, preparing the ground for the season's planting.

A Ring for Her Majesty

Did you hear the church bells on 6 February? There are four bells in St Andrew's tower, all dating from the 1600s. We cannot ring them properly because the



frames are too weak, so we simply strike the clapper on the fixed bell: this is known as chiming. The bell ropes end in an open box at ground level

where they can be pulled to sound the bell. Four bells operated by two hands provide rather limited opportunities for changes. But on 6 February we must have managed every possible option.

To mark the accession of Queen Elizabeth the bells of St Andrew's Church were chimed for 70 minutes -- one minute for each year of Her Majesty's reign. Remembering that this was also the anniversary of the death of her father, King George VI, we began with the traditional way of announcing a death: the Nine Tailors, when the Tenor bell is tolled 9 times in three groups of three. Then we invited those gathered to try their hand.



More than a dozen people came, not all Girton residents, and enjoyed the opportunity to ring. Some of us were pretty old, some very young. Some rang fast, some slow,

some loud and some soft. We probably had all possible variations on the sequences possible with four bells. Several parishioners also dropped in just to listen or to find out what the ringing was all



about, and stayed to chat. We made the local press, radio and TV, but our major concern was to celebrate Her Majesty's Jubilee and, in the words of Psalm 100, to `make a joyful noise unto the Lord'.

Schemes and grants supporting residents

GTC is primarily an Almshouse Charity but also provides schemes and grants to enable residents to lead as full a life as possible in the comfort and safety of their own homes.

One of the main ways the Charity can offer assistance is in the form of Personal Grants so that you can pay for things to enable you to do this - whether it is providing a disabled shower, helping fund some training for a career change in later life or buying equipment for a member of your family with additional needs.

Requests for assistance are assessed on need and eligibility. However, GTC is not able to duplicate help that is available from other sources such as local or national government or your employer.

Almshouses

GTC almshouses are intended for Girton families either to help them save and move on to their own home, or for active retirees who can live independently. Appointments to family homes are for three years and for over 55's or people with a registered disability, a permanent appointment is made.

Hospital Taxi Service

Renewals for the Hospital Taxi Service will be sent out at the end of March. This scheme continues to help residents who have problems using public transport or do not have access to a car to attend outpatient appointments. It enables them to get to Cambridge Biomedical Campus including Addenbrooke's Hospital, the Rosie and Royal Papworth Hospital, as well as some of the pandemicdesignated satellite outpatient clinics.

Currently the scheme has over 200 subscribing members who pay an annual registration fee of £7 each April and then taxi fares are capped at £9 for each return trip.

Educational Grant Scheme

This is open to all young people in the Village leaving secondary education for further or higher education leading to a formal examination at degree level BA, MA, PGCert or NVQ Level 4. This Grant can be claimed against actual expenditure on books, equipment, tools or other direct costs for a maximum of four years.



Care Plus Scheme

GTC's Care Plus Scheme. which is to assist Girton residents and their carers to live independently by providing additional short-term care over and above any statutory care to which they are entitled, continues to meet demand. The Grant aims to help residents return home from hospital as soon as possible, responding quickly at time of need. Application is by referral from a health professional with care provided by one of three care companies designated by GTC.

Older residents

Working in partnership with Age UK Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, GTC funds the provision of a Community Warden Scheme and the unique role of Older Residents' Co-ordinator.

Warden Fiona is currently supporting households in Girton with daily telephone calls or essential home visits, as well as helping users to get regular shopping in place, either online or via a local shop.

During the pandemic, Patricia as Older Residents'
Coordinator, has worked tirelessly to encourage older
residents to participate in safe social activities including
doorstep welfare visits and being inventive at finding
creative ways to keep active. As pandemic rules relax,
Patricia will continue to encourage activities - look out
for Tea Dances, Kurling and film shows at the William
Collyn Centre.

Ann Bonnett, GTC Chair said: "Our range of Schemes and Grants is designed to help Girton residents of all ages – from young students undertaking academic courses through to older people who need assistance with living independently. In addition to our established schemes, we welcome applications from individuals who require help in the form of a Personal Grant. We know from feedback what a lifeline this can be so please contact our office for further information."

New Directions

On the route from Girton to Cottenham, the traveller will pass a grassy area in front of houses, where some amazing sculptures are on display. These impressive works of art, presenting a wide variety of subjects, were designed by the late Tony Hillier, formerly a fellow and teacher of the University of Cambridge.

Remarkably, these sculptures were created from steel sheets with a patina of rust. Devoid of painted decoration, they illustrate the gratifying idea that aged and often discarded materials can take on a completely new purpose and display a beauty normally overlooked. These are not old structures patched up to prolong longevity. They are whole new entities destined for fresh artistic significance.

Back in March 2011 a mysterious gift was left on a table in the Scottish Poetry Library in Edinburgh. It was a finely crafted paper sculpture of a tree growing from an old book. It was anonymously donated by a lady who wanted to highlight the national treasure we share in libraries full of books and educational benefits. In the following year, ten more intriguing sculptures were found in different locations around the city. These were not old books with new covers. Instead, butterflies and birds took flight, flowers bloomed and tiny characters rose up from old pages. As international attention marvelled at the ingenuity of this delicate craftsmanship, the Scottish Book Trust commissioned five new works representing the classic titles of Tam O'Shanter, Whisky Galore, Peter Pan, Lanark and Treasure Island. The identity of the artist remains hidden, but these iconic creations have blossomed into what has been described as an attempt to communicate the transformative magic that happens when a book is read.

Across our landscapes, other transformations are taking shape. Those who manage the productivity and health of our crop growing areas are increasingly mindful of the value of older, natural systems that can inform and enhance the welfare of the land. The returning care of wetlands, the replanting of forests and hedgerows, rewilding of seeded fields and riverbanks all contribute to the protection of habitats so recently in danger of losing vital species of wildlife. Old docklands have become pleasant marinas and walkways, coal blighted beaches cleaned once more. Community parks are growing from wasteland and redundant warehouses become refurbished apartments.

The message of renewal and rebirth has always been a central theme of Biblical text, applied not simply to the environment, but particularly to people. The Scriptures record many stories of lives completely changed by a faith encounter with the risen Christ. The Apostle Paul who pursued and persecuted the early converts to Christianity, experienced a complete transformation of the heart and

mind. He declared, "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation, the old has gone, the new has come." (2 Corinthians 5:17).

When the religious teacher Nicodemus visited Jesus secretly to question him, he was baffled by the words, "You must be born again." (John ch.3) He associated birth with the natural process of an individual becoming a newborn creation. Later he realised that the inner being, the spirit and soul of a grown adult could be cleansed, renewed and quickened into a whole new dimension of eternal life through faith in Christ as Redeemer.

The Apostle Peter wrote (I Peter 1:3), "In his (God's) great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead."

King David, who had fallen so far from grace, pleaded, "Create in me a clean heart O God and renew a right spirit within me." (Psalm 51)

Thousands of years later, God is still renewing hearts and minds from the hopelessness of addiction, bitterness, malice, self-harm and dysfunctional practice into new purpose, new hope and changed attitudes. He reconciles us to himself.

The book sculptures wanted to spotlight the power of words to change lives. Jesus said, "The words I have spoken to you are spirit and they are life." (John 6: 63).


