### **Girton Parish Council**

The last two months have been busy for Girton Parish Council, we hope many of you are aware of some of the actions below.

### LHI joint bid with Oakington and Westwick

Girton councillors were overwhelmed by the attendance at the meeting on 4th January to discuss the LHI bid and the 150 responses to our online survey. We were also pleased to welcome Cllr Moore and Cllr Starling, the Chair and Vice Chair of Oakington and Westwick Parish Council to give background on the scheme. The bid to implement a 30mph speed limit on the road between Oakington and Girton was approved at the meeting, and we will ensure that all our residents are kept involved and consulted as we progress this project with the county council. During the LHI survey many of you drew our attention to the need for longer consultation periods. Where possible we will aim to increase the ability for Girton residents to ensure their voice is heard. Some of the ways you can get involved with Girton Parish Council are listed below.

### **Public Meetings**

Three public meetings have now been approved by council for people to come together with councillors to discuss opportunities for greater collaboration between Girton Parish Council and Girton residents, groups, and businesses to discuss local opportunities for: local commercial enterprise, sport and recreation, and active travel. Please keep an eye on our website, Facebook, and Twitter accounts as well as our village noticeboards for information on dates of these meetings.

### Neighbourhood Plan

Our full council meeting to be held on Wednesday, 8th February will include an update from Andrew Muston (Girton Town Charity Trustee) on the possibility of a Neighbourhood Plan for Girton. Neighbourhood Plans are submitted by the village to confirm requirements for the village. Once the plan is completed and adopted, which can take significant time, it will hold weight with local council planners. Please look out for more details in the next edition of the Girton Parish News.

### 2023/2024 precept recommendation

By the time you receive this edition of the Girton Parish News, Girton Parish Council will have voted on the precept request for this year at an extra meeting held on 25th January 2023, ahead of the submission deadline on 31st January. More details to follow.

### Make a difference, join the council

There are many ways for you to get involved in local council initiatives. There are currently four vacancies on our parish council and there are other ways to get involved. We would be very pleased to hear from people who would like to get involved and consider being co-opted to the:

- Local Nature Recovery Working Group
- Pavilion Refurbishment Working Group
- Speed and Safe Travel Group
- Girton Litter Pickers

All the groups would welcome involvement from all our residents and there are plenty of opportunities to do what you do best. If you would like to join any of the above or have further ideas about how you would like to get involved, we would be pleased to hear from you.

### **Pavilion refurbishment project**

The meeting on 25th January will also cover a decision on next steps on the pavilion refurbishment. Girton Parish Council would welcome people who would like to get involved in this project.

### **Bowls club discussion**

At our meeting of 11th January, Girton Bowls Club brought a paper highlighting their important needs for toilets and changing rooms. A working group has been formed, including members from Girton Parish Council, Girton Bowls Club and Girton Town Charity to be chaired by Girton Parish Council to find a solution. ### **Consultations**

Girton Parish Council has been emailing Stagecoach about the bus cuts.

Cllr Muston and the clerk will attend Greater Cambridgeshire Planning appeal regarding Sloe Farm on 31st January where Cllr Muston will register Girton Parish Council's objection to the proposal.

Cllr Carney will be attending the county council's highways meeting, regarding the stopping up of Bridleway 99/6 without giving an adequate alternative route for horse riders and cyclists.

## Temporary closure of the High Street from 1-3 February

This will be to stop any vehicle from proceeding along the High Street (between Cambridge Road and Woodlands Park), although access will be maintained to properties affected. The alternative route for vehicles is via the High Street - Cambridge Road (C198) - Church Lane - Duck End and vice versa. The closure is made to facilitate lead relay supply works which are being carried out.

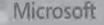

## From Our District Councillors

We hope you have had a good Christmas break, and we wish you health and happiness in the New Year.

### The "Making Connections" consultation

The Making Connections consultation detailing proposals to transform how people travel in and around Greater Cambridge has now officially closed. The Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) has received more than 23,000 responses to an online survey about the proposals. In addition, nearly 900 emails have been received and over 100 stakeholder responses have been submitted following over 100 public meetings, as well as 50 focus group events. Work will now begin to analyse the huge amount of data and information which has been collected, including the many written answers which were an important feature of the survey.

The results of the consultation will be included in a final report scheduled for the GCP Board in June 2023. At that time, the GCP Board will make a recommendation to Cambridgeshire County Council on whether to proceed with the scheme.

Cllr Elisa Meschini, Chair of the GCP's Executive Board, said: "There has never been a more important time for us to find ways to create and provide a modern transport network that is fit for our growing and thriving region. I would like to thank the thousands of people that contributed to the debate over the last ten weeks."

The GCP put forward a package to transform the region's bus network: with low-cost fares, operating longer hours to more locations, alongside significant investment to improve walking and cycling routes. The upgrades will be funded by the GCP and phased in over four years ahead of the proposed introduction of a Sustainable Travel Zone with a road usage charge. The aim of the charge is to cut congestion, free up space for people and buses, and fund the network.

An extensive package of exemptions, discounts, and reimbursements for the STZ is being proposed to help those on lower incomes, blue badge holders, NHS patients and others who have special transportation needs.

### **Housing Issues**

Those who rent a home in the private sector are entitled to seek help from the Council if mould or associated issues are not resolved by the landlord. Private Sector and Housing Association tenants can make a complaint by emailing <code>env.health@scambs.gov.uk</code> .The Council has the power to take the appropriate enforcement action if there are issues that need to be resolved.

Raising Awareness about Disabled Facilities Grants
Cambs Home Improvement Agency (HIA), wanted to
remind all members about the range of grants available to
people with disabilities living in South Cambridgeshire.
This may be particularly relevant to those who are elderly,
vulnerable or have family members with disabilities.

The Disabled Facilities Grant is a mandatory Government grant aimed at people on low incomes or low-income benefits. Each year Cambs HIA enables around 300 older people and people with disabilities to adapt their homes. The agency can help homeowners, or those in housing association properties, make a wide variety of adaptations and repairs (www.cambshia.org). We can also help self-funders who are unable to organise and oversee the work themselves.

Making a Neighbourhood Plan is encouraged by the District Council, and they have various grants to help. It does need a working party in the village to make it happen. 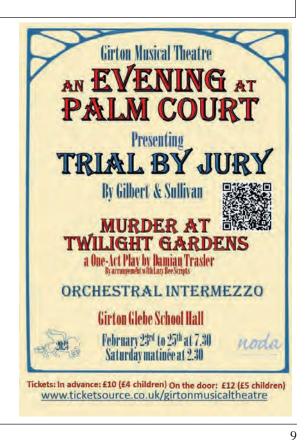

### Wild Girton

Girton's Local Nature Recovery Group is now formally up and running following the adoption of its Terms of Reference by the

Parish Council on 11 January. Taking inspiration from work done by the Wildlife Trusts, and on Local Nature Recovery Plans in other areas, a draft list of priority sites and species in Girton will be brought to a public meeting for feedback and discussion. The public meeting will be held in early spring 2023 - please keep an eye out for the date in the March issue of the Girton Parish News.

Girton's Green Team is busy with work on the Memorial Garden (at the top of Church Lane) and elsewhere. If you would like to help with this work, please email Alison Giles at *arecamuk@yahoo.co.uk*.

Winter is a good time for "housekeeping" in the garden, but as we head into March, please remember that this is the beginning of the nesting period for birds. Hedge trimming should be avoided from 10 March onwards, and always check for any active nests before doing any work.

### This month's sightings - Winter Thrushes

Thrushes include our very familiar Blackbird, Song Thrush and Mistle Thrush, which often serenade us from a high perch within a tree. The Song Thrush sings short, but loud motifs which are generally repeated in threes, and the Mistle Thrush sounds like a melancholy Blackbird.

In winter two other members of the thrush family join our resident three - Redwing and Fieldfare. This season the first Redwing started to arrive in the area towards the end of September, and the Fieldfare a few weeks later in mid-October. The timing of their arrival largely depends on the availability of food in their summer grounds, which they leave when food becomes scarce. Both typically migrate from Scandinavia or further east from across Russia, but Redwing are also known to breed in northern Scotland, the Faroes and Iceland. Redwing tend to migrate at night and flocks can be heard overhead calling to each other with a high-pitched, thin "tseep".

All five thrushes in our local area (Ring Ouzel are also part of the family but are rare visitors to Cambridgeshire) have a spotted chest, though in the Blackbirds this is only faintly visible on the brown females. Redwing, true to their name, have red patches beneath their wings and on their flanks, and pale stripes slightly above the eye and below the cheek. Fieldfares are the largest members of the family and have a grey head and rump, brown back, and black tail. They stand relatively erect and move across the ground in a series of hops. You can often be alerted to their presence by their chattering chack calls.

Both Redwing and Fieldfare are usually found in flocks, often together, and generally in places where there is plenty of open grassy space to forage for invertebrates. Also, shrubs and trees which are laden with berries - hedgerows, woodland margins and patches of scattered scrub - are ideal places to find them. They come into our gardens, though often only when forced by limited food or harsh winter conditions in the open countryside. We would be very interested to hear of any sightings of Redwing or Fieldfare in and around Girton this winter - please send us (using email above) any reports remembering to include details of the location (the more specific the better), time and date of the sighting, and any other details such as how many were in the flock.

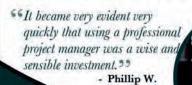

### Sustainable Girton

### Food

Eating is essentially stoking up your internal energy, but it also absorbs a significant part of your income. There are ways you can reduce your food expenditure:

- Make a shopping list and stick to it. Stores are deliberately designed to encourage impulse buying of unnecessary goods. Don't be sucked in.
- Multi-packs are not always cheaper than the same number of singles. Always check.
- Check if you can realistically use all the food if you buy larger quantities or special offers.
- If you have a freezer, it is more efficient to keep it pretty full, so look out for product bargains you can keep in it until needed.
- Use by dates are generally quite pessimistic so don't discard food just because it is beyond the date; check if it still looks and smells OK; and make sure you cook it for long enough to kill any pathogens.
- Whenever you throw any food away, think about why. Did you buy too much of it? Was it hidden in the cupboard or fridge until it went off? There is a saying that the wise learn from their mistakes, and working out what the mistake was can help you do better and save money next time.

### Fridge and freezer

Every time you open the door you lose a lot of the cold air from your fridge or freezer, and you admit warm moist air which takes power to cool. If you have empty spaces, fill them with empty containers (used food containers or yogurt pots for instance). These will trap the cold air and make for greater efficiency.

If the mechanism of the freezer is iced up it will not work efficiently, so keep the freezer defrosted. While you are defrosting remove as much ice as possible and discard it outside: it takes a great deal of energy to melt ice. But be careful you do not damage the freezer coils: never use a metal implement, only a soft plastic or nylon one. The safest way to defrost is to leave the door open and let nature do her work: baking trays on the floor or an old towel can catch the drips from the melted ice.

### **Batteries**

Single-use AA batteries cost anywhere between 20p (bulk buy) and well over a pound. Rechargeable AA batteries cost from one pound upwards and chargers are available for under £10 (though you may need to add another £2 to £3 for a mains adaptor, they tend to have USB

connections). Both sorts of battery vary considerably in the amount of power they contain but they are roughly comparable. (The power you can get out of a non-rechargeable depends a lot on the kind of use but generally AAs are rated at 1500-2500mAh. Rechargeables will have their capacity noted; for AAs probably somewhere between 1000 and 2800mAh.) Rechargeable batteries should be re-usable many times: hundreds if not thousands, and the cost of recharging even at today's energy prices is negligible (less than a penny).

All batteries degrade in time, so if you are buying non-rechargeables in bulk you need to ask if you are going to use them all before they lose their charge. Their major benefit over rechargeables is that they will last a long time (several years) in low-energy devices such as smoke alarms, where rechargeables are not recommended. They also have a slightly higher power output of 1.5V compared to 1.3V for most rechargeables; this is rarely an issue.

It therefore makes financial sense to use rechargeables for almost everything that needs a battery. I'm ignoring the embedded carbon, and the ecological cost of manufacture because I don't have the figures, but I doubt they would change that conclusion.

### **Girton WI**

The WI's motto is "inspiring women," and so it was fitting that Girton WI's January meeting not only included a vote on which

of the four national resolutions Girton's members thought should be carried forward by the National Federation this year, but also a talk about the amazing Cicely Saunders, the founder of the modern hospice movement, given by her niece Kate Kirk.

In a moving and inspirational talk, Kate introduced us by way of historical family photos, to Cicely Saunders and her family, as she grew from schoolgirl to nurse in war-torn London and her training as a doctor. Inspired by the patients she had befriended, and volunteering in Christian homes for the dying, Cicely battled against her own ill health. She faced discrimination because of her gender and age, and because pain management and palliative care were not approved areas of medicine. Despite the odds, she succeeded every time, qualifying as a social worker, and as a doctor she was awarded funding to undertake research into better pain management for patients. In 1965, she founded and built what was to be the first modern hospice, St Christopher's Hospice in Sydenham. Here, patients were treated differently, with the holistic medical care that hospices are known for today. Finally, in 1987, the Royal College of Physicians recognised palliative medicine as a medical specialty. Today, her legacy lives on with hospices in 136 countries and a world-leading research centre at King's College, London.

Cicely's historically significant work was recognised both in her lifetime (with a DBE, a Papal Damehood, and as a member of the Order of Merit personally chosen by Queen Elizabeth II) and since then, by featuring on both a stamp, and a google doodle. It was therefore an honour for us to hear about this wonderful woman, and to hear her personal story as told by her niece Kate.

We look forward to our next meeting on 1 February, where Gwenda Kyd will be talking about "Incredible edible (and drinkable) plants".

## Jack's Gelato bids to transform Manor Farm into an ice cream factory

Manor Farm in Girton could become home to an artisan ice cream company under new plans for the site.

A planning application has been submitted by Jack's Gelato to change the use of the farm to manufacture ice cream.

The farm had previously been let to the former deputy leader of



Cambridgeshire County Council, Roger Hickford, who left abruptly in controversial circumstances.

Currently the site has permission to operate as a canine training centre, which was obtained by Mr Hickford in 2019, although not put into use.

Alongside the plans to make artisan ice cream, the new application also looks to install ground-based solar panels, up to 40cm high, to provide power to the business with wildflowers planted around them.

The application, submitted to South Cambridgeshire District Council, states: "Jack's Gelato is a small company based in Cambridge. The company has a strong environmental focus and will be net zero no later than 2030.

"It uses electric vehicles and has minimised use of the single fossil fuel vehicle in its fleet to less than 1,000 miles a year, which will be replaced with an electric version when the opportunity arises.

"It uses no other fossil fuels in its operations. Every employee travels to work by foot, cycle or train."

Four employees would work at the site, which would open from 8am to 6pm on Monday to Friday, and 10am to 6pm on weekends.

There are also no "significant changes" planned for the outside of the existing barn building.

The application adds: "The proposal establishes an artisan ice cream manufacturer on a site that has previously had permission for a significantly more intensive canine training centre use, whilst also boosting biodiversity on site and creating a blueprint for a small, truly sustainable and community-orientated business. It also creates much-needed rural jobs in a sustainable location that is easily accessible via public transport."

### Training in January and ahead

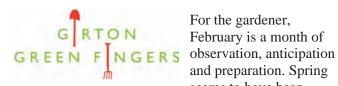
By the close of January, I will have delivered two Suicide First Aid courses, two Mental Health Awareness courses and one Mental Health First Aid Refresher course.

For the gardener, and preparation. Spring seems to have been

arriving ever earlier in recent years, and as I am writing this in mid-January the first signs of new growth can already be seen. Viburnum bodnantense, Prunus 'Autumnalis', yellow jasmine and Iris unguicularis have all been in flower for weeks now, the buds of hazel catkins are already forming, and snowdrops, hellebores and crocuses are near to flowering in neighbouring gardens. On bright warm days I have already heard the 'teacher, teacher' spring call of the great tits in our silver birches, (said to be the origin of the taunt 'tell tale tit') and have seen some early solitary bees on the heathers. However, the full flush of spring growth is way off, and any outside gardening this month will centre around preparation for the rush of planting, pruning and mulching which comes with March.

Out in the garden on drier days several tasks will pay later dividends: complete winter digging; rake and aereate a

newly mossy lawn (using a fork to create air holes); warm the ground for early planting, by covering the soil with cardboard, old compost bags or even carpet; renewal prune old shrubs, deciduous hedges and climbers; and hoe off any annual weed growth which has appeared in a warm spell.

On fine days it feels great to get out in the garden and start 'real gardening' again, but there are many wet and cold days when indoor tasks can provide an alternative to uncomfortable outdoor working. One essential task is to check, clean, sharpen and oil all garden tools, as this promotes efficient, healthy gardening! We now have a professional knife maker in the area who offers a sharpening service (see GPN ad), and there is also a range of relatively inexpensive sharpening tools from firms like Darlac, Fiskars and Stihl for a DIY job.

Another useful cleaning task is to wash and disinfect

all pots which will be reused for seeds or plants this year, as these are prone to damping off and disease in dirty pots. Bird feeders and bird baths should also be cleaned (gloves advised) as diseases such as avian flu, and trichonomosis in finches can spread easily through contaminated feeding equipment.

February is also the time to finalise plans for changes in the garden. Difficult decisions arise from the long dry summer and intermittent periods of heavy rainfall which we experienced in 2022 and the possibility of a repeat in '23. What new plants should we try, which old favourites do we abandon, and what adaptations are necessary for our existing garden?

Obviously it is worthwhile having as many water butts as possible for the dry summer months (and any possible hosepipe bans!), and also many people are considering replacing their summer-brown lawn (probably now fully greened up again) with a scree garden and drought resistant plants, or a wildflower meadow which can tolerate dry, impoverished soil. However, both these changes need detailed planning to succeed. Scree gardens must be very well drained and not in a frost pocket or plants will not survive in the winter, and a wildflower meadow requires well-drained impoverished soil, so previously cultivated soil must be sown with yellow rattle for a year to reduce fertility.

With regard to changing plant choices, the RHS have announced that they may relocate any rhododendrons propagated at Wisley (Surrey) to their northern properties where there may be higher rainfall and lower temperatures in summer. It was also interesting to learn that our local garden centres found difficulty in keeping hydrangeas in good condition, even with shading, during the summer heatwave. Are these still a good choice for our gardens?

I also wonder how well the many trees, perennials and annuals that survived the drought period and then had a 'second spring' of late growth/ flowering in the long autumn will perform this year? Will they be weakened by their experience of a double season? Only time and close observation will tell!

### What are you looking for?

At the moment, the church is in the season of Epiphany, during which we reflect on how Jesus was revealed to the world (most especially in the visit of the Wise Men). As part of this season we've been looking at Jesus' first encounters with his disciples.

In John's Gospel, the first thing Jesus asks is "What are you looking for?". Andrew slightly stumbles over his answer but comes to realise that what he's been looking for all his life is found in Jesus. Later, when some find Jesus' teaching too hard, he'll ask the disciples if they also want to walk away. Peter responds: "Where else is there to go? You have the words of eternal life".

In response to the question "What are you looking for?" I suppose most of us will identify similar things. We would all like to be happy, fulfilled, love and be loved, have good relationships, have enough money etc. But where do we go to find these things?

It seems that not long ago our culture affirmed that identity and character are developed through time and experience. A fully realised human being is something you became through the journey of life; we observed, experimented, learned, changed and grew over time. Not all of these experiences were pleasant ones. The wisdom of hard-won experience was something to be treasured.

Nowadays we tend to focus on identity as something that is more innate, and therefore see the purpose of our journey in terms of discovering our "true self" and bringing this inner reality to life. Being true to ourselves is fundamental in living an authentic life.

There is wisdom in both schools of thought, but either can be taken to unhelpful extremes. Too much focus on the first can lead to an unhealthy and unhelpful sense that "I can be anything I want to be if I only work hard enough" (ignoring the circumstances and characteristics that inevitably constrain us). Over-emphasis on our innate identity can lead to a straight-jacket that fatalistically binds and determines the possibilities available to us.

The insight of the Christian worldview is that Jesus, the Son of God, walks the journey with us. He has walked the path too. He helps us to tread the narrow path between having all possibilities open to us (and finding they are not) on one hand and having our identity entirely as a given (and missing the opportunities we have to grow and change) on the other.

In walking with Jesus we have the absolute security of knowing ourselves beloved children of God, from which we can grow into the people we are called to be. From this safety we can face those aspects of our character we would rather hide, and we can explore new things too.

And, down the centuries, Christian people have consistently found themselves most fulfilled in following. Not following their inner self; not following the devices and desires of their own hearts; but in following the way of Christ in obedience to God's will.

What are you looking for? If it's fullness of life then I suggest you look no further than Jesus.

Devotional thought: Psalm 74 begins with a cry, "Why have you rejected us for ever, O God?" As with many of the Psalms, it begins with lament and with many complaints. But by the end, although not much has necessarily changed externally, the Psalmist is in an altogether better place of confident faith. The Scottish pastor and theologian Samuel Rutherford once said, "I see grace grows best in winter." In other words, it is often in the school of suffering that we learn most. It is the place we can most easily find God.

The American hymn writer and poet, Samuel Longfellow (1819-1892) wrote a hymn that expresses this truth, apparently with Psalm 74 in mind. He wrote, "Although it is winter now ... and all the earth lies dead and drear ... yet God's love is not withdrawn, his life within the keen air breathes, his beauty paints the crimson dawn." This is not a hymn we sing at GBC, but as poetry it communicates.
