From Our Councillors

District Councillors' Report July 2023

Cost of Living

With the weather getting colder and communities spending more on heating, the District Council is beginning a new campaign to urge residents to make full use of the assistance available.

Research suggests that around 25% of some benefits go unclaimed. The Council is therefore encouraging residents to check they are claiming what they are legitimately entitled to.

The campaign also reminds people that local foodbanks - all listed on the council's website - are there when needed, and you don't need a voucher to use most of them.

There is also an appeal for residents to get energysaving advice and more information on grants for home improvements to cut spending on energy bills during the winter.

Flooding

On the South Cambs website, there is a useful list of things residents can do in advance of rainfall under the "Be prepared for flooding" section. This includes signing-up for flood warnings, using the Government's Flood Information Service to check if a property is at risk of flooding, and preparing a flood plan. If you visit the flooding page of our website, there is a list which residents can refer to, to ascertain what would need to be reported in the event of a flood.

There is also a specific section about the provision of sandbags. The Council does not provide a sandbag service to residents. This is why it is important that any residents who think they may need sandbags source them in advance of bad weather.

Build Back Better is a government scheme which can offer up to £10,000 extra to enable property flood resilience measures to be installed following a flood insurance claim. Not all insurers are signed up to this scheme, residents will need to ask their insurers, and if not, shop around for an insurance company which does.

New Council Houses

South Cambridgeshire District Council and partners have delivered 22 new build council homes across the

district, further increasing the number of homes that are genuinely affordable for local people to live in.

All properties are built to a high specification with high levels of insulation and double-glazed windows to help reduce monthly costs of keeping the homes warm as winter approaches.

Parking Issues

There have been reports of inconsiderate parking in the village resulting in a safety issue for other road users, such as parking on a corner which reduces the visual field for others. Also, in Wellbrook Way parking should not be near the chicane, making it more difficult for others to manoeuvre.

Civil Parking Enforcement

The scheme is ready and pending parliamentary approval. This will transfer most of the parking enforcement to the District Council. In mid-December, the scheme will go live, if approved, but until full implementation on 1 February 2024, only warnings will be issued. Fines will be levied from 1 February.

Initial emphasis will be placed on parking hot-spots and schools.

The team has been inspecting roads prior to the scheme being implemented.



It is undeniable that we have seen changes in local weather patterns and unpredictable plant behaviours during this summer, and now in the autumn. But at least we can count our blessings that we, in Girton, have not had flash floods or drought!

Gardening in a Changing Climate, a Study commissioned by the RHS in collaboration with the Universities of Sheffield and Reading, presents the results of an extensive survey of amateur gardeners and interviews with industry professionals. It highlights the importance of gardens in terms of their interaction with the natural environment and provides recommendations on how gardeners can adapt to climate change through plant choice and garden design. While there is no clear indication of temperature outlook for December 2023 and January 2024, we can expect it to be influenced by El Niño events. Gardeners should be aware of likely changes so that they can take appropriate measures to protect their gardens through plant choice and garden design. And manage their gardens to enhance carbon sequestration and flood alleviation. So, 'Be Prepared'!

December is the month for festivities but it's also a good time to take care of our gardens. Here are some garden chores you can do in December.

- Service the lawnmower; clean the blades, change the oil and replace any worn-out parts. And clean and sharpen your hand tools so they're ready to use in the spring.
- Bring plants that are not hardy, including bonsai trees, into cold greenhouses or cold frames or cover with

- horticultural fleece to protect from frost.
- Check any vegetables and bulbs that are in storage; use them or dispose that are starting to rot.
- If it's frosty, stay off the grass; walking on frozen grass can damage the blades and roots, so it's best to avoid it altogether!
- Water and fertilise houseplants less in winter because houseplants grow slower in the winter and need less water and fertiliser
- Plant winter vegetables such as kale, spinach, and broccoli. They can withstand cold weather and will be ready to harvest in the spring.
- Prune trees and shrubs to help them grow better in the spring; remove dead or diseased branches and cut back any overgrown areas. Clean up your garden and remove any dead leaves and garden debris to prevent pests and diseases from spreading.
- Feed the birds! Birds need food during the winter, so put out some birdseed or suet balls to attract them to your garden.
- If you are missing fresh herbs, start an indoor herb garden; you can grow herbs such as basil, parsley, and thyme in small pots on a windowsill or conservatory.
- Start a compost heap and the compost will be ready to use in the spring as a natural fertiliser for your garden.
- Plan for next year: December is a great time for planning for next year's garden. Seed catalogues should start to arrive. After the holidays you can research new plants and flowers you want to grow and make a list of what you need.
- Take a break from your own garden, visit Cambridge University Botanic Gardens for inspiration and to enjoy some beautiful scenery.



Wild Girton

While many plants die back over winter, some keep their foliage, or

even flower so winter isn't a time to be a complacent botanist, there is always plenty to see!

Festive foliage

Holly and Mistletoe are two which are in leaf all year round and are thus used in festive decorations. At this time of year Holly is often covered in red berries which provide a fabulous buffet for some of our winter birds and small mammals. Holly often grows as a small shrub in our gardens, but left unchecked it can grow into a large tree and live for up to 300 years. In spring the Holly Blue butterfly, which overwinters in the ground as a chrysalis, will lay eggs on Holly and its caterpillars will feed on its flowers and leaves. This is the first generation of this butterfly, which will then go on to lay eggs on Ivy for the second generation in later summer.

Mistletoe has increased in abundance in the last few decades and Cambridge is a particular hot-spot for this plant. If you'd like to see some, head to St Andrew's Church where you will see large bundles of it high up in the branches of the Poplar and Lime trees. Mistletoe is a parasitic plant and favours Apple, Lime and Hawthorn as its host plants, but it doesn't do them any harm. Its growth form is very geometric, with each branch bifurcating each season, producing a very spherical body to the plant. Each individual Mistletoe is either male or female, and both have tiny flowers in early spring which are pollinated by insects. Its recent increase in abundance is often attributed to the more frequent overwintering of Blackcap which eat the sticky berries but then wipe the remaining seed onto the bark of a tree with their beak, allowing a new plant to develop.

Join the New Year Plant Hunt

This year marks the 14th New Year Plant Hunt run by the Botanical Society of Britain and Ireland. Anyone, no matter what experience you have, can join in - all you need to do is take a walk between 30th December and 2nd January and jot down any plants which you see that are in flower. Many of those in the previous Top 20 will be ones that you are familiar with (Dandelion, Daisy, Hazel, Ivy-leaved Toadflax) and if you sign up you will be sent a spotter sheet to identify these. Go to https://bsbi.org/new-yearplant-hunt to find out more. If you are not very confident in recording but would like to learn how, there will be a group hunt on the 1st January in the West Cambridge area led by the county botanical recorder Jonathan Shanklin (please email *lnrp@girton-pc.gov.uk* for details). The purpose of this annual recording is partly to see how changes in our climate are affecting the way in which plants behave, and long-term data sets such as this will be invaluable in future years to map changes in distribution in both space and time.

Hibbert-Ware Garden needs your help!

Our project to redesign the Hibbert-Ware Garden (opposite the church) has begun! This ambitious project will see the garden planted up with a variety of native plants, a bog garden, Hugelkultur beds, a laid hedge and more. This garden is in honour of Alice Hibbert-Ware, a self-taught naturalist who lived in Girton, and is being re-designed by local business Purple Flowers Gardens and Mosaics very much with wildlife in mind. It is hoped to be a showcase of wildlife-gardening techniques which we can all use in our individual gardens.

There are many ways in which you can help with this project,



from volunteering time to do the gardening, helping with fundraising, donating surplus plants from your gardens or donating towards its costs, please be in touch if you would like to help in any of these ways. An update from Fen Drayton Lakes

With the end of the year fast approaching, in this article we will share a brief review of 2023, looking at the wildlife that has been seen on site and the work we have undertaken to improve the reserve for both visitors and nature.

We experienced a couple of cold snaps over the early winter period which led to several of the

lakes completely icing over. On the remaining lakes, patches of water were kept open by the ducks and other wildfowl which were all condensed into small areas. This brought in some Smew, scarce ducks from the continent, the adult males dressed in white with neat black trim and the females and youngsters having a chestnut-red head.

Come the spring, the volunteer group had repaired the floating fences which surround several of the islands on Moore and Ferry Lakes and we towed them out by boat. The fences help stop mammalian predators from reaching the islands and taking all the bird's eggs. However, flooding shortly after the fences were moored led to them being damaged and torn apart in places. With that and bird flu it was a tough breeding season for the Blackheaded Gulls and Common Terns, but some made it through the other side and even managed to fledge youngsters.

Elsewhere, we were pleased to record several of our target breeding birds in healthy numbers. Two Bitterns were booming from the reedbeds this year and at least three Turtle Doves purred from the treetops. Two of the Turtle Dove males are thought to have found females and raised young. The latter species is declining in the whole of the UK with just 2000 pairs left.

It was a delight to find a nest of Hobby Falcons over the summer. This is an uncommon bird of prey that feeds exclusively on dragonflies and small birds, particularly favouring wetland sites. Whilst we spot the birds each summer, finding a nest was a first for the team. The adults went on to fledge three youngsters. Also rarely observed here are young Cuckoos. We hear the adults for much of the summer but as the youngsters are quiet, they are much harder to see. One near the main car park delighted several visitors before it inevitably departed for warmer climes.

There is a charge of £3.50 for the car park (card payment only; free for members of Cambridge Past, Present and Future). Meet in the car park at 10am. Saturday 6 January: Girton to the West Cambridge site and back

Girton Parish Council 2024/2025 Budget and Precept

Can you help Girton Parish Council as we decide upon the Girton Parish Council's precept for 2024/2025?

Note: The precept is the parish council's share of the council tax. It is calculated as part of the parish council's budget and is the amount of council tax that the billing authority collects on behalf of a parish council. The precept demand goes to the billing authority, which collects the tax for the Parish Council. The 'Precept' is converted into an amount per Council Tax Band that is added onto the Council Tax bill.

One of the most important decisions, if not the most important decision that every Parish Council has to make is to plan a budget to cover Operations, Asset Management and New Projects each year. Girton Parish Council wishes to understand better your requirements and needs in order to make better decisions on your behalf.

Girton's precept is currently £74.51 for a band D house and is currently ranked 66 in terms of size out of 103 Parish Councils in SCDC. The precept was raised by £0.92 by Girton Parish Council last year and has seen a rise of £7.03 over the past 5 years. For more information on this see Girton Village Community Website.

This year we want to hear from you in order to ensure that our budget better understands the needs and aspirations of all Girton residents and to allow us to set a realistic, transparent 3-year plan.





Cambridge Aid

In 1880 there were 260 people in the Cambridge Union Workhouse, with many more in other neighbouring workhouses. The local charity, the Cambridge Mendicity Society, had just closed its doors.

Fortunately, two prominent Cambridge Victorians decided to take action. The philosopher Henry Sidgwick and his wife Eleanor founded a new charity, The Cambridge Charity Organisation. They were given permission to distribute bread to "wayfarers" and received support from Cambridge colleges and churches in the town.

Over the decades, the focus of the charity's activities changed as new legislation was introduced. The need for workhouses decreased with the introduction of unemployment benefits and the state pension. During its long history the charity helped with funding for a range of needs, including health care for children until the creation of the NHS. In 1917 the name of the charity was changed to the Cambridge Central Aid and Charity Organisation Society.

In 1939 the Citizens Advice Bureau began providing help to the people of Cambridge and CCACOS formed a partnership with the CAB that is still as important today.

In 2016 the name of the charity was simplified to Cambridge Aid, and today we operate by providing emergency grants of up to £200 to people who are referred to us by over 40 agencies in Cambridge and the surrounding villages. These agencies include Citizens Advice, local councils, NHS support teams, women's resource centres and a range of charities including Jimmy's and The Red Hen Project.

Cambridge Aid has no employees or premises and is entirely run by volunteers. As a result, our overheads are less than 1% of our income and 99p of every pound donated is passed on as grants.

This year, for the first time in our history, we anticipate that we will provide over 1,000 grants.

Shortly after becoming a Trustee in 1998, Robin became Chair and led the Charity's decision to sell its land on Wellbrook Way, resulting in a significant

endowment from which the interest could be used to increase the provision of almshouses and range of schemes and grants to help residents.

Under Robin's leadership, awards were made to numerous Village projects and Schemes and Grants introduced to enable all ages to benefit, from pre-school and primary age children's projects, through to a Youth Group, a Hospital Taxi Scheme, a short-term Care Grant, the Age UK Warden Scheme and Older Residents' Coordinator.

Developments

Further properties were built for almshouse use, the Sensory Garden was created, the Goose Sculpture Railings were installed and the William Collyn Community Centre built and named after the charity's founder.

Then Trustees also took the huge step to develop the site at Michael's Close, with discussions going back to 2006 and resulting finally in the completion of Dovehouse Court earlier this year.



Huge contribution

GTC Chair Ann Bonnett said: "In listing just some of the many achievements during Robin's time with GTC, we can see what an enormous contribution he has made to our community and we owe him a huge debt of gratitude. I'd also like to thank his wife Sheila for her support, not least for allowing her home to be the office for many years and taking endless phone calls. In conclusion, we all wish him a wonderful retirement and a happy 75th birthday which he is celebrating today."

Messages were also received from other friends and colleagues unable to attend. These included Brian Pycock and Rowena Barnes who said: "Robin has been key in supporting so many developments in Girton, championing almshouses and providing facilities for use by Girton residents."

Douglas de Lacey added: "I'd like to express my thanks and my very best wishes for your future. Through your work with the Charity, the whole Village has been the beneficiary."



A selection of wines to enjoy this Christmas

Grove Mill, Wairau Valley, Marlborough 2021 (New Zealand)

This aromatic Sauvignon Blanc from New Zealand will get your Christmas festivities off to a great start. Pronounced aromas of elderflower, peach, lychee, and guava on the nose herald flavours of lime, nectarine, and passion fruit on the palate. The layers of fruit are well supported by the bright acidity and lasting finish, and a hint of minerality adds a further level. This delightful wine is perfect by itself or with a seafood dish. Available from **Co-op** (£10.50)

Lyrarakis Assyrtiko 2022 (Crete)

This Assyrtiko wine from Crete is a dry wine with a crisp, refreshing acidity. It has pronounced aromas of honey, together with apple and peach, on the nose, and flavours of apple, pear, and peach on the palate. It is a well-balanced, medium-bodied wine with a long finish that can be enjoyed as an apéritif and is also an excellent match for seafood. Available from **Majestic** (£12.99, Mix Six £10.99)

Les Hauts de Saint Martin, Saint Chinian 2021 (France)

This Saint-Chinian wine from the Languedoc-Roussillon region of southern France is a smooth, rich, full-bodied wine. A blend of Syrah, Grenache, Carignan and Mourvèdre grapes, this is a dry wine with medium acidity, medium tannins, and a lengthy finish. With bramble, plum and cherry on the nose, and an array of red and black fruits, and a hint of spice on the palate, this is a very appealing wine that pairs well with a roast meat dish, or roasted vegetables. Available from **Co-op** (£10)

Radlow Hundred English Red NV (Herefordshire)

This smooth, silky red wine from Radlow Hundred Vineyard in Herefordshire is a blend of Pinot Noir, Regent, and Rondo grape varieties. With aromas of raspberry, cherry and plum on the nose, and plenty of red fruit flavours, notably cherry, on the palate, this is a well-balanced wine with medium tannins and a hint of pepper on the finish. It is an ideal match for the complex blend of flavours associated with a traditional Christmas lunch. Available from **Grape Britannia** (£16.99)

Sainsbury's Taste the Difference Pedro Ximénez (Spain)

This Pedro Ximénez (PX) from Sainsbury's is a full-bodied, lusciously sweet wine with a long, velvety finish. With aromas of honey, raisin, and toffee, reminiscent of a mince pie, on the nose, and coffee, caramel, and toffee flavours on the palate, this is a perfect match for Christmas pudding or other rich desserts and mature cheeses. Available from Sainsbury's (£9)

Campbell's Rutherglen Muscat (Australia)

The lusciously sweet **Campbell's Rutherglen Muscat** is another treat for the palate. Made from a blend of vintages of Muscat à petit grains rouges (Rutherglen Brown Muscat), it has flavours of fruitcake, dates, and nuts, and is a smooth, wonderfully balanced wine. It is a perfect match for cheese or dessert. Available from **Waitrose** (£13.99)

Church can change your perspective



How do we know?

Christmas season is rolling around again. As I write (in mid-November) the shops have been full of Christmas goodies for weeks, and every other advert on the TV is a schmaltzy Christmas offering. So, this year I've been pondering what it means to really enter into the "Christmas spirit"? What does it mean to "know" about Christmas?

There are different kinds of "knowing". There's mathematical knowledge, which is mostly quite abstract and "pure". There's scientific knowledge, which looks at the world and seeks to understand it through observation and experiment. There's historical knowledge; considering evidence from the past to try to understand what happened and why. All these kinds of knowing are useful and good in helping us to live well

But there is also what one might call "relational" knowledge. Many of the social, political, moral, and cultural questions of the day are fundamentally "relational" and "inter-personal" in nature. Of course, these kinds of questions can (and should) be informed by other forms of knowledge, but the "answers" are not so straightforwardly discerned.

Christian faith (and, by extension, the Christmas story itself) is also profoundly and fundamentally relational and personal in nature. It is rooted in and informed by the historical events of the birth, life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, but to think of Christianity purely in historical terms is a category error. As Lesslie Newbigin put it:

"The fundamental and unifying fact is the personal nature of God and [humanity]. Only in the light of this fact... do we see God's revelation [through Jesus] not as a piece of information, but as the love which discloses its nature in the act of seeking its object, and [our] response not merely as the mastering of an advanced lesson in metaphysics, but as the answer of heart and mind and will to the love that is seeking [us]."

The personal, relational nature of Christian faith is why we don't just gather like a book club to practice our faith. Christian faith has generated a huge range of artistic, poetic, and musical attempts to articulate what God has done through Jesus. A central part of Christian life is to gather around God's table to share bread and wine. We don't just know about Jesus; we seek to know Jesus. This Christmas there are lots of opportunities to explore what it means to know God at both of your local churches. Quite soon you should get a postcard through your door with all the details. You could join us for food and singing at the Old Crown (19-20 Dec). You could experience Christmas through jazz music and fellowship (9 Dec). You could maybe meet God through the mystery of Carols by Candlelight (18 Dec), or through oranges and sweets at Christingle (Christmas Eve). Come and meet with the God who wants to meet with you!
