GIRTON PARISH COUNCIL



The following are amongst items discussed at Parish Council meetings and information received by the Clerk

At the July meeting, the Parish Council was delighted

to offer support to two community initiatives, namely the establishment of a Girton Speedwatch group, and Girton Open Gardens' use of the decommissioned telephone kiosk on Cambridge Road as a horticultural display.

The organisers of Girton Feast Week were congratulated on another very successful week of events, culminating in the Feast Fun Day at Girton Recreation Ground, which so many villagers enjoyed on 8th July.

The question of the charge to the Feast for use of Parish Facilities was revisited. Because the Feast Organising Committee make donations from profits to selected groups in the village, provision of facilities at a reduced rate could be legally challenged as misuse of public funds. The matter has been discussed with the Feast Committee who have agreed that in exchange for the Parish Council continuing to demonstrate its support for the event by charging a reduced rate, the Feast will make a donation from surplus funds towards upkeep of the village in a designated area. It was resolved therefore to charge the Feast a nominal sum of £50 for use of Parish facilities (this is necessary to ensure that PC insurance is in place for users), and to accept a donation of £250 from profits to pay for maintenance of a selected public footpath or hedgerow.

Several items of lost property have been left at the Pavilion and Recreation Ground over the summer. These include a men's bicycle – if this is yours, do please get in touch.

As parking continues to cause problems in South Cambs, Cambridgeshire Constabulary will continue to carry out crackdown days until the parking situation improves. Every crackdown day is based solely on the information residents have given the police since the last one — so if parking continues to be a problem where you live, please take a minute to tell the police by visiting *tinyurl.com/SouthCambs-Parking*.

Next meetings

The next meetings of the Parish Council will be held on Tuesday 15th August and Tuesday 19th September, both starting at 7.30pm at St Vincent's Close Community Centre. Members of the public are welcome to attend all Parish Council meetings, and to speak in the open session at the start.

FROM OUR COUNCILLORS

This month the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP), previously the Greater Cambridge City Deal,

announced a refreshed vision for how the GCP will accelerate the building of thousands of new homes and jobs and create a fit-for-the-future transport network. The change of name is accompanied by the strap line 'Growing & Sharing Prosperity' to reflect a strong collaborative and partnership approach. The refreshed vision and its ambitions include: working together to grow and share prosperity and improve quality of life, now and in the future; creating better and greener transport networks, connecting people to homes, jobs, study and opportunity; accelerating housing delivery and homes for all; inspiring and developing our future workforce so that businesses can grow; inventing and developing smart technology to support transport, housing and skills.

Each year Cambridgeshire Library Service runs a Summer Reading Challenge during the summer holidays. Last year over 5000 Cambridgeshire children took part. This year's challenge is called 'Animal Agents' and is supported by award winning illustrator Tony Ross. Children can sign up at their local library from Saturday 15th July. Entry is free and there are exclusive rewards to collect along the way as entrants read six library books of their choice to complete the challenge. 'Animal Agents' will provide a fun element to encourage children to read lots of books, keeping up their reading skills over the long holidays. All children who take part will be given a collector's folder to record their summer reading, and if they complete the challenge they will be rewarded with a medal and certificate. Please note that families who are going away for most of the summer holidays can still take part. Children can either catch up when they get back or they can collect a 'holiday pack' from their local library to take away with them.

The County Council has just commenced a consultation on the redesign of Children's Centre Services. You can read about what is being proposed and respond to the consultation at:

www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/residents/children-and-families/children-s-centres/children-s-centres-consultation/. Children's Centres currently offer support for all stages of family life, from the time that parents are expecting their first child through to when the children are young adults. The proposal is to maintain the same level of support but in a more local way that will make access easier. The consultation runs

until 22nd September 2017 and, for those who prefer it, hard copies can be found at children's centres and libraries. The decision on how the service will be run in future will be made by the Children & Young People Committee when it meets in the autumn.

Lovely weather made for another great Girton Feast this year and thanks to all those who worked so hard to make it a success. I had a great time listening to Jazz in the evening sunshine on Saturday and enjoying Hymns with Pimms on Sunday. I hope the good weather will continue and that you will all have an opportunity for some rest and relaxation over the next month.

A View from the District

At a meeting with senior planning officers I raised the growing backlog of planning applications; it is worrying, though it is still nowhere near the peak earlier in the year. The Combined Planning

project (Hunts, City and SCDC) is moving on and is intended to improve our throughput and efficiency. Although the Northstowe developers are not adhering to the agreed design code we have to be pragmatic. The Neighbourhood Plans team has suffered some illness, and members are also very busy with the Local Plan, so little has taken place. However the Council is thinking more and more of using Neighbourhood Plans as a major planning tool. Please let me know if you would be prepared to join the Girton team.

With residents now moving in to homes on the NW Cambridge site there is a flurry of activity. I attended a meeting of the 'NW Sub-Group' set up by the City Council and University to ensure new residents have the facilities they need. I was pleased that in the sliding scale of fees for the Community Centre (located south of the boundary, so in the City) all Girton residents are to be given preferential rates. Sainsburys should open early in September and there will be a formal 'opening' of the site on 9 September. I also had a meeting with the project director, largely to try to trace the village sign and boundary stone both of which disappeared in the

course of installing the Eddington entrance. The University claims no knowledge of either, and my investigations continue.

On 21 June the JDCC met to consider the first major private residential site (for market housing) at NW Cambridge. It was disappointing to see what a commercial developer can come up with even in a supposedly sustainable exemplar and even after what were described as 'extensive pre-application discussions'. After the formal business (approving the above) we had a presentation by the same developer on its future plans for NW Cambridge. It was clear they had heard our criticism so maybe things will improve by the time the market housing comes to Girton.

Following the resurfacing of Girton Road I was contacted by County officers to discuss a revision to the road layout, to permit an advisory 1m wide cycle lane from St Margaret's Road to the cycle escape at Girton Corner. This was made possible because the centre lines could be moved over a bit. Although I am not in favour of sub-standard cycle lanes this is a very special case where for significant parts of the day the escape is inaccessible, being blocked by queueing vehicles, and I felt it was a good idea. I am pleased to see that it has now been marked up and the cycle lane will come into existence when the lines are re-painted. I cannot promise any future resurfacing, though I'm hopeful; I would welcome suggestions as to how things might be changed if the rest of Girton Road is re-done.

The Greater Cambridge City Deal has become aware that it is becoming a poisonous brand, so it has relaunched itself as the Greater Cambridge Partnership, absorbing the mayor as it does so. The re-launch provided plenty of verbal aspiration with a vision of 'Working together to grow and share prosperity and improve quality of life now and in the future'. There were some searching (pre-submitted) questions to which the answer was generally 'We're coming to that'. I happened to sit next to Andy Campbell of Stagecoach; he said he had to get information about the project from press reports, though in answer to his question he was told he would be more involved in future. The mayor is keen on tunnelling.

I have just read a 1950 planning report to the County Council, which includes two interesting paragraphs:

'277 We have tried to find out whether any real advantage would be gained – boom or slump – from a general growth in population, and cannot discover any which is likely to be lasting ... soon the status quo would be restored, with living conditions for almost everyone a little worse than they were before.

'278 When a longer view is taken it still seems to us

that a large growth of population would have many drawbacks and would bring no advantage to the general body of citizens.'

Are things very different in 2017?

We seem still to be having problems with bin collections. You can report problems in 3 ways: go to www.scambs.gov.uk ('Report it' on the front page, then 'Contact us'); by emailing refuse@scambs.gov.uk; or by calling 03450 450 063. Please also report any problems to me so I can ensure action is taken.

The Police and Crime Commissioner is making a power grab: he wishes to take over the Fire Service. Details of a consultation are at www.cambridgeshire-pcc.gov.uk/get-involved/fire-governance-consultation/ but the fire authority is not happy: it thinks it will cost more and that no case has been made for effectiveness or efficiency. I certainly feel that much of the assessment and scoring in the PCC's proposals seems arbitrary. Everyone is invited to comment, and the consultation is open until 4 September.

Turning Circle for Citi 6 Bus

Many thanks to everyone who replied to my question in June's issue about whether there should be a turning circle nearer the Busway for passengers from Girton to change onto the Guided Busway in order to travel to such places as St Ives, Histon or Cambridge North station.

So far everyone who has written to me has been in favour, and it seems that there is strong support for better connected public transport from the village to a variety of destinations. I am keen to promote the project further.

Village Transport Hubs

This ties in with another initiative that is currently being explored by the Greater Cambridge Partnership, called Village Transport Hubs. The idea is to improve transport to smaller and more remote villages, by having connecting services to larger villages nearby. Some specific ideas include additional car and cycle parking near a train station or guided bus stop, or a larger interchange that could involve re-routing buses to connect to other services.

It is unlikely that Girton village would be selected as a hub — villages like Histon, Waterbeach or Bar Hill might be more likely. However, Eddington may develop into a hub over time. Girton will be connected to Eddington with an excellent cycle path called the Ridgeway, and I would like to see better cycle connections from Eddington to Madingley and Dry Drayton.

Voter registration

It's that time of year again when we update the electoral register. Update forms are being sent to every household in the village. The form can either be returned by post, by calling 0800 197 9871, by text, or at www.householdresponse.com/southcambs.

If you choose the latter, there is the possibility of filling in a survey about possible changes to voting being investigated by Electoral Reform Services. The two motivations behind this are low voter turnout and the increasing level of voting fraud.

Some of the suggestions they are looking at include:

- Moving voting day to Saturday or Sunday
- Requiring some form of ID to be shown when voting
 - Electronic voting
 - Compulsory voting

The AV referendum showed that there is not much appetite for strange and exotic voting systems. The US has had huge problems with automated voting machines. In Australia, Saturday voting works well, but compulsory voting leads many people to vote for whoever's name is first on the ballot paper. Many of our current problems with fraud were caused by previous reforms such as extending postal voting beyond those voters who actually need it. I think we should stick with pencil and paper, and worship the Lord on Sunday.

Combined Planning Service

South Cambridgeshire District Council and Cambridge City Council have agreed in principle to form a new shared service for Planning, and are preparing the detailed steps to start the new service in February 2018.

The two councils currently manage over 7000 planning applications and related activities from a variety of services, including two separate processes and systems. The combined service could result in improved outcomes for customers, while achieving efficiencies through joint working and increasing the resilience of the service. Whilst systems can become more efficient in this way, it is important to ensure that the very different needs of the city and the countryside are taken into account.



Feast Week 5k and Fun Run

The 9th annual Girton 5k and 1 mile fun run were held on Thursday 6th July, organised by Girton's Muddy Mucky Munkeys Athletics Club. A record number of



entrants for both the fun run (81 finishers) and the main race (203 finishers) completed the races around the fields and paths of Girton. Dougal Phillips won the 1 mile fun run in 6 minutes 25 seconds and Ella Watkinson was first girl across the line, breaking the under 10 girls' course record with a time of 6 minutes 48 seconds. The 5k race was won in a rather nippy time of 16 minutes 28 seconds by Patrick Roddy, and first lady was Natalia Gospodarczyk who finished in 20 minutes 9 seconds in a closely fought battle across the line. Half a million pedal-strokes!

In the first few days of August, you may notice a peculiar type of cyclist passing through Girton towards Cambridge: tired, slow-moving, sweaty, with bikes fitted with classic saddlebags and a little number on their bike — mine is X32. All of these riders are heading back to London, having ridden from London to Edinburgh in the previous couple of days, and all of us will finish having ridden over 1400km — more than 870 miles — and will have pushed the pedals down over half a million times!

London–Edinburgh–London takes place every four years and this year there will be over 1500 participants. Riders have less than five days (116h 40m to be precise) to complete the entire event, passing through St Ives and over the Humber Bridge northwards, crossing

the Pennines over the highest B-road in Britain, to eventually get to Edinburgh. The southbound leg returns via the sparsely populated Borders region, before retracing to St Ives and then diverting through Cambridge to Great Easton for a last-gasp push to London.

Most of the riders will have had very little sleep and will have been riding for up to 20 hours each day. The clock never stops, so eating and sleeping must all be done at the same time as the cycling. This is 'audax', a discipline of cycling that involves riding long distances within a short-ish time – a short 'audax' ride is 200km and I run several of these each year starting from Girton.

In a few days' time, as you see us pass, slowly, on our way through Girton, it would be nice to receive a jolly 'Chapeau!' or 'Bonne route' – the traditional 'Well done' in cycling circles – to allay some of the weariness for the final 100km push to the finish. Most of us will, through sheer determination and will power, manage to keep the pedals turning all the way to London, and every little bit of support helps!



News & Party Invitation from the University of Cambridge Primary School

My name is James Biddulph, and I am the Head of the University of Cambridge Primary School – a near neighbour of Girton in the nascent community of Eddington. A third of our pupils are happy Girtonians, and we are very proud of building a diverse and positive new community.

The children would like to share some of their experiences as our second academic year comes to a close.

We started as a building site, having classroom picnics for lunch. Soon the rest of the school was completed and we started family service 'mixed year lunch tables to build friendships across the year groups'. In fact we don't think lunchtime is a break from children for teachers or a break in learning for children – instead, breaking bread with friends is an important part of the school day to build community and friendships. It has been a real success.



Together parents and staff set up our friends association, and began holding social events and fundraising. Last year they raised approximately £3000 to stock the library and buy equipment

for the school allotment. This year £15,000 was raised for a new piece of creative play equipment in honour of the late Professor Sir David MacKay, who with his family are Girtonians.

We had a family Winterfest, a Chinese New Year event, and Beep Beep Day for road safety awareness. Pupils visited the Senate House to learn about the University and its history and we had our first school trips to Thetford Forest and in 2016 to London. We welcomed a Paralympian who gave an inspirational lesson in 'Yes, I can' and then the children tried a game of blind football! This term we raced for life and have raised over £1500 for Cancer Research.

This year we welcomed another 90 children and their families and doubled the teaching faculty, and have recruited more enthusiastic staff ready for this September's intake. After a visit from Guide Dogs for the Blind, our Year 1 pupils organised their own toy and

cake sale raising funds to pay for the training of two guide dog puppies. Our year 2 and 3 pupils worked



with graduate students from the Department of Architecture to commission their own play equipment, which the students then built! And boy, did our pupils have some harsh

feedback – but all in good humour and it was thoroughly enjoyable.

We had a family bulb planting day and novices and enthusiastic horticulturalists alike braved the cold to plant bulbs and sow wildflowers around the school's grounds over a working brunch.

The Faculty of Education appointed the children's favourite Professor – of LEGO! The children are delighted to build with Lego, and then write stories about their creations. As the first University Training School we look forward to many such innovative collaborations to spark learning and research the children love participating in.

We are part of the CB4 cluster of schools, and are also working with a number of schools further afield, to learn from and with them. We are keen to open possibilities for collaboration and partnership, as all across the community benefit when schools connect and learn from one another. Now that it is August and holiday time for many people it is hoped that gardeners too can relax and use a deckchair in the garden with a glass of wine in the hand rather than a hoe! Personally I enjoy a dry, hot spell that means the lawn mower stays in the shed.

We cannot be too complacent though – greenhouse plants need care at this time. Due to the warm days and cooler evenings condensation occurs. Leaving open a small amount of top ventilation at night and opening the doors in the morning will help clear the glass and finish watering by late afternoon to ensure excess moisture has a chance to dry up before the end of the evening. Water and feed tomatoes regularly to prevent blossom end rot and snap outside shoots.

It is the time of year when we truly get the benefit of the spring hard labour – harvesting runner and French beans, sweetcorn, potatoes, carrots, beetroot and of course courgettes. How many of us have an abundance of these to give away.

To help with that here is a recipe.

Courgette Fritters (serves 4)

2 medium courgettes, grated2 tablespoons self-raising flour1 egg25 g parmesan, finely grated1 tablespoon olive oil

In a bowl combine the grated courgette, flour, egg and parmesan. Shape into golfball shape balls, then flatten. Heat a non-stick frying pan over a medium heat and add the oil. Fry fritters 2–3 minutes on each side until golden brown. Serve straight away with houmous.

Now back to work! In the strawberry bed continue to remove runners apart from a few healthy ones that can be pegged down for propagation. Overwintering brassicas can be planted now to ensure an early spring crop — nothing so delicious as the first taste of broccoli spears after the winter. Collect fresh herbs now for drying or freezing in ice-cube trays ready for those winter casseroles.

Flowers and their scents can be enjoyed at this time especially during those long summer evenings. Keep cutting them to encourage continuous flowering but leave some ready for seed collecting for the following year. I do allow some sweet peas to drop seeds and so get an early show the following year from the self-sown seeds.

This is a time to visit other gardens and enjoy the sight of beautiful borders, prairie sowings, orchards etc. and start to get ideas for your own plots and gardens.



Feast Week Village Fete – The Mini Show

What would the weather bring this year? Saturday 8th July dawned warm and

humid following an extraordinary spring and early summer of high winds, high temperatures and isolated torrential rain. Keen gardeners and allotment holders ventured out to see what had thrived or survived the strange conditions. This year there was a steady stream of entries from 10am onwards leading us to think that we may need 4 tables next year. An obvious glut of rhubarb filled the first part of the tables and all vegetable categories were well represented, though the early very dry and hot weather had not suited the potatoes. We did, however, have beans and onions this year.



In the flower categories most people found that their best roses had already gone over but the other two categories were well represented with a beautiful selection of

precious blooms including phlox, echinops, lilies, yellow yarrow and dahlias bringing colour and scent to the marquee. The mixed bouquets were very attractive and all entries would have been worthy winners.

The children's categories only had a few entries but they were all excellent. Perhaps children need more encouragement to get out and grow things?

By 11.45am the tables were full and Ray Gordon arrived to judge the entries and award the rosettes. Starting with the vegetables he examined the entries and awarded the prizes. Stand out entries were John Gibson's magnificent onions and potatoes and Ann Jerram's beans. In the children's categories Lucas Zakrzewski swept the board winning in all classes.



On to the fruit, Kay Green, Nicola Gardiner and Louisa Cook shared the prizes for a small plate of fruit.

The flowers, according to Ray, were much harder to judge as they

were all really good. Uniformity of size and stage of development is important for the 3 stems category and symmetry of composition in the mixed bunch category. In the end Rod Mathie won the first two categories and

Corinna Tabor picked up a rosette for her roses. Other winners were Valerie Hall, Rosemary Jones, Judith Addison and Kay Green. The children's categories saw Lois Mathie and Neve Fradgely as winners, with Sandy Mathie picking up 2nd place.

On behalf of the Girton Garden Society and Girton Allotment Society I would like to say a big thank you to all the members who took the time to help organise the show on the day and who donated their vegetables, fruit, plants, baskets and tubs to be sold on our combined stall. Garden tip of the month

August

Scarcely a month goes by without me finding something to prune, and write about for you. August is usually a good time to control the vigour of apple and pear trees by some summer pruning. This is at its formal best on trees that are grown as strict espaliers or cordons, but the same desire to control vigour is as true for bush and standard fruit trees in most garden settings. The aim is to reduce this year's growth, when the bottom few inches are starting to turn woody and resist a sideways pull rather stiffly, unlike the still pliant tips. Cut back some, most, or even all of these shoots to about 5 leaves and you are robbing the tree of some of its vigour. I suggest doing the easy bits first and see how you are getting on. If it's all going well get higher and do some more. The thing to remember is that the winter pruning is mainly about shape and this snip over is more to do with vigour.

Many plants can benefit from being cut back in the summer. Take aubretia for example: if you have a plant with a clear centre it's a good idea to cut round the centre removing a fringe all round. Most of the new growth will then come from a strong centre. Sometimes ground hugging plants root as they go and instead of having a clear centre there are in fact a few rather wispy offsets. In this case I would treat them as individuals, and take care not to cut any of them back to the point of disappearing! Pamper them a little and in September dig them up and group them for replanting as a small number of duos or trios.

Village projects are progressing well

In previous issues of *Girton Parish News*, we have communicated news on a number of Girton Town Charity initiatives. Here's an update on progress.

GTC Sensory Garden

Over recent weeks, many of you will have seen activity on the site of our new Sensory Garden at Wellbrook Way as Sylvia Newman and her team have brought their design to life.

The garden is now completed and will add an attractive focus to this

area of the Village for everyone to enjoy. We are leaving the fencing in place until mid August to allow the planting and turf to settle in. GTC will remain owners of the garden and it will be maintained so that it looks at its best all year round and be monitored to ensure users respect the space and facilities it provides.

We hope all Village residents will enjoy this rejuvenated space when it is opened in the late Summer.

High Street Development

The appointment of Mole Architects as part of the project team to redevelop the High Street site to future-proof housing provision in the Village was announced recently in the *GPN*. Already GTC Trustees together with our Project Managers, have sought early advice from South Cambridgeshire District Council and met with a positive response.

The next stage is for Mole to work on designs which will be presented to the Village at a public meeting in the Autumn, at the time they are submitted for planning — a date will be announced in due course.

Community Centre

Last October villagers were shown the facilities that will be on offer in the new Community Centre and since then the project has reached the point at which we should be shortly able to name the chosen construction company. If all goes well, works should start late this year and are expected to take around 12 months.

At the public meeting, architect Nick Twitchett gave residents details of the different spaces within the Centre, enabling them to 'walk' through the building with the help of 3D graphics.

In response to questions about the final layout of the building and the range of uses for which it is suitable, GTC Chairman Dr Robin Hiley outlined the extensive research GTC Trustees and their advisors had




Architect's drawings of the Community Centre.

undertaken to maximise the ways it could be used by community groups within the Village in a cost-effective manner. We are now working on plans for its management and policies for its use.

Artistic Railings and Bus Shelter

GTC has been planning, in partnership with St Andrew's Church, to complete the boundary between the churchyard and the recreation ground car park, with some bespoke artistic railings that will enhance the appearance of the area.

Following the production of an artist's brief, sculptor Matthew Lane Sanderson (www.sanderson-sculpture.com) was awarded the project and commissioned to design and install the original artwork for the site.

The final design is currently in planning with SCDC and a decision is hoped for shortly. Outline drawings for the railings were on show at the Annual Parish Meeting and they incorporate a tree of life, along with the geese and quills that are historically associated with Girton.

As part of the project, GTC will be covering the cost of a lit footpath between the railings and the car park to ensure a finish that shows off the railings sculpture to its best advantage. The existing bus shelter will also be replaced by something in keeping with the railings sculpture and the historic heart of the Village. GTC is working with a Heritage Consultant to ensure the whole area is treated in a cohesive way so that enhances this attractive area
